

# Easter Sunday

# April 4, 2021

Easter is a Feast which gives us hope and encouragement. On Easter Sunday we celebrate a new beginning in and with faith. In a World of pain, sorrows frustrations, fear, . . Easter reminds us that life is worth living. No matter our present discouragements, hope is always there.

Easter Sunday Readings sum up this sense of hope and encouragement. There is no way Peter could have spoken like that on Easter Sunday. Like the other apostles, Peter was both scared and discouraged after all that had happened to Jesus. Because up to the moment of the Resurrection, after the terrible death of Jesus on Good Friday, the disciples of Jesus were devastated. The one they had leaned on was gone. They never imagined Jesus would be taken prisoner and crucified. In that instant their dreams evaporated. The disciples experienced a dreadful loss, and no doubt were shattered, their hopes taken away in those short few days. They were also afraid for their lives and half expected to be caught and punished by the religious leaders who plotted the death of Jesus and had him crucified. For them at that terrible time, there was no light at all, but after experiencing the Risen Lord, the light in their lives started to shine again.

In today's gospel, Mary of Magdala reports to Peter and John that the tomb is empty. In nearly all the Resurrection accounts, it is the women who first experience the Risen Jesus. Women at that time as in many places still today were looked down upon. This may be why the disciples did not believe them. It seems that the proclamation of life of the Risen Jesus starts with the very people who were marginalized and who count for little in society. In any case the curiosity of the 2 is awakened and they run to the tomb. Peter sees the linen cloths on the ground in an empty tomb. But their faith had been crushed so finding the empty tomb meant nothing especially to Peter at the beginning. Only the beloved disciple, John the Gospel says, that he 'saw and he believed'.

The real good news of Jesus' resurrection is that we do not have to gloss over pain, suffering and difficult daily life situations. Because the Resurrection does give us a new outlook on life. It gives us the freedom to face the dark side of life, and even death with confidence knowing that Jesus broke the bonds of human limitation and slavery in our lives. Jesus is alive and if we really have experienced the joy of the Risen Jesus in our daily lives, we will have deep joy, peace and serenity because of Jesus who is now alive and make all thing new.

In the first reading today Peter says that he and the disciples are now witnesses of all they saw Jesus doing even if for a few days they were paralyzed by his death and seeming failure. If we really experience the Risen Jesus in our lives like the Apostles then we will begin to develop talents and gifts we never knew we had, because fear gives way to trust, trust in the Lord and in ourselves.

This empowers us to break free from former limitations.



#### PAYROLL PROTECTION PROGRAM (PPP)

Early on the pandemic, we applied for a PPA Loan when offertory receipts were lacking. It required considerable paperwork fraught with government red tape. While waiting for Sona Bank to process our request, the Diocese located another bank that could handle it and submitted one in our behalf. The loan totaled \$9,915, and required a lengthy rationale for payment. When the process allowed it, the Diocesan Finance Office applied for loan forgiveness, and last week, the Small Business Administration forgave our loan. We thank the Diocese and our office staff for a timely success story.


Take courage, be hopeful, and pray that the Lord continues to keep us safe.

#### CHURCH INFORMATION

Since we began celebrating Mass for all parishioners exclusive of alphabet restrictions, our attendance weekly has been about 70-75 persons.

We can handle that many persons seating-wise, but accounting for attendees has become difficult because so many parishioners are arriving minutes before Mass.

Please consider arriving for Mass as early as 15 minutes before hand to ease the accountability issue.

At the same time that we ask you to arrive earlier, we would also ask that you minimize the socializing (a dichotomy-come early and don't talk) so we can ascertain who is seating where and reduce the risk of transmitting any infections.

#### ANNUAL APPEAL

We continue to further surpass our goal when counting cash donated to date and amounts pledged. *In an unmistakable achievement, we are at 166% of goal.*Twenty-eight parish families, two former families, and one unknown have contributed to this appeal. #### WHAT WILL BE YOUR LEGACY?

## FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTION

Where will the Sacristy and Reconciliation and vesting room be located in the New Worship Area?

The Sacristy will remain where it is now. As you enter the new worship area, to your right will be a vesting room. In front of that, separated by a wall will be a confessional, accessible by a penitent from the nave (seating area). Father will enter his side of the confessional through a door from the vesting room.

#### THE EASTER SEASON

Commencing today, Easter, we begin the Easter Season, 50 days of joyful exultation until Pentecost Sunday. Some of the differences you may notice are;

On Easter Sunday, the tradition in the United States has been to replace the Creed with the Renewal of Baptismal Promises, followed by a sprinkling with blessed water. A Rite of Sprinkling may appropriately replace the Penitential Act at the beginning of Mass on all Sundays during the Easter Season.

Instead of the Nicene Creed, especially during Lent & Easter Time. The Baptismal Symbol of the Romans Church known as the Apostles' Creed may be used.

Paschal Candle remains in the sanctuary, most preferably near the ambo, and is lighted for every celebration during the Easter Season. The Paschal Candle remains in position until after the last Mass on Pentecost Sunday.

In the Province of Baltimore, which includes the Diocese of Richmond, the Ascension of the Lord is transferred to the Seventh Sunday of Easter, thus replacing the Seventh Sunday of Easter.
