24th Sunday in Ordinary Time

September 13, 2020

The message of last Sunday was God's command concerning our spiritual responsibility and individual accountability for others: in our families, parishes, and community. Because, as brothers and sisters created by a loving God, we become each other's keepers. This Sunday, the focus is on forgiveness. From the first reading to the Gospel, we are invited to learn how to forgive and the consequences of not forgiving.

Sirach in the first reading warns us that if we do not forgive our brothers and sisters then we should not expect forgiveness from God for us. "Could anyone refuse mercy for another like himself, and then seek pardon for his sins?"

In the Gospel, Peter poses the question, an entirely practical one, by asking how many times we must forgive those who sin against us. "Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often must I forgive? As many as seven times?" In this Question Peter is going beyond what was being taught at the time in the Synagogues, that one had a duty to forgive someone three times, and so we can see that (Peter), by putting forward the possibility of forgiving seven times, probably thinks he is doing very well indeed. For Jesus that is not enough. He says: "I say to you not seven times but seventy-seven times".

What Jesus is saying and proposing is that, the amount of times we should forgive is far greater than we could imagine, it is endless. For the true follower of Christ, there can be no limits to how many times or how much he or she forgives. The Christian realizes the great mercy he or she has received from a God who sent His Son to become one of us to die for us so that we can have eternal life. The Christian understands that given the forgiveness we have received from God there can be no limit to the forgiveness he or she extends to others. We strive for this ideal. It is also one of the hardest tasks of Christianity.

Jesus continues to give a parable to illustrate the importance of forgiveness. This Parable has two sides: being forgiven and the consequences/effects of not forgiving. Because forgiveness affects both sides, the forgiven and the forgiver and likewise if we do not forgive our brothers and sisters the effect is on both sides. And many times, the one who refuses to forgive is affected the most.

The focus of our forgiveness should not just be on the person we are forgiving, or even the particular action we are forgiving. The focus of our forgiveness should primarily be on getting back on track with our lives. When you really think about it, all forgiveness ends up with oneself. We need to survive and move on from our hurts, or we will always be bogged down by our anger. We need to forgive the people who have hurt us so we can be people who don't hurt others.

For by failing to forgive, we hurt ourselves more than anyone else. Surely this is what Jesus had in mind when he told the parable and how the merciless servant was cast into prison when he refused to forgive his fellow servant. I do not think he was suggesting that God would cancel his mercy. He is simply saying that an unforgiving spirit creates a prison of its own. It builds up walls of bitterness and resentment and there is no escape until we come to forgive.

Forgiving and letting go is not easy, but we are called to do exactly that, because as Sirach reminded us in the first reading, if we do not forgive who will forgive our sins when it is our turn to ask for forgiveness?

When we are wronged or hurt by someone normally we have three choices: (1) I will never forgive that person (2) I know forgiving is the right thing to do but can't forgive because the hurt is too great (3) I want and wish to forgive and let go with God's help.

The right choice is to forgive. Jesus is challenging us to day not to make excuses, but to forgive, to be merciful as our heavenly Father is merciful. He forgives us our many sins without conditions. We should do the same, not once or twice... but always.

If you receive help requests that you think are legitimate, verify that the person is legitimate by calling them directly on another known valid number. Don't ask the emailer for information or a call. Find an offline method of correspondence that you and that person have used in the past to talk with each other.

Financial Facts and Challenge

For those of you who regularly follow the financial facts we publish, you are aware the Pandemic has negatively affected our offertory receipts and financial foundation.

During the first few months, the Diocese offered a relief package that reduced some church expenses and covered others. A few parishioners gave us donations in advance, and some increased their normal contribution amounts. On the other hand, some stopped contributing to the church completely for unknown reason. July was the first month without extraordinary assistance, and we experienced a negative cash flow. August appears to be negative as well.

This situation will continue to draw down our existing assets to a dangerous level unless our parishioners who are able to do so begin contributing regularly as they had done in the past, despite only being able to attend Mass bi-weekly or not at all.

In the past, we have asked the parish to support special causes (St. Noa School, Living Our Mission, Parish Pence, to name a few), but never have we had to ask you to provide a steady monthly contribution. Our fixed monthly expenses average about \$8750, and if every registered family contributed regularly to the offertory, these expenses could be met.

In summary, we need to increase our offertory collections. You can help by doing the following:

Ensure you support the church regularly even though you may not attend Mass weekly.

When away for more than a short period of time, continue to support us during your absence.

Assess if you can increase your donation amount slightly.
