
YARD SALE RECEIPTS

"Hospitality and Generosity"

Our readings this week are a teaching in Hospitality and Generosity two elements important in our faith. These two themes; hospitality and generosity are the main message of this Sunday.

The first Reading, from the Second Book of Kings we hear of the story of prophet Elisha and a rich woman. On one of Elisha journeys he came to the city of Shuman where he was warmly received by a generous lady of the city. She knew that he was a man of God, so she invited him to stay with her and her husband anytime he was passing through the area. Elisha in return, promised that God will reward her by giving her a son. This is a beautiful story of Hospitality and Generosity from both, the woman and God!

Hospitality and Generosity are some of the great virtues in the Bible and of Christianity. Our faith and the Bible teach us that each person should be welcomed as though one were welcoming God himself.

This is what Jesus tells His disciples in today's Gospel, "Whoever receives you receives me, and whoever receives me receives the one who sent me. Whoever receives a prophet because he is a prophet will receive a prophet's reward, and whoever receives a righteous man because he is a righteous man will receive a righteous man's reward. And whoever gives only a cup of cold water to one of these little ones to drink because the little one is a disciple —amen, I say to you, he will surely not lose his reward." Hospitality is far more than being a good host. Hospitality means encountering the presence of God in others, usually in those whom we least expect.

Sometimes we get too much absorbed in ourselves, our own life, that we miss the presence of the Lord as he stands right before us or as he knocks on the door of our homes and our lives through other people. When Jesus says: "Whoever loves his father or mother more than me is not worthy of me," is not against our love for our parents or children or siblings, He wants to go beyond the normal, to go out of our boundaries, our comfort zones. You see, we might miss the Lord as He is standing right before us in a person that we least expect to represent the Lord. Jesus comes hidden in the stranger, the out cast of society, the neighbor, the child crying for attention, the sick. The Lord presents himself in many ways and forms.

Many times we miss the opportunity to experience the presence of God because we decide in our mind and thinking what His presence should be like. And so miss the presence of God in others especially in persons we least expect to meet him. We need to let God be God and let God express himself in others, even if this expression is new or even foreign to us.

The virtue of hospitality is the virtue of recognizing the presence of God in others and nourishing this presence. When we practice this virtue, then the stranger among us is no longer a stranger, but a member of the family, welcome, like Elisha's story, God will be generous to us in return.


Prayer for Spiritual Communion

ORDINARY TIME

We have now re-entered the period of the Liturgical year entitled Ordinary Time. Ordinary Time refers to all of those parts of the Catholic Church's liturgical year that aren't included in the major seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter. Ordinary Time thus encompasses two different periods in the Church's calendar, since the Christmas season immediately follows Advent, and the Easter season immediately follows Lent.

Because of the term ordinary in English most often means something that's not special or distinctive, many people think that Ordinary Time refers to parts of the calendar of the Catholic Church that are unimportant. Even though the season of Ordinary Time makes up mot of the liturgical year in the Catholic Church, the fact that Ordinary Time refers to those periods that fall outside of the major liturgical seasons reinforces this impression. Yet Ordinary Time is far from unimportant or uninteresting.

The normal liturgical color for Ordinary Time for those days when there is no special feast-is green. Green vestments and altar cloths have traditionally been associated with the item after Pentecost, the period in which the Church founded by the risen Christ and enlivened by the Holy Spirit began to grow and to spread the Gospel to all nations.
