PRESENT NORMS AND GUIDELINES FOR CELEBRATION OF THE MASS

Our Diocesan guidelines have been received for celebration of the liturgy, and they allow for some discretion by the pastor for when they should fully be implemented as we transition to a new norm. I have reviewed the guidelines and will introduce the majority of them immediately. Others, we will delay for a short period of time. Enclosed below are our guidelines for Mass affective this coming Sunday:

1. Masks: Fully Vaccinated. Effective May 15, 2021, fully vaccinated people no longer need to wear a mask in any setting.

Unvaccinated. From ages 5 and older must cover their mouth and nose with a mask when present for any Mass or liturgical celebration.

- 2. Hand sanitizer: All entering the Church are asked to use hand sanitizer placed at the entrance
- 3. Music Ministry: Choir may resume.
- 4. Lord's Prayer and Sign of Peace: We are to continue the practice of refraining from holding hands during the Lord's Prayer and shaking hands during the Sign of Peace (bow or verbal gesture is appropriate).
- 5. Distribution of the cup: The distribution of the cup remains suppressed for deacons and the lay faithful until further notice.
- 6. Dispensation from the obligation to attend Mass: For those members of the faithful who may not feel comfortable to attend liturgical celebrations yet, Bishop Knestout continues to dispense all of the faithful of the Diocese of Richmond from the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days until further notice
- 7. Live streaming Masses: We will continue live streaming our Masses for the faithful unable to attend in person.
- 8. Ushers: resume their normal procedures/functions as it was pre-Covid-19 except for collections. We will continue to use the baskets placed in the entrance.
- 9. Bulletins: We will continue to distribute them electronically until further notice.

Permitted by state directives, the Bishop has announced that parishioners who are fully vaccinated do not have to wear facemasks when celebrating Mass. On the other hand, if you are not fully vaccinated, you should be masked at all times while in church or in a crowd on church grounds. If you are fully vaccinated and choose to remain masked during the celebration of the Mass, that is your right and prerogative, and you should not feel embarrassed about doing so.



Not wearing a facemask when not fully vaccinated is not only a matter of honesty among other things, but also a show of respect for the safety of other parishioners. The Most Holy Trinity

May 30, 2021

The mystery of the most Holy Trinity is a basic doctrine of Faith in Christianity, understandable not with our logical thinking but with our faith. It teaches us that there are three distinct Persons in one God, sharing the same Divine Nature, co-equal and co-eternal. Our minds alone cannot grasp this doctrine. But we believe in this Mystery because Jesus, who is God, taught it clearly, the Evangelists recorded it, the Church tries to explain it, and teaches it as the foundation of our Christian Faith.

In the language of the Bible, the figure/number three symbolizes completeness and perfect symmetry. Three is perfection, completeness. There are Three Persons in the Trinity, the Father the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Together they represent the fullness of love. The Father loves the Son, the Son loves the Father. The Holy Spirit is their love for each other. We are made in the image of a triune God. God the Father, who created us, his Son who saved us, and the Holy Spirit who continues to guide us.

God wants to be known as a community of persons. He has revealed himself as three, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. God does not exist in solitary individualism but in a community of love and sharing. God is not a loner. Neither can a Christian be a loner. We are our brothers' and sisters' keepers. True love requires another, others to help us grow as human beings. We must always remember that we are using human concepts and human words to try and understand better who God is. Mystery in the religious sense means that we cannot know everything about God. But we can know more and more about God as he reveals himself to us in our daily lives.

The best revelation of God as Trinity is seen in the gospels. Each of the three persons of the Trinity is concerned for and focused on the Others. At the Baptism of Jesus and on the mountain of the Transfiguration God the Father is not speaking about himself but of Jesus.' This is my beloved Son in whom I am well pleased'. Jesus constantly refers to the Father. "I came not to do my own will but the will of the One who sent me', and 'Father into your hands I commend my spirit'. And, of course, the great prayer he taught us starts: 'Our Father'. Jesus before he goes promises to send the Holy Spirit who according to Jesus will teach and explain to us what Jesus came to achieve. So, the Holy Spirit is constantly inspiring us to listen to and follow Jesus. Very simply put, this is the pattern of Christian living. In being concerned for others we are living out who God is and what God is about as a Trinity, three in one, all working together in harmony.

It might be worthwhile to reflect on what we do every time we bless ourselves in the name of the Trinity. 'In the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and also when we say the prayer 'Glory be to the Father' and all other prayers where we always end by invoking the Trinity. If we realized the significance of what we often rush through we might have a greater awareness of our dignity of belonging to God's Trinitarian family.

Let us practice the Trinitarian relationship of love and unity in the family relationships of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Since by Baptism we become children of God and members of God's Trinitarian family. Let us practice the *I–God–my neighbor*, the Trinitarian relationship expected of any Christian by living according to the Commandment of our Lord: to Love God and to love your neighbor as you love yourself.

TRINITY

The mystery of the Most Holy Trinity is the central mystery of the Christian faith and of Christian life. God alone can make it known to us by revealing himself as Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

The Incarnation of God's Son reveals that God is the eternal Father and that the Son is consubstantial with the Father, which means that, in the Father and with the Father the Son is one and the same God.

"The Holy Spirit proceeds from the Father as the first principle and, by the eternal gift of this to the Son, from the communion of both the Father and the Son" (St. Augustine, De Trin. 15, 26, 47: PL 42, 1095).

By the grace of Baptism "in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit", we are called to share in the life of the Blessed Trinity, here on earth in the obscurity of faith, and after death in eternal light (cf. Paul VI, CPG § 9).

"Now this is the Catholic faith: We worship one God in the Trinity and the Trinity in unity, without either confusing the persons or dividing the substance; for the person of the Father is one, the Son's is another, the Holy Spirit's another; but the Godhead of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit is one, their glory equal, their majesty coeternal" (Athanasian Creed: DS 75; ND 16).

Inseparable in what they are, the divine persons are also inseparable in what they do. But within the single divine operation each shows THE TRINITY forth what is proper to him in the Trinity, especially in the divine missions of the Son's Incarnation and the gift of the Holy Spirit.
