4th Sunday Lent, March 14, 2021

'Laetare' – Rejoicing Sunday

We are now at the fourth Sunday of Lent, more than halfway to Easter. And so today is Laetare Sunday, Meaning Rejoicing Sunday!

The question is, what is the cause for rejoicing? We rejoice because of God's constant love for us. The central theme of today's readings is that our salvation is the free gift of a merciful God, given to us sinners through Jesus, His Son. The readings stress God's mercy and compassion and remind us of the great love, kindness and grace extended to us in Christ. God has always come to the aid of his people whenever they cried out to him for help and welcomed them whenever they sought his reconciliation.

In today's Gospel reading, Jesus reminds Nicodemus of God's act of mercy during the Israelites' sojourn in the wilderness. Although they had already experienced many instances of God's provision and protection, the Israelites complained and rebelled against him. This resulted, as they bypassed the land of Edom, in their being afflicted by seraph serpents. But when Israel cried out to God, he had compassion, he ordered Moses to make a serpent and to mount it on a pole. And it became the means of healing for those who had been bitten by the serpents.

Today, in both the second reading and the Gospel, we see in the most wonderful way how God's free gift of healing, and reconciliation is given and received. Paul, in the reading from Ephesians, describes God as "rich in mercy." God's "great love" is manifested in his bringing us to life "when we were dead in our transgressions." When we were still sinners! It is because God is so forgiving, so loving and compassionate to all. St. Paul makes it clear when he tells us that: "By grace you have been saved through faith. This is not from you; it is a gift from God so no one may boast." It is because of this free gift of God's love and mercy that we rejoice not only this Laetare Sunday, but every day!

But the readings of this Sunday especially the Gospel, invite us to do more than rejoice. In the Gospel we are reminded of the Cross of Jesus, because it is on the Cross, where Jesus pours himself out in love to the end, that is, to the fullest extent, in order to reveal his and the Father's love for us, the wondrous love that reconciles.

In this image of Jesus on the cross we are invited to contemplate the love of God revealed through Jesus' cross. We need to love the cross, the symbol of God's forgiving and merciful love: As a forceful reminder not only of God's love and mercy, but also of the price of our salvation, the crucifix invites us to more than simple generosity and compassion. It inspires us to remove the suffering of other people's misery. It encourages us not only to feel deep sorrow for another's suffering, but also to try our best to remove that suffering. Hence, let

us love the cross, and carry our own daily cross with joy, while helping other to carry their crosses. And in the face of such love, We need to reciprocate God's love by loving others. God's love is unconditional, universal, forgiving, and merciful. Let us try to make an earnest attempt to include these qualities in sharing our love with others during Lent.

SOUP AND STATIONS



Although a soup repast is not part of the events as in the past, the soup fundraiser is occurring simultaneously. For clarification, if you are signed up to prepare soup, you can deliver the soup to the church during working hours(9-2pm) or before the stations begin at 5:30pm.

Please place the contents (soup) in the quart containers in the kitchen and then the refrigerator. If bringing bread there are paper bags which the bread is to be placed. For those who have ordered a quart or two, you may pick up your order at 6:15pm or upon the conclusion of the stations.

The donation amount is \$10 per quart, bread included. As we proceed through Lent, please remember *to sign up on Sunday* to prepare soup and/or bread or to place your order for a quart or two of these delicious culinary specialties.

If you wish to sign up for either and cannot make it to church, you can always email or leave a message on the church answering machine. When ordering soup, please say what *type* of soup you desire and how *many* quarts of each.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTION

It looks like we won't have enough parking spaces when the New Worship Area is completed?

Our original plan was to add one new row of spaces toward the road. Because of new Department of Environmental Quality standards, the plan would have required us to cut down trees and construct a concrete water cachement system costing over \$200,000. We counted the parking spaces remaining after construction, informed the Diocese of the count, and they informed us we exceeded it's requirement and standards.

If we discover later that we absolutely must have more parking spaces, we can consider less costly alternatives that won't require DEQ permission.

We can handle that many persons seating-wise, but accounting for attendees has become difficult because so many parishioners are arriving only a few minutes before Mass.

Please consider arriving for Mass as early as 15 minutes before hand to ease the accountability issue.

At the same time that we ask you to arrive earlier, we would also ask that you minimize the socializing (a dichotomy-come early and don't talk) so we can ascertain who is seating where and reduce the risk of transmitting any infections.

LENT IS UPON US

Lent has begun and we encourage you to participate in the four stations which occur on Wednesdays. As part of that, you can order soup to take home with you after stations. Information about the soup portion has been previously promulgated and like the other Lenten fundraisers, call Mary if you have any questions. The Triduum will be held at FdS this year. *Regulations for Fasting and Abstinence:*

Fasting is to be observed by all 18 years of age and older, who have not yet celebrated their 59th birthday. On a fast day one full meal is allowed. Two other meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and juices, are allowed.

Abstinence is observed by all 14 years of age and older. On days of abstinence no meat is allowed. Note that when health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law done not oblige. When in doubt concerning fast and abstinence, the parish priest should be consulted.

> Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence. All the Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence.

Please note the **rose** colored garment that Father will be wearing this Sunday. It's the fourth Sunday of Lent, currently called Laetare Sunday, a term meant "to rejoice" priests are given the option of wearing rose colored vestments in place of the violet ones normally worn during Lent. The Sunday is considered a day of relaxation from normal Lenten rigors, a day of hope with Easter at last within sight, only 21 days away!

The Sacrament of Reconciliation. During Lent, everyone is urged to take a greater and more fruitful share in the Lenten liturgy, It is very appropriate for the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation to be celebrated during Lent in a more solemn form, and we encourage you to receive this sacrament during Lent.

Daylight Saving Time begins Sunday-don't forget to turn your clocks-"Spring ahead" on Saturday night before you go to sleep!
