ALL SAINTS AND SOULS DAY

This weekend we celebrate all Saints Day on Sunday and All Souls Day on Monday.

A saint is someone who is in heaven-it is as simple as that. While "saint" as a title is reserved to those whose lives the Church has toughly investigated (typically through whose intercession two miracles can be demonstrated to have occurred), the term applies to anyone in heaven.

Everyone from you saintly grandmother to the martyrs facing death for Christ: They are all part of the communion of saints. The Church commemorates all these saints on All Saints' Day.

All Saint' Day is a holy day of obligation and recognized as one of the most important feasts on the liturgical calendar. However, the celebration of Halloween typically overshadows the commemoration of All Saints 'Day.

Most of us realize that Halloween is in reality the vigil of All Saints' ("Allhallows Eve" or "Hallow E'en"), but All Saints' Day itself has become a bit of an afterthought.

It shouldn't be this way! The saints are our friends, our intercessors, our brothers and sisters in Christ. They care deeply for us, and their lives are recognized by the Church as exemplary, as models to follow.

All Soul' Day commemorates the faithful departed. In Western Christianity, this day is observed principally in the Catholic Church, although some churches of the Anglican Communion and the Old Catholic Churches also celebrate it. The Eastern Orthodox churches observe several All Soul's Days during the year. The Roman Catholic celebration is associated with the doctrine that the souls of the faithful who at death have not been cleansed from the temporal punishment due to venial sins and from attachment to mortal sins cannot immediately attain the beatific vision in heaven, and that they may be helped to do so by prayer and by the sacrifice of the Mass. In other words, when they died, they had not yet attained full sanctification and moral perfection, a requirement for entrance into Heaven. This is the reason why All Souls' Day is on 2 November after All Saints' Day, 1 November, which commemorates the departed who have attained the beatific vision, the Saints.

In Fact, the whole month of November is dedicated to the remembrance of our brothers and sisters who have gone before us, the faithful departed. By remembering we make present our loved one's who are not with us anymore physically but are with us spiritually.

ALL SAINTS FEAST

NOVEMBER 1, 2020

All Saints Day is intended to remind us that all baptized Christians are called to sainthood. Through our baptism, we are all set on the road God in glory are considered saints. Also, all Saints Day is intended to honor the memory of countless unknown and uncanonized saints who have no feast days. The men and women, some we may know, those who have live exemplary live and today we give thanks to God for giving ordinary men and women a share in His holiness and Heavenly glory as a reward for their Faith. This feast invites us to honor the saints, both by imitating their lives and by seeking their intercession. The Church reminds us today that God's call for holiness is universal, that all of us are called to live in His love and to make His love real in the lives of those around us. We grow in holiness when we live wholesome lives of integrity, truth, justice, charity, mercy, and compassion, sharing our blessings with others. The saints are our role models, they teach us by their lives that Christ's holy life of love, mercy and unconditional forgiveness can, with the grace of God, be lived by ordinary people from all walks of life and at all times.

We all can become saints by choosing well, by doing good and avoiding evil, by choosing to follow Christ at all times in our lives. This is what Jesus is teaching us in the Gospel of the beatitudes. Jesus in today's Gospel, shows us the way to become saints. He calls us away from being self-centered to being God centered. He calls us to be poor in Spirit. Whether we are rich or poor or somewhere in between, the center of our lives must be God. He tells us that we cannot close our eyes to the atrocities of the world. "Blessed are those who mourn". We weep over our society that allows exploitation of others. We mourn over a society that has become indifferent to the suffering of the vulnerable. The meek who inherit the earth are those who are not going to allow hatred to dominate their lives. They will fight for what is right, but they will be merciful, they will be sincere, they will be peacemakers for the sake of the Lord. Finally the beatitudes speak about those who are willing to suffer the mockery of the world, those who would rather be in the minority who choose God than be in the majority of those who go along with the noise of the day.

The saints, whom we honor today, give us an example of people emptying themselves to allow God's plan to work in them, people who have the courage to be genuine human beings. They are not statues of unreal people in pietistic poses. They are real people from every walk of life who met the challenge of Christianity and conquered. They are priests and nuns, married people and single people, very old and very young. They are the wealthy, the middle class, and poor. They were geniuses, and people of simple intelligence but vast wisdom. All of these accepted the challenge of Christianity and had the courage to wash their baptismal robes in the Blood of the Lamb, as Revelation says. They had the courage to live the sacrifice of Christ in their lives. They had the courage to make the love of God real in the world.

So, we pray today, through and by the intercession of these heroic people of our faith, that we also have the courage to put God first in our lives, and may the Lord help us to stand for him and with him spreading the Good News of His Kingdom.

Dear Brothers and sisters,

As I reflect on the meaning of this event, The Breaking of the Ground for our New Church, two texts in the Bible come to my mind:

The first is from Psalm 127. The first verse of this Psalm states: "If the Lord does not build the house, in vain do its builders labor..." May the Lord reward you for such great generosity. But this is not the time to relent; no, it's the time to go that extra mile, to push to the finish, otherwise, some might say: 'they begun to build but were unable to finish'. May the Lord, who has begun this wonderful work, he himself guide it to its glorious completion.
