Approximately one week is left to participate in the Census. The census provides critical data that lawmakers, business owners, teachers, and many others use to provide daily services, products,

and support for you and your community. Every year, billions of dollars in federal funding go to hospitals, fire departments, schools, roads, and other resources based on census data.

The results of the census also determine the number of seats each state will have in the U.S. House of Representatives, and they are used to draw congressional and state legislative districts. St. Vincent de Paul, Priest **Bicentennial Mass** September 27, 2020 Year A

### SAINT VINCENT DE PAUL PATRON OF THE DIOCESE OF RICHMOND

The Diocese of Richmond has Vincent de Paul as her Patron saint. Vincent de Paul was a priest from Gascony, France who dedicated his life to serving the poor. He is renowned for his compassion, humility, and generosity. As we celebrate this weekend the third special Mass in celebration of The Bicentennial Anniversary of our Diocese, we are invited to honor this Man our Patron whose feast day is this Sunday. We are invited to look at his life and his example of a holy life lived in serving others, especially the poor. We are invited to learn from him and put into practice the teachings of our Christian faith.

Saint Vincent de Paul was born into a poor farming family in 1581. After finishing his theological studies with a bachelor's degree was ordained a priest. The following year, he undertook a short voyage in the Mediterranean and during this voyage, Fr. Vincent was captured and sold into slavery — having three masters over two years. His third master was a former priest who had also been kidnapped and enslaved by Muslims, but he converted to Islam to gain his freedom and was living with three wives when he bought Fr. Vincent to farm for him. Vincent's freedom and return to France was secured after he converted one of the Muslim wives who then challenged her husband to return to the true faith. After returning to France as a free man, Vincent went to Rome and spent two years studying, eventually earning a licentiate in canon law.

Returning from his studies in Rome, he was appointed as chaplain to the queen a role he did not appreciate. He left and decided to serve in a parish, where he organized several pious women into the "Ladies of Charity" to support mission work. At the same time, he served as chaplain to the galley-slaves in Paris. Later, he began organizing conferences for lay Catholics to encourage them toward greater charity for the poor (both in their personal actions and by supporting missions financially), as well as conducting retreats for priests, inspiring them to minister to the poor.

In time, he founded the Daughters of Charity through which pious young women could serve God and their fellow man in consecrated life, working in hospitals, hospices and orphanages and providing other service to the poor.

Fr. Vincent worked closely with St. Francis de Sales and St. Jane Chantal in their works of charity, becoming Superior of the Visitation convents in the city. He later established his own order of priests and brothers to work with those in need of education and other essentials of life — the Congregation of the Mission, more commonly known as the Vincentians.

His priests traveled throughout France and the rest of Europe, encouraging Catholics to witness to their faith through acts of charity.

Vincent de Paul died in 1660 and was canonized by Pope Clement XII. Pope Leo XIII proclaimed him patron of all charitable works within the Catholic world.

In every nation, city, village, and in each generation, we find the needy, the sick, those who are alone, outcasts, and all those who "slip through the cracks." St. Vincent de Paul dedicated all his life to these people, bringing both spiritual and material comfort to the poor and gave them a spiritual education and direction that strengthened them and enabled them to live with hope, and with an active faith.

Vincent treated the poor as friends and family. He looked upon service to them as a privilege; he was serving Christ in his neighbor. He brought the Presence of Christ to them with charity that was genuine, gentle, and joyful. The poor were not burdens, but men, women and children with hearts and souls, and minds. If only we could look upon the needy with the same love and compassion, how the world would begin to change.

This is the challenge to all of us in the Diocese of Richmond, to imitate our Patron saint, Vincent de Paul in his love for others, by sharing God's life with all those we meet. We can transform our society and communities by living as Saint Vincent de Paul, a life of compassion, humility, and generosity.

# SCAM ALERT FROM DIOCESE

Two weekends ago, IT was alerted to yet another scam email making the rounds. This one pretends to be from the Bishop (via a bogus gmail account) asking for Steam gift cards. Please note that neither the Bishop nor any other Diocesan official will EVER ask you for gift cards via email. These scams continue to be perpetuated because they continue to work. We ask that you do not reply to such emails, click on links within those emails or download content in them. If you receive help requests that you think are legitimate, verify that the person is legitimate by calling them directly on another known valid number. Don't ask the emailer for information or a call. Find an offline method of correspondence that you and that person have used in the past to talk with each other.

# **BICENTENNIAL OCTAVE OF SERVICE**

As we continue to celebrate The Bicentennial Anniversary of our Diocese, on the weekend of September 26th & 27th the whole diocese will be celebrating A Third Special Mass in honor of Saint Vincent de Paul the Patron Saint of Diocese. Bishop Barry Knestout will celebrate a special Mass at St. Andrew's Church in Roanoke on Saturday, September 26th at 10:30 AM. This Mass will be livestreamed on the Diocesan website.

And in a special and more concrete way, all parishes and communities in the Diocese are invited to participate in the Octave of Service from September 27<sup>th</sup>, the feast day of Saint Vincent de Paul, to October 4<sup>th</sup>. An Octave of Service is a week-long opportunity for each one of us to carry out various forms of outreached in our communities and parish.

For us, The Church of the Visitation, we suggest the following activities:

A special collection of food items. You can drop your food donations at the Church on Tuesday September 29th, Wednesday September 30th and Thursday October 1<sup>st</sup> from 9:00 AM to 2:00 PM.

On Wednesday, September 30<sup>th</sup>, all parishioners who are able are invited to join us working at the Church, cleaning the yard, children's playground and flower and tree beds. Bring any tools you can use; we will be pruning, mulching and picking weeds. The day will begin with Mass at 9AM, 9:30 to 12:30 work.

Also on Wednesday, October 14th (rescheduled date) we will need volunteers to work at the Cryer Center in the clothing closet from 12:00-2 PM.

It is my hope that you will find time to participate in some of these activities as a sign of our gratitude to the Lord for his goodness to our Diocese in the last 200 years.
