# 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time,

# August 2, 2020

The central theme of today's readings is that God takes care of his people. He takes care of our physical and spiritual needs if we put our trust in Him. He shares with us all his goodness through his Son Jesus who became our Savior and spiritual food, in Word and in Eucharist. We are challenged by the scripture message today to imitate our heavenly Father by sharing our blessings with others as He shares Hie goodness with us.

In the first reading, Isaiah invites us to have trust in God. "Heed me, and you shall eat well, you shall delight in rich fare". This message is assuring us that God will provide for our spiritual and physical needs if we listen and follow His will. And In the second reading, Paul argues that since God's love for us is so immense and infinite, nothing can separate us from His Love made manifest in Christ.

In today's Gospel, Jesus demonstrates God's caring love for us His people. The Gospel says that when Jesus heard the news about John, He withdrew to a deserted place to be by Himself. Jesus often went off somewhere to pray. What must His prayers have been after hearing about John's death? Perhaps He was trying to understand the will of the Father for John and for Him. Perhaps He was contemplating the meaning of death. Perhaps, Jesus was considering the mystery of evil. John, the greatest prophet to live, had been put to death by pure evil, a King who wanted to please his daughter. Certainly, Jesus was grieving over the death of His kinsman, the one who had baptized him and pointed at Him for all humanity that he was the Messiah, the Lamb of God. Think of the emotions Jesus must have felt: anguish, torment, and probably even guilt for not being there to stop it. Most likely, these emotions flooded his mind as "he withdrew in a boat to a deserted place by himself."

But after Jesus arrived at that place, did he find the solitude he was looking for? Far from it. A crowd of 5,000 waited for him, people who were there not to comfort him in his anguish, nor to mourn with him, but rather, to ask him to attend to their personal needs, to cure them, and to hear him speak. When Jesus saw them, his heart was moved with pity for them, and he cured their sick, and fed them in the end. He could not allow His grief to keep Him from caring for the people. He needed to feed them, in word and in deed. Where did the resilience come from, that allowed Jesus to face the multitudes when all he really wanted to do was to be alone?

The answer is his commitment to the 'Mission' the Father sent him to accomplish. Which is bringing good news to his people. In this mission, Jesus was not alone but always united to the Father. The Bible has numerous passages in which Jesus speaks to his need to be by himself in prayer with his Father, to nurture and deepen his relationship with God, so that in times of deep distress he would have the well-spring of strength and compassion necessary to rise up to the occasion and deal with the hardship of the people he came to save.

And so, it is with us. The past months have been hard on most of us. A pandemic, civil unrest and a widening political divide have us looking for a deserted island, where we can block these issues from our minds. Unfortunately, for most of us, that is not an option. Instead, we need to understand that our daily prayers and quiet times of reflection and solitude are as important for our well-being as daily exercise and healthy eating is for our bodies. Focused time spent in prayer with God can strengthen our resolve and provide us with guideposts to follow when we are faced with difficult in the mission of building God's Kingdom. We can pray for strength and courage to endure the hardships. Most of all, we can pray to not let fear and anger push our love for each other out of our hearts. We can pray that through all hardship, we will love like God does, and not count the costs.

Like Jesus who wanted to be alone to mourn the death of John the Baptist but felt compassion for the people and went straight into service; teaching them, taking care of the their sick and feeding them, we too, should not let our feelings or emotions, opinion or prejudice stand in our way of showing love to our brothers and sisters.

The measures put in place to protect us may seem to some as an intrusion or stepping on their rights, but as Christians we should remember that charity is a virtue. Whatever I do to protect others from getting sick is an act of charity towards the others.

Last week as Church ministers who form the Mathews Ministerial Association, we wrote an open letter in the Newspaper. I find it very touching and would like to share it with you.

"Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility consider others as more important than yourselves." Philippians 2:3

We are in the middle of a global pandemic which has claimed over 137,000 lives in this nation alone, and which has shown no signs of slowing down. In scripture, Jesus says that the greatest commandment was to love God with all our heart, minds, and strength, and to love our neighbor as ourselves. Jesus also commands us to take up our own crosses daily if we want to be his disciples, and to lay our lives down for our friends. We, your spiritual ministers, urge all Christians to obey these commands of Christ in one simple way:

# get a mask and wear it.

Wearing a mask in public may be burdensome to many, but our faith demands that we set our own preferences and comfort aside for the well-being of our neighbors. This is not only a proven way to slow the spread of this virus, it is a strong witness to our faith and the deep love we have for our community. Wearing our masks in public may be inconvenient, but that is the nature of every cross we bear as followers of Jesus Christ.

We represent a wide variety of denominations and theologies. Our churches may have different strategies for resuming in-person worship. Church attendance was 50 this past Sunday with one guest. This coming week the Mass is for <u>parishioners in Group L-Z</u> with allowance for visitors, household guests, and special cases such as assigned ministers. The important thing to remember is to notify the office if you or your guest are planning to attend Mass and are not in the proper alphabetical grouping.

We continue to offer daily Mass on Wednesdays and Thursdays for anyone who desires to attend.

We also continue to repeat much of this information weekly as a constant reminder to parishioners of our protocols and expected behaviors. We are heartened by your willingness to adhere to these procedures which have allowed us to successfully celebrate Mass up to now for all in person and at home.

We are now in the fifth month of the Pandemic and two full months of celebrating Public Masses. Our original thoughts this would be over with in a few months, the choir's melodious sounds would be heard shortly, the church would be full of parishioners and summer guests, and we would be preparing to ward off a second wave in the fall. Obviously none of these things have occurred-we wear masks, sit apart from each other, limit socializing, and church attendance, and many of our church families cannot risk attending Mass because of compromising health conditions.

Many persons have stepped up to play important roles in this new normal. Mike Dreelin has perfected the live streaming, his wife Lynne became a Lector to assist us, Andrea has donated countless hours to monitor the Mass steaming and mann the office on Sundays, and Lector and Community Leader volunteers have increased in numbers steadily.

Tom Shoemaker and his usher corps deserve special recognition. Tom planned the seating arrangement, and oversees the entire entrance, seating, data collection, communion, and exiting process. He has been helped weekly by Tom Hawksworth and Al Langer, and Bi-weekly by Don Delagrange and Bill Brandl. This past Sunday we introduced a new touchless hand sanitizer station and have available a non-contact infrared thermometer, if needed. Clara, Jerry Suyes spouse, donated these items for our use and we thank her sincerely.
