14th Sunday in Ordinary Time

July 5, 2020

Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, (that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens), and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me; for I am meek and humble of heart, and you will find rest for yourselves. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." (Matthew 11:28-30)

The people and indeed the Jews, whom Jesus was addressing in this Gospel and among whom he lived had a lot of suffering. Life imposed heavy and painful burdens upon them. Their religious leaders imposed even more, presenting them with an impossible set of laws, rules and regulations that could never be met while at the same time presenting them with an angry and vengeful God who could seemingly never be satisfied. Jesus, presented to them a God who is a Father, a God who is caring, gentle, generous, and loving, a God who is there to comfort and support his people.

This is the God the Prophets were proclaiming to the people, like in today's first reading. Prophet Zachariah says: "Rejoice heartily, O daughter Zion, shout for joy Jerusalem, See, your king shall come to you, a just savior is he."

This is a new image of God. And this is the God Jesus revealed and still reveals to us today. A God who is not distant from our life struggles and joys. A God who is just and who loves his people, he comes to save not destroy.

All of us have experienced some sorts of burdens in our life. some of us are weighed down with shame and guilt of who we are or what we have done, others lack of a job, others family problems, others illness of self or of a loved one... the list goes on. It is a fact of life that we all carry some heavy loads, even if other people do not notice.

But Jesus offers you/us something that can make life essentially beautiful for you and for me. "Come to me," He cries, "all you who are weary and find life burdensome, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon your shoulders and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart. And you will find rest, for my yoke is easy and my burden is light."

Everything depends upon how close you will let Jesus come to you. And how you will trust him so as to let him, know your feelings! Things you would rather not let other people know. But if Jesus becomes your friends, then you will disclose all your problems and worries to him.

Iesus extends his healing invitation to all of us. He wants us to share the hardships and complications of our daily lives with him. He wants us to accept his guidance and encouragement which will give us rest. Jesus' invitation to come to him is an invitation of love. Because love is the cure/medicine during trying times. Love makes the yoke easier and the burden lighter.
