PRESENT NORMS AND GUIDELINES FOR CELEBRATION OF THE MASS

We have begun the process of returning to a pre-pandemic celebration of the Liturgy. We will continue to follow the established guidelines we have been using, which are enumerated below. The remainder will be introduced gradually.


1. Masks: *Fully Vaccinated*. Effective May 15, 2021, fully vaccinated people no longer need to wear a mask in any setting.

Unvaccinated. From ages 5 and older must cover their mouth and nose with a mask when present for any Mass or liturgical celebration.

- 2. Hand sanitizer: All entering the Church are asked to use hand sanitizer placed at the entrance.
- 3. Music Ministry: Choir may resume.
- 4. Lord's Prayer and Sign of Peace: We are to continue the practice of refraining from holding hands during the Lord's Prayer and shaking hands during the Sign of Peace (bow or verbal gesture is appropriate).
- 5. Distribution of the cup: The distribution of the cup remains suppressed for deacons and the lay faithful until further notice.
- 6. Ushers: resume their normal procedures/functions as it was pre-Covid-19 except for collections. We will continue to use the baskets placed in the entrance.
- 7. Bulletins: We will continue to distribute them electronically until further notice.

27th Sunday in Ordinary Time

October 3, 2021

At first glance, today's readings especially the Gospel appear to be about marriage, divorce, and adultery. However, when one considers this Gospel in its long form, the focus seems to be on discipleship and fidelity to God's will. The invitation to the disciples is to move from a legalistic mindset to one that accepts the kingdom of God like a child. Further, true discipleship entails being detached from all possessions including attachment to self so as to allow God's grace to flow.

In the gospel today it is interesting to notice the way the question to Jesus was put. 'Is it lawful for a husband to divorce his wife'? They were interested in what is legal... the legalistic part of it. But should we always ask 'what is lawful' before doing something? Or better what is right? what is good, what benefits me and the other.

Jesus widens out the discussion recalling the creation story in Genesis, which is also our first reading, where it is said that man and woman are created equal by God and have complementary roles. It is therefore clear that marriage is the union of equal beings. Jesus tells us quite clearly that divorce is not part of God's plan but fidelity, being faithful to one's call in life. God's plan is that marriage union mirror the fidelity of God towards us, his people. A married couple is asked to reflect the covenant love of God for his people, a God who never fails in his promise of fidelity to us. He will never abandon us.

But God knows as Jesus knew that we do not live in an ideal world. We are not ideal people. It is very important to have ideals before us and to live by them. But being human and sinners we will fail despite our most noble intentions. We are dishonest if we think otherwise. Any couple married for a long time will say that it takes a lot of 'I do' for a marriage to succeed. The same to each one of us, we need always to say 'Yes' to God's will in order to be true disciples. We all know from experience that life is full of mistakes and compromises. But God's grace, his Spirit is always there to empower us if we call on it. Who doesn't make mistakes from time to time? This is equally true of priesthood and religious life. It is a process and a lifetime's work of constant renewal of our commitment to God and to one another.

Any relationship, be it in marriage or with God, is based on fidelity. Being faithful. But as it is in marriage also in our Christian life, we fail to live up to that expectation of faithfulness. The readings today provide a chance to talk about all this, in the context of mercy and compassion. And this is the GOOD NEWS of today's Gospel. It proclaims the message of God's mercy, of his liberating forgiveness. The gospel gives every person a future. There is no human failure so great that it is completely hopeless and no longer open to God's mercy. God is the God of the second chance and the third and so on.

We are not all able to live up to what Jesus teaches us, but this does not exclude us from his love. The point is to focus on what God wants from us, what is His plan for us, Surely, He wants us to be happy. He wants us to be pure and holy. He wants us to have self-worth. He wants us to be in relationships that truly build us up. He wants us to be free from the pressures of society which distort the Gospel. He wants us to live our lives in true and fulfilling love. Fidelity to this God's plan, excludes the idea of divorce or of giving up, there is no abandoning the choices we made in faith, because it is a plan based on mutual love, mutual support, and mutual forgiveness.


OKTOBERFEST
