5th Sunday in Lent March 21, 2021 Year B

The Fifth Sunday of Lent

March 21, 2021

The Merciful Love of our God is constantly at work. When we fail to follow his will, he always finds new ways of bringing us back to him. He spares nothing for our salvation, that is why he sent us his only son Jesus, to come and die for us, thus establishing an everlasting Covenant with his people. This is the focus of our reading for this Sunday.

The first reading, taken from the book of the Prophet Jeremiah, explains how God will replace the Old Covenant of Judgment with a New Covenant of Forgiveness of sins. This New Covenant, prophesied by Jeremiah, was fulfilled through Jesus' life, death, and Resurrection. In the second reading, St. Paul tells the Hebrews that it is by Jesus' suffering and death, in obedience to his Father's will, that a New Covenant is established.

Today's Gospel teaches us that, the new life of the New Covenant is possible only by the death of the self through obedience, suffering and service: "unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat, but if it dies, it produces much fruit.

Jesus himself was the expression of this principle. He is the grain of wheat that falls to the ground and dies, and in dying yields a harvest of life. He describes that harvest in prophetic words: "When I am lifted up from the earth, I will draw all people to myself." If God worked powerfully through the life of Jesus, He worked even more powerfully through the death of Jesus, a death that reveals the power of God's love, even more fully than his life of healing and ministry, for the amazing love revealed in his death on the cross drew people to God and continues to do so. Over the centuries, millions of people, by looking upon the crucifix, have experienced God's personal love and compassion and found themselves drawn to God in return. I is by accepting freely, the suffering, that Jesus drew people of all nations to himself and to sharing in a new life, lived in and with God.

The Gospel hints at the inner struggle of Jesus in accepting the cup of suffering to inaugurate the New and Eternal Covenant. However, Jesus accepts the cross as his *"hour,"* meaning his passion, death, Resurrection. It is by accepting this *"hour"*, that Jesus glorifies his Heavenly Father, and in return, he is being glorified by his Father. It is by this hour of being lifted up on the cross, that Jesus draws all people into the saving action of God.

The lesson we get from Jesus is that , only a life spent for others will be glorified. Jesus left us an example, he is that grain of wheat which fell on the ground and died, and as a result it produced much fruit. We know that the world owes everything to people who have spent their time and talents for God and for their fellow human beings. Let us pray that we may acquire this self-sacrificing spirit, especially during this time of Lent.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTION

It looks like we won't have enough parking spaces when the New Worship Area is completed?

Our original plan was to add one new row of spaces toward the road. Because of new Department of Environmental Quality standards, the plan would have required us to cut down trees and construct a concrete water cachement system costing over \$200,000. We counted the parking spaces remaining after construction, informed the Diocese of the count, and they informed us we exceeded it's requirement and standards.

If we discover later that we absolutely must have more parking spaces, we can consider less costly alternatives that won't require DEQ permission. Dear parishioners,


Be sure that your estate planning documents are properly prepared. A homemade will "might" work, but unless it is properly written it might cause unnecessary expenses and delays-and worst of all, it might not accomplish what you want to happen. The writing of your will is a job for which you need professional assistance.













Fasting is to be observed by all 18 years of age and older, who have not yet celebrated their 59th birthday. On a fast day one full meal is allowed. Two other meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and juices, are allowed.

Abstinence is observed by all 14 years of age and older. On days of abstinence no meat is allowed. Note that when health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law done not oblige. When in doubt concerning fast and abstinence, the parish priest should be consulted.

> Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence. All the Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation. During Lent, everyone is urged to take a greater and more fruitful share in the Lenten liturgy, It is very appropriate for the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation to be celebrated during Lent in a more solemn form, and we encourage you to receive this sacrament during Lent.

You are reminded that reconciliation will be held here at COV at 7PM on March 24th.

More than half way through Lent, we are approaching *Palm Sunday and Holy Week*. You are reminded that the Palm Sunday celebration will begin 10 minutes early at 8:50am. We will not begin the celebration outside as in the past but start inside with the Blessing of the Palms.
