

PRESENT NORMS AND GUIDELINES FOR CELEBRATION OF THE MASS

We have begun the process of returning to a pre-pandemic celebration of the Liturgy. We will continue to follow the established guidelines we have been using, which are enumerated below. The remainder will be introduced gradually.

1. Masks: **Fully Vaccinated.** Effective May 15, 2021, fully vaccinated people no longer need to wear a mask in any setting.
Unvaccinated. From ages 5 and older must cover their mouth and nose with a mask when present for any Mass or liturgical celebration.
2. Hand sanitizer: All entering the Church are asked to use hand sanitizer placed at the entrance.
3. Music Ministry: Choir may resume.
4. Lord's Prayer and Sign of Peace: We are to continue the practice of refraining from holding hands during the Lord's Prayer and shaking hands during the Sign of Peace (bow or verbal gesture is appropriate).
5. Distribution of the cup: The distribution of the cup remains suppressed for deacons and the lay faithful until further notice.
6. Ushers: resume their normal procedures/functions as it was pre-Covid-19 except for collections. We will continue to use the baskets placed in the entrance.
7. Bulletins: We will continue to distribute them electronically until further notice.

Twenty Third Sunday in Ordinary time

September 5, 2021

In the gospel today Jesus meets a man who is deaf and also has an impediment in his speech. It is his friends who bring him to Jesus. We note the sensitivity of Jesus. He takes the man apart in order to cure him. He is gentle to him and doesn't want to embarrass him. He treats and cares for him as human being in need.

This Gospel text and miracle has special relevance to our Christian style of life in many ways.

The friends of this deaf man can be an inspiration to us. They *brought their friend to Jesus* to see if he could be cured. Their speaking to Jesus on this man's behalf led to his being able to speak again, now he has a voice of his own. Their care for him led them to speak on his behalf. If they had no love for him, they would not have taken the initiative to speak up for him. In order to do our own share in the Lord's lifegiving work, we need to begin by being attentive and concerned about other peoples' need. And then help them find a solution to their problems.

Jesus opens the deaf man's ear and enables him to hear and loosens his tongue to enable him to speak clearly. We, Christians today, sometimes are suffering from a condition of blurred vision and impeded speech on matters of our faith. We need the same kind treatment from Jesus, so that we can open up and be bold when talking about our faith. We are often silent, mute or tongue-tied when it comes to sharing our values or defending our faith. We need Jesus to touch our eyes, our ears, and our tongue that we may see him more clearly, hear him speak to us, and speak more clearly of our faith in Jesus, we need to feel proud of being Christians.

Jesus took the deaf man away from the crowd, from the noise, so that he can be with him and hear Him (Jesus). We need to be with Jesus, out of the noise in order to hear clearly what Jesus is telling us, and what He wants from us. God speaks to us daily through many ways. Do we hear what he is saying, and are our lips/tongues free from impediments so as to use them to praise and thank Him continuously and to encourage others who are down to find hope in Jesus?

We are surrounded by so much noise that we can become deaf to the voice of God, deaf to the cries of God's people, to the cries of those who need our help. There is much noise from the political sphere, from our communities, even in our families that we can easily become deaf to the voice of the Lord and to the needs of the poor, the immigrant, the sick, the children born and unborn. And as the result of this noise surrounding us, we are sometimes confused. We confuse right from wrong, we confuse evil and good, justice and injustice, truth and falsehood.

Jesus cured the deaf man as we heard in the Gospel today, many of us may say that we do not have that problem of being physically deaf or having a speech impediment. But our main problem is that we are too busy to hear Jesus. We are so busy with our daily activities. We are too busy that life is slipping by at a very fast rate, and we need to slow down to find the real purpose of this life. Life is about knowing God, loving God, and serving God and his people, especially those in need.

If we are too busy, we can be deaf to the real meaning and joy of life and deaf also to what the Lord is saying to us. Jesus cannot speak to us if we are not attentive enough to listen. That word of Jesus "Ephphatha" "Be opened!" is very important and we need to hear it from Jesus again and again.



RECOGNITION AND THANKS


