A PRAYER FOR LABOR DAY Lord, on this Labor Day, we thank You for the blessing of work. We ask for strength to complete our duties each day. We ask for rest when we are weary. We ask Your guidance for everyone seeking employment, and we ask that You be with those whose faces we might never see but who work tirelessly each day for the good of us all.

23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

September 6, 2020

The message of this Sunday's readings is God's command concerning our spiritual responsibility and individual accountability for others in our families, parishes, and community. This accountability arises from our identity as God's children. As brothers and sisters in Christ, then, we become each other's "keepers," and take on a painful, triple responsibility. We must lovingly and prudently correct each other when we err, forgive those who offend us, and ask forgiveness from those we have offended.

In the first reading, God tells Ezekiel that he is to be a "watchman for the house of Israel," obliged to warn Israel of moral dangers. If Ezekiel should refrain from speaking God's word given to convert the wicked, God will hold Ezekiel responsible for the death of the wicked. In the second reading, St. Paul points out that we should: "Owe nothing to anyone, except to love one another," for out of love one should admonishing and correcting the other about keeping the commandments. Because love seeks the good of the one who is loved. Love does no evil to the neighbor.

Today's Gospel message about how to treat a brother who sins against you, is not intended to provide an outline for an increasingly intense juridical procedure whose intention is to get a person to admit that he's wrong so that he can be punished. It is an exercise of love for the brother who is a sinner, a lost sheep. Love, which knows no limits, moves one to do whatever can be done to bring back the brother from a place of serious sin to the joy of repentance. The increasing intensity—from a one-onone conversation to a small group to "the Church" to pointing out that the sin has broken the person's relationships with God and community, the Church, only illustrates the depth of love one ought to have for the brother/sister who sins. His very life is a stake—do all that you can to persuade him or her to return and, if needed, enlist the help of others to do so.

Many Christians tend to think that they have no right to intervene in the private lives of their fellow believers. Others evade the issue saying: as a human being who makes mistakes, I do not have the moral courage or the right to correct anyone. But Jesus emphatically affirms that we are our brothers' keepers, and we have the serious obligation to correct others. We need to offer advice and encouragement to our friends, neighbors, and coworkers when it is needed, and loving correction, in private, for a personal offense where that is possible.

When we have been hurt, seriously hurt by another, the sting tends to propel us toward seeking some form of revenge or making the offender hurt in some way. But the Gospel proposes love as a remedy. In the face of someone who has offended us, we are called to go against the tendency to think only of ourselves and, instead, to pray for the grace to love. Then, moved by love, we ask for the grace to do whatever it takes to bring our brother or sister to forgiveness and change.

We are reminded today of the good we can do together, and of how we can do it. Jesus says, "Where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them." If any group of us gather, work, and act with the Holy Spirit guiding us, we will become much more than simply the sum of our numbers. Today, Jesus makes it clear how important we are, one to another. One in Christ, our community can draw on God's power to make His healing, life-giving love, more effective among His people. We should always work for the good of one another such that, no one is lost, no one is excluded.

Financial Facts and Challenge

For those of you who regularly follow the financial facts we publish, you are aware the Pandemic has negatively affected our offertory receipts and financial foundation. During the first few months, the Diocese offered a relief package that reduced some church expenses and covered others. A few parishioners gave us donations in advance, and some increased their normal contribution amounts. On the other hand, some stopped contributing to the church completely for unknown reason. July was the first month without extraordinary assistance, and we experienced a negative cash flow. August appears to be negative as well.

This situation will continue to draw down our existing assets to a dangerous level unless our parishioners who are able to do so begin contributing regularly as they had done in the past, despite only being able to attend Mass bi-weekly or not at all.

In the past, we have asked the parish to support special causes (St. Noa School, Living Our Mission, Parish Pence, to name a few), but never have we had to ask you to provide a steady monthly contribution. Our fixed monthly expenses average about \$8750, and if every registered family contributed regularly to the offertory, these expenses could be met.

In summary, we need to increase our offertory collections. You can help by doing the following:

Ensure you support the church regularly even though you may not attend Mass weekly.

When away for more than a short period of time, continue to support us during your absence.

Assess if you can increase your donation amount slightly.
