Divine Mercy Sunday

This Sunday is also known as Divine Mercy Sunday due to the message of the Gospel we read on this Sunday. Jesus appears to his disciples and gives them the power to continue his work of forgiveness. " ... he breathed on them and said, receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sin you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained." Again, in the Gospel, Jesus shows is loving forgiveness to the Disciples who abandoned him, and even Thomas who refused to believe when they others told him that he is alive. Jesus forgives all that.

This is a proof of his love for them and all of us. He allowed Thomas to touch them. By this, he is telling us that it is alright to go to God in our woundedness, with our sins and with shortcomings, we are assured of a total welcome. We don't have to pretend that we are otherwise; we can go as we are. Jesus appreciates our honesty, and he will always forgive us.

The end of the gospel passage today states: "Now Jesus did many signs in the presence of his disciples that are not written in this book. But these are written that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that through this belief you may have life in his пате".

Faith or belief is not just about believing in things we do not see. Faith is about taking a risk and making commitments, even if what lies ahead is unclear, even if we are not sure. This is what Jesus was challenging Thomas about. He was inviting Thomas to believe him even though he did not see him. Moreover, he is inviting Thomas to commit his life to him, and this will involve risk. Thomas did not want to believe only on the ground of what he was told, he wanted to experience Jesus for himself rather than taking the word of others.

In following Jesus, we often find ourselves doubting, questioning, hesitating, even challenging Him to prove himself to us that he is the Lord, the Son of God. The Gospel today is an insight about our human nature, doubting and looking for tangible signs. But our faith calls us to go deeper.

Believing in Jesus means a *close following of Him*, a commitment of our lives to him even when the signs are not too clear. Basically, it is about trust. We have to ask ourselves daily: will we trust Jesus, will we be faithful in following him when our conditions are not met but allow him to act as he knows best, not always understanding why he acts this way?

This was basically the problem of Thomas. We read that he set up his own conditions for believing in Jesus. "Unless I see the marks of the nails in his hands, and put my finger into the nail-marks, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe". Then when the compassionate, understanding Risen Jesus Christ appears again, we see his sensitivity to the doubts of Thomas. There is no condemnation on the part of Jesus, simply kindness and gentleness.

This is our God, he knows that in life, difficulties will come our way, sometimes causing us to doubt God's love and care for us. But today's gospel is a litany of God's incredible understanding and sensitivity to who we are. First, he appears to the disciples locked in a room for fear of the Jews. His first words are not those of condemnation but of consolation. He offers them Peace, and this fills them with joy. Because not only are they locked in a room but also they are locked into their fears. They are in a sense paralyzed by fear. Jesus becomes a life-giver to them. The Joy of seeing him and knowing that he is alive, and present among them replaces fear.

Let us not allow our fears to dominate our lives. Jesus came to free each of us. He may not always come directly but if we ask him in faith and trust, he will use others to help us have the same freedom and peace his frightened disciples had when he appeared to them in the Upper Room.

CHURCH INFORMATION

Since we began celebrating Mass for all parishioners exclusive of alphabet restrictions, our attendance weekly has been about 70-75 persons. Easter Sunday attendance was 92.

We can handle that many persons seating-wise, but accounting for attendees has become difficult because so many parishioners are arriving minutes before Mass.

Please consider arriving for Mass as early as 15 minutes before hand to ease the accountability issue.

At the same time that we ask you to arrive earlier, we would also ask that you minimize the socializing (a dichotomy-come early and don't talk) so we can ascertain who is seating where and reduce the risk of transmitting any infections.

WHAT WILL BE YOUR LEGACY?

THE EASTER SEASON

Commencing with Easter, we began the Easter Season, 50 days of joyful exultation until Pentecost Sunday. Some of the differences you may notice are;

On Easter Sunday, the tradition in the United States has been to replace the Creed with the Renewal of Baptismal Promises, followed by a sprinkling with blessed water. A Rite of Sprinkling may appropriately replace the Penitential Act at the beginning of Mass on all Sundays during the Easter Season.

Instead of the Nicene Creed, especially during Lent & Easter Time. The Baptismal Symbol of the Romans Church known as the Apostles' Creed may be used.

Paschal Candle remains in the sanctuary, most preferably near the ambo, and is lighted for every celebration during the Easter Season. The Paschal Candle remains in position until after the last Mass on Pentecost Sunday.

In the Province of Baltimore, which includes the Diocese of Richmond, the Ascension of the Lord is transferred to the Seventh Sunday of Easter, thus replacing the Seventh Sunday of Easter.
