April 18, 2021 Year B

Third Sunday of Easter April 18, 2021

"You are witnesses of these things."

The common theme of today's readings is the challenge to adjust our lives to the living presence of the risen Lord as we grow daily in awareness of our call as Christians. This awareness should strengthen our hope in His promises, bring us to true discipleship and the renewal of our lives, and lead us to bear witness to Christ by our lives and works of charity. We are reminded of the purpose of the suffering, death, and Resurrection of Jesus, that it was for our salvation. Jesus in the Gospel puts it upon us all to bring this Good News to all people: "You are witnesses of these things." He called His disciples to be witnesses.

In the first reading, taken from the Acts of the Apostles, Peter forcefully shows how the messianic prophecies have been fulfilled in the crucified and risen Jesus and challenges the Jesus and all those listening to turn towards God so that they may receive salvation through Jesus Christ. In the Gospel, Jesus explains how the prophecies have been fulfilled in him. "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the law of Moses and in the Prophets and Psalms must be fulfilled." Then he commissions them to bear witness to him and to continue His mission throughout the World.

Jesus needs us as witnesses to continue his mission. Jesus needs Spirit-filled followers to be his eyes, ears, hands, and feet, to bear witness to his love, mercy, and forgiveness by our interactions with our brother and sisters. Our daily lives are meant to serve as a means for us to experience and share the risen Lord with others.

We are called to proclaim that Jesus Christ came, suffered, died and rose from the dead so that we could have a share in His eternal life. The world needs to hear our testimony. Jesus came for truth, justice, love, forgiveness. We are witnesses to His message, it is our obligation therefore, to live and promote love, justice, truth, forgiveness, and peace.

Just as the disciples experienced the risen Lord within themselves and in their community, let us learn to recognize the presence of Jesus in our own lives, our homes, in our friends and in all those we meet in different places like, hospitals, workplaces, and schools. Jesus wants us to be a community which shares and cares, a community which knows how to recognize Jesus in the poor, the marginalized, the sick, in everyone. We have to be witnesses of his salvific life to all.

The Risen Christ told his disciples to begin their preaching of the Good News, the offer of his peace and forgiveness, beginning with those living in Jerusalem, then to those in the towns and country-side and finally to all the world. He invites us to realize that the place to seek for peace is first of all at the center of our own lives, then in our immediate personal world, and then

beyond. We make our impact where we can, in our everyday ordinary activities and surroundings. God continues to appear in our daily life in very ordinary ways. God wants to open our eyes to the presence of the risen Christ in the ordinary happenings of life. It is in the small things, the everyday details of life, the moments of caring and sharing when we reach out to others that we show that Christ is risen among us. The Risen Christ is not apart from the world. He is in our midst. We are witnesses of this ever presence of the Risen Lord.


PERSONAL CHALLENGE PARTICIPANTS

CHURCH INFORMATION

Since we began celebrating Mass for all parishioners exclusive of alphabet restrictions, our attendance weekly has been about **70-75** persons. Easter Sunday attendance was 92.

We can handle that many persons seating-wise, but accounting for attendees has become difficult because so many parishioners are arriving minutes before Mass.

Please consider arriving for Mass as early as 15 minutes before hand to ease the accountability issue.

At the same time that we ask you to arrive earlier, we would also ask that you minimize the socializing (a dichotomy-come early and don't talk) so we can ascertain who is seating where and reduce the risk of transmitting any infections.

THE EASTER SEASON

Commencing with Easter, we began the Easter Season, 50 days of joyful exultation until Pentecost Sunday. Some of the differences you may notice are;

On Easter Sunday, the tradition in the United States has been to replace the Creed with the Renewal of Baptismal Promises, followed by a sprinkling with blessed water. A Rite of Sprinkling may appropriately replace the Penitential Act at the beginning of Mass on all Sundays during the Easter Season.

Instead of the Nicene Creed, especially during Lent & Easter Time. The Baptismal Symbol of the Romans Church known as the Apostles' Creed may be used.

Paschal Candle remains in the sanctuary, most preferably near the ambo, and is lighted for every celebration during the Easter Season. The Paschal Candle remains in position until after the last Mass on Pentecost Sunday.

In the Province of Baltimore, which includes the Diocese of Richmond, the Ascension of the Lord is transferred to the Seventh Sunday of Easter, thus replacing the Seventh Sunday of Easter.
