

## .Second Sunday of Lent

## February 28, 20201

We have three wonderful scripture readings presented to us today: The first reading presents the Sacrifice of Isaac; in the second reading we have the famous passage from Romans "With God on our side who could be against us?" which re-assures us of God's goodness to us. And last the Gospel, we have the account of the Transfiguration of Jesus in the presence of three of his disciples: Peter, James, and John. And the Father speaking to us all that: "This is my beloved Son. Listen to him."

The main message from all three readings is: Trust, Listen, be attentive to the voice of the Lord. Abraham trusted the Lord and all that he had promised him. And because of this trust, he is willing to sacrifice, to let go of what was most precious to him: the only son of his old age. Abraham received Isaac as a gift and so he is ready to give back the gift to the one who gave in the first place, trusting that he knows better.

The story of Abraham and Isaac is full of high drama. The demand that Isaac be sacrificed seemed to utterly contradict God's promise that the boy would pass on Abraham's line into the distant future. It was a radical trial of faith, and no greater test of obedience could be set. Abraham's heart was pierced by the boy's innocent question, "Where is the lamb for the burnt offering? Finding it impossible to tell his son that *he* was the intended victim, Abraham stammered, "*God will provide.*"

We may ask ourselves: Why did God ask Abraham to sacrifice his son? Why did Abraham intend to obey?

Yes, God asked Abraham to do something that seemed, humanly speaking, absurd. Yet Abraham had faith that somehow God would work out his promises and his plans. Abraham completely trusted in God even though (maybe) everything around him and within him told him differently. Abraham had faith, he trusted. What faith do you have? What sacrifices are willing to make or take for the sake of your faith?

During this time of lent many of us try to or promise to do some sacrifices. Giving up something, etc... But are we ready to sacrifice something precious, something meaningful? And what happens after lent? Do we go back to our old ways?

The story of Abraham is teaching us to do everything trusting the Lord, that he is always on our side. St. Paul in the second reading reminds us that if God is for us nothing can go wrong.

In the Transfiguration account in today's Gospel, Jesus is revealed as a glorious figure, superior to Moses and Elijah. The primary purpose of Jesus' Transfiguration was to allow Him to reveal to us his mission of brings salvation to God's people, which will include suffering, death, and Resurrection.

As the Father told us in The Gospel: This is my son, listen to him. Let us pay attention to what the Lord is telling us, let us listen to his voice, the voice which is in his Gospels. The Lord is calling us everyday to change to be good people to be his disciple, to seek his love and forgiveness, but sometimes His voice is not heard.

During this time of lent, spend some time reading and meditating/reflecting on some passages of the Gospels. Listen to what those passages are telling you.



#### SOUP AND STATIONS



Although a soup repast is not part of the events as in the past, the soup fundraiser is occurring simultaneously. For clarification, if you are signed up to prepare soup, you can deliver the soup to the church during working hours(9-2pm) or before the stations begin at 5:30pm.

Please place the contents (soup) in the quart containers in the kitchen and then the refrigerator. If bringing bread there are paper bags which the bread is to be placed. For those who have ordered a quart or two, you may pick up your order at 6:15pm or upon the conclusion of the stations.

The donation amount is \$10 per quart, bread included. As we proceed through Lent, please remember *to sign up on Sunday* to prepare soup and/or bread or to place your order for a quart or two of these delicious culinary specialties.

If you wish to sign up for either and cannot make it to church, you can always email or leave a message on the church answering machine. When ordering soup, please say what *type* of soup you desire and how *many* quarts of each.

# WHAT WILL BE YOUR LEGACY?



Members of our church gather each week around the communion table, reciting the words of Christ and participating in the scared meal "in remembrance" of Jesus. That gift has been handed down generation to generation.

As we recall the names of those who have died, our minds are filled with precious memories. We are their legacy, and much of what we have-in both material and non-material things-have been handed down to us from them. But what will we hand down to those who follow? How will be remembered? Will we leave more than an empty spot in a pew?

As you plan for the distribution of your assets at your death, consider a charitable bequest to our church. This is one way your faith can be transferred to the next generation. This, and other types of planned gifts, can undergird our congregation's ministry in perpetuity, providing resources that will allow future generations of Disciples to worship, serve others and continue the vital ministries of the church.



## LENT IS UPON US

Lent has begun and we encourage you to participate in the four stations planned to begin this coming Wednesday. As part of that, you can order soup to take home with you after stations. Information about the soup portion has been previously promulgated and like the other Lenten fundraisers, call Mary if you have any questions. The Triduum will be held at FdS this year. If you need a Lenten Calendar, pick one up as you depart Mass as well as a copy of the Little Black Book, the popular six minute reflection series.

## Regulations for Fasting and Abstinence:

*Fasting* is to be observed by all 18 years of age and older, who have not yet celebrated their 59th birthday. On a fast day one full meal is allowed. Two other meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and juices, are allowed.

*Abstinence* is observed by all 14 years of age and older. On days of abstinence no meat is allowed. Note that when health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law done not oblige. When in doubt concerning fast and abstinence, the parish priest should be consulted.

> Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence. All the Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence.

Lent and the Worship Environment. During Lent, the altar should not be decorated with flowers. The Fourth Sunday of Lent (Laetare Sunday), solemnities, and feasts are exceptions to this norm. While the vestment color for the season of Lent is violet, on the 4th Sunday of Lent, rose-colored vestments may be worn.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation. During Lent, everyone is urged to take a greater and more fruitful share in the Lenten liturgy, It is very appropriate for the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation to be celebrated during Lent in a more solemn form, and we encourage you to receive this sacrament during Lent.
