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3rd Sunday in Lent March 7, 2021 Year B

Third Sunday of Lent March 7, 2021

During Lent, and especially this Lent, the First Readings from the Old Testament present various covenants between God and his people. We reflect on them during Lent to help us have a greater understanding of the New Covenant in the blood of Jesus which we celebrate at Easter.

The first Sunday of Lent we had the story of Noah whom God saved from the floods. Then, after the floods, God made a covenant by the sign of a rainbow, with his people when he promised he would never give up on his people. He will never destroy humanity. Last Sunday, (the Second Sunday of Lent), we had the covenant with Abraham when he trusted that God would provide after being told to sacrifice his son. The message was that God knows the inner turmoil we may have in our faith lives and gives us the strength to grow in faith even in the most difficult times of our lives. This Sunday we are presented with the covenant made through the Ten Commandments presented to Moses to bring to the people. This covenant was so solemn to the people of Israel that they kept the Tablets containing the Ten commandments in a specially made platform in a tent called the Ark of the Covenant. The Ten Commandments were the basis of Jewish Religion and are still today the basis of our religious and spiritual life. Instead of restricting our freedom, the Commandments really help us to love and respect our God and our neighbors. Like the Jewish people who practiced the Ten Commandments so they could remain the Chosen People, we also, are called to practice the Ten Commandments as our response to God's presence, his choice of us.

Today's Gospel gives us the dramatic account of Jesus' cleansing the Temple of its merchants and moneychangers, followed by a prediction of his death and Resurrection. The key to Jesus' anger is to be found in the first reading. "I, the Lord, am your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, that place of slavery. You shall not have other gods besides me." This is the first and most important of the Ten Commandments. It forbids belief in false Gods or the worship of idols. Now in those days this was understood in a very external and legalistic manner. You buy a sacrifice offer it to God and that is all. People offered sacrifices in the Temple as a legal practice not based on their faith. And all those who sold animals for sacrifice made money for themselves.

Jesus is not content with this mere outward conformity to the Law of God; what he wants is interior obedience, obedience of the heart. These merchants are clearly serving not God but themselves. Their aim is not true worship of the Living God but the accumulation of money. And worse of all this involves the exploitation of the poor and devout. This is what makes Jesus angry and leads him to clear them from the Temple. But the direct consequence of the Cleansing of the Temple was Christ's arrest and death on the Cross. Indeed, in his remarks about destroying the Temple and it being raised up in three days Jesus makes it quite clear that he is fully aware of the consequences. It was this intervention into what they regarded as their territory that upset the Temple authorities. From that moment they were determined to do away with Him.

Lent is the ideal time to clean out the Temple of our own hearts and to offer to God proper worship by living according to his Commandments, and by always carrying out his will. We need to avoid a faith based on a calculating mentality. Our relationship with God must be based on trust, love, desire to do his will with no thought of personal loss or gain.



REGRETS

LENT IS UPON US

Lent has begun and we encourage you to participate in the four stations which occur on Wednesdays. As part of that, you can order soup to take home with you after stations. Information about the soup portion has been previously promulgated and like the other Lenten fundraisers, call Mary if you have any questions. The Triduum will be held at FdS this year. If you need a Lenten Calendar, pick one up as you depart Mass as well as a copy of the Little Black Book, the popular six minute reflection series.

Regulations for Fasting and Abstinence:

Fasting is to be observed by all 18 years of age and older, who have not yet celebrated their 59th birthday. On a fast day one full meal is allowed. Two other meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and juices, are allowed.

Abstinence is observed by all 14 years of age and older. On days of abstinence no meat is allowed. Note that when health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law done not oblige. When in doubt concerning fast and abstinence, the parish priest should be consulted.

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence.

All the Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence.

Lent and the Worship Environment. During Lent, the altar should not be decorated with flowers. The Fourth Sunday of Lent (Laetare Sunday), solemnities, and feasts are exceptions to this norm. While the vestment color for the season of Lent is violet, on the 4th Sunday of Lent, rose-colored vestments may be worn.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation. During Lent, everyone is urged to take a greater and more fruitful share in the Lenten liturgy, It is very appropriate for the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation to be celebrated during Lent in a more solemn form, and we encourage you to receive this sacrament during Lent.
