PRESENT NORMS AND GUIDELINES FOR CELEBRATION OF THE MASS

We have begun the process of returning to a pre-pandemic celebration of the Liturgy. We will continue to follow the established guidelines we have been using, which are enumerated below. The remainder will be introduced gradually.

- 1. Masks: *Fully Vaccinated*. Effective May 15, 2021, fully vaccinated people no longer need to wear a mask in any setting.
 - *Unvaccinated.* From ages 5 and older must cover their mouth and nose with a mask when present for any Mass or liturgical celebration.
- 2. Hand sanitizer: All entering the Church are asked to use hand sanitizer placed at the entrance.
- 3. Music Ministry: Choir may resume.
- 4. Lord's Prayer and Sign of Peace: We are to continue the practice of refraining from holding hands during the Lord's Prayer and shaking hands during the Sign of Peace (bow or verbal gesture is appropriate).
- 5. Distribution of the cup: The distribution of the cup remains suppressed for deacons and the lay faithful until further notice.
- 6. Ushers: resume their normal procedures/functions as it was pre-Covid-19 except for collections. We will continue to use the baskets placed in the entrance.
- 7. Bulletins: We will continue to distribute them electronically until further notice.

25th Sunday in Ordinary Time

September 19, 2021

We become great in the sight of God by doing God's will as Jesus did, surrendering our lives to Him in the service of others. The first and second readings invite us to choose the path of righteousness and humble service which leads to lasting peace. It is the child-like humility and selfless service which makes one great in the sight eyes of God. This is the central message in today's scripture readings.


The apostles in the Gospel today had not yet learned what true greatness is, in fact, they had a different idea of greatness and how it achieved from that of Jesus. Who would be the greatest among the disciples? Would it be James, John, Peter, or Andrew? They did not know what greatness was. Jesus shows them true greatness which is following his footsteps in a selfless giving of oneself to others, which he accomplished on the Cross. That was the message that Jesus was trying to get across to his disciples after he heard them arguing about who should be first in the Kingdom of God. He said that the first shall be last and servant to all. For Jesus to be great was to serve.

Unlike what society and our culture says, our Christian faith teaches us that true greatness comes from service. The ultimate goal of one's life is to serve God and others, especially those in need. Our model is Jesus himself and his teaching in the Gospels. It is welcoming and serving the vulnerable in our midst: the defenseless children, the despairing poor, the mentally ill and the marginalized. It is through these acts of love that we can consider ourselves great

Jesus calls us to be his disciples, His true followers. He calls us to set aside our own desires for the sake of others. He calls us to seek the greatness of humble generosity, to "rank first" among our families, friends, and communities by taking on the spirit and role of being their servant. "If anyone wishes to be first, he shall be last of all and the servant of all." The jealousy and selfish ambition that attacks the just man in the Book of Wisdom in our first reading, and that James berates in the second reading when he say: "where Jealousy and selfish ambitions exist, there is disorder and every foul practice". The sign of the Christian is seen in his or her setting another's needs over his or her own.

We are all called to do this, continually. Every day, every moment of the day you and I are called to consider others over ourselves. The needs of the children, the sick, the poor and the elderly call us away from ourselves and call us into Jesus. Every day we have to resist the temptation to selfishness, the temptation to put ourselves before others. Every day we are called to greatness by conquering ourselves. Every day we are called to be the Presence of Jesus for others.

The goal of our lives is union with God. The strength to achieve this union comes from Jesus Christ on the cross. He made Himself weak so we could be strong. We pray today for this strength, the strength to reach out to others in selfless service, which is the strength to achieve greatness.


