22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

August 30, 2020

Today's readings explain how we should practice true, dynamic Christian discipleship, which demands self-control: "Deny yourself", the willingness to suffer: "take up your cross", the readiness to follow Jesus by obeying his commandment of love, and generosity in surrendering our lives to God. Being a disciple or a prophet of God means to forego our feelings and interests and follow the voice of the Lord.

We hear Jeremiah in the first reading almost complaining to God for calling him to be a Prophet. Being a Prophet was not a job he wanted. "You duped me Lord" and "I let myself be duped" he tells God. And what did he get for accepting this job of being God' prophet? An object of laughter mocked by everyone. Prophet Jeremiah wants to stop talking about God, "I say to myself, I will not mention him, I will speak in his name no more" But then, the more he wants to stop the more he feels that he has to continue being God's prophet! So, in the end he accepts his mission of announcing God's word to the people. He knows that being a prophet is not easy, but he accepts the suffering this has to bring on him for the sake of telling his people what God wants them to be. He wants the people to hear God's true message.

The Gospel is not different Jesus anticipates His fate as a prophet by telling his disciples that he will have to "suffer greatly from the elders and chief-priest and be killed". But to fully understand the message we must remember what happened in last Sunday's Gospel. You recall that at Caesarea Philippi, Jesus had questioned the disciples about his identity and Peter responded confidently, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God" And in today's gospel, we see how poorly Peter understood the true mission of "the Christ". And this can be said about all the other Apostles.

You see, for us now, we recognize the familiar story of the death and resurrection of Jesus. But this was a story that the disciples had not even imagined. They expected a Messiah to be someone so strong that he cannot be killed, no one can touch him. But Jesus Makes it clear that His mission, will include suffering, not suffering for the sake of suffering, but salvific suffering, suffering for the truth. Because many people will not understand his message and many of them will be opposed it. Therefore, when He says: "Take up your cross..." He is encouraging us his disciples today, not to be afraid when we meet opposition to our faith, when people distort the message of the Gospel, When people seem not to be interested in God, When people attack us or call us all sorts of names because of our faith. This is our Cross; we must carry it and follow Jesus who is leading us. Sometimes we might feel like Prophet Jeremiah, but we are not to give up! We are called to be prophets to our generation, God wants us to be prophets among our Families, our communities, in our Church, in our Nation, so that, by our witness, many will take the message of the Gospel seriously – however uncomfortable it may make them feel.

As Jesus told his disciples To take up their Cross and follow him, he is telling us today to do same, as Prophet Jeremiah felt that he cannot be silent, that he has to tell the people what God wants them to do, so is the same with us, we cannot be silent about our faith, no matter what obstacles we may encounter. Because being Christian means putting our very self to the front for the sake of the Gospel even if that means humiliation or suffering. Very Reverend Gerald Kaggwa, V.F


It is the Grace of God, and I am grateful!



NEW WORSHIP AREA

The last time we spoke about the project, we had just successfully appeared before the Diocesan Building and Renovation Commission (BARC) who complimented us for the plan and indicated

they would recommend approval at the same time. They asked us to accomplish four tasks; shorten the distance between Altar and the Tabernacle, provide a movable handicap ramp, provide running water in the Baptismal Font, and install a lock on the men's restroom handle. We have either submitted plans to accomplish these tasks or completed them. In the interim, and because of COVID-10, the Diocese has not issued any approval letters for new construction with no indication when that will change. We have temporary approval of our financial plan, which will require a loan of an undetermined amount to complete the construction. In summary, we now await an approval letter from the Diocese to begin.



YARD SALE

In the past few weeks, we received checks totaling \$472 from the Cryer Center as our share of donations from parishioners which were sold at its bi-weekly yard sales. Once again we remind you that if you have items you

LIVING OUR MISSION CHECK

This week we received a check for \$945 from the Diocese representing parishioners' donations fulfilling pledges made to this five year, campaign during the last quarter. For us, the campaign will end this coming year and to this point we have achieved 94.5% of the pledged total.
