PRESENT NORMS AND GUIDELINES FOR CELEBRATION OF THE MASS

We have begun the process of returning to a pre-pandemic celebration of the Liturgy. We will continue to follow the established guidelines we have been using, which are enumerated below. The remainder will be introduced gradually.

1. Masks: *Fully Vaccinated*. Effective May 15, 2021, fully vaccinated people no longer need to wear a mask in any setting.

Unvaccinated. From ages 5 and older must cover their mouth and nose with a mask when present for any Mass or liturgical celebration.

- 2. Hand sanitizer: All entering the Church are asked to use hand sanitizer placed at the entrance.
- 3. Music Ministry: Choir may resume.
- 4. Lord's Prayer and Sign of Peace: We are to continue the practice of refraining from holding hands during the Lord's Prayer and shaking hands during the Sign of Peace (bow or verbal gesture is appropriate).
- 5. Distribution of the cup: The distribution of the cup remains suppressed for deacons and the lay faithful until further notice.
- 6. Ushers: resume their normal procedures/functions as it was pre-Covid-19 except for collections. We will continue to use the baskets placed in the entrance.
- 7. Bulletins: We will continue to distribute them electronically until further notice.

4th Sunday in Ordinary Time January 30, 2022 Year C

The Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time, 1/30/2022

The central theme of today's readings is that we should have, and show in our communities, the courage of our Christian convictions in our Faith and in its practice, even when we face hatred and rejection.

The first reading tells us how God called Jeremiah as His prophet and equipped him to face opposition and rejection. In living out his prophetic vocation he encountered rejection and persecution but did not give up. He relied on God, the one who chose him to be a prophet. Jeremiah believed that he was commissioned by God to proclaim a disturbing prophetic message. No matter how strong the opposition, he had the conviction that God was with him.

In the second reading, we hear Paul speaking with the courage of his Christian convictions in correcting the Corinthian Christian community where the exercise of God's gifts was causing competition, jealousy, and divisiveness. He courageously presents to them a "way" which surpasses all others, namely, the way of love, and instructs them to exercise their gifts with love.

Today's Gospel is a continuation of last Sunday's Gospel presenting Jesus's own people having a negative reaction about him after his address at the synagogue of Nazareth when Jesus applied to himself the words of Isaiah 61, announcing a new time of liberation and healing in God's name. The passage shows us how Jesus faced skepticism and criticism with prophetic courage. His hometown people felt that Jesus should show them special preference. The proverb "Physician, heal yourself" is like saying "charity begins at home." They would not accept that his message was not a gospel of status or privilege. They failed to see that God's love goes wherever human need is found and when people have a welcoming faith to receive it. Jesus came to preach the good news about the mercy of God to those open to receive it. The challenge to us is to have an idea about God based on what Jesus taught: a Loving God who love all his people. Our impression of God should also have an effect on our daily living. God's grace is not for a small, exclusive circle, and salvation is intended for all people everywhere. If we were to draw our picture of God, let us hope that it would be the same as what Jesus taught.

As Christians, we are invited today and always to face rejection with prophetic courage and optimism. Perhaps we have experienced the pain of rejection, betrayal, abandonment, violated trust, neglect, or abuse, even from friends and family members, when we reached out to them as God's agents of healing and saving grace. Perhaps we ourselves are guilty of offering such rejection. Perhaps we, too, have been guilty of ignoring or humiliating people with our arrogance and prejudice. Let us learn to correct our mistakes and face rejection from others with courage and not give up on our Christian mission, the mission of spreading the Good News of Jesus.

And let us not be like the people in Jesus' hometown who rejected Him. Because like them, we sometimes reject God in our lives. We reject God when we are unwilling to be helped by God, or by others. Such unwillingness prevents us from recognizing God's directions, help, and support in our lives through His words in the Bible, through the teaching of the Church, and through the advice and examples of others.

We need to follow Christ, not the opinion of the day, and to speak

Journey Together: Synod on Synodality 2021-2023

How will the Church of the Visitation develop a response for the Diocese of Richmond?

"Synod" is a Greek word that literally means "on the same path" so Pope Francis has asked the whole Church to "journey together" on the same path in communion with one another.

All parishioners are asked to listen to the inspiration of the Holy Spirit and prayerfully discern God's will for us. In doing so, we are asked to consider several key questions contained in the Synod Participants Guide, which is being provided electronically along with the bulletin and which will be available in paper form after Mass.

During February and March, our Parish Council and others will be conducting a number of consultations designed to give all parishioners an opportunity to provide input to the Synod process. These consultations will be in small group settings, usually after a daily or Sunday Mass, and should last no more than an hour.

Sign up sheets for consultations will be available after Mass next Sunday, January 30. Additional consultations will be arranged for evening hours or as needed to accommodate any parishioner who wants to participate in the Synod process.

One outcome of the consultations will be input for Bishop Knestout as he prepares for the World Synod of Bishops to be held in Rome in October 2023. Even more important, we hope that the discussions that occur during the synod consultations will improve the path we are on together as a parish.
