PRESENT NORMS AND GUIDELINES FOR CELEBRATION OF THE MASS

We have begun the process of returning to a pre-pandemic celebration of the Liturgy. We will continue to follow the established guidelines we have been using, which are enumerated below. The remainder will be introduced gradually.

1. Masks: *Fully Vaccinated*. Effective May 15, 2021, fully vaccinated people no longer need to wear a mask in any setting.

Unvaccinated. From ages 5 and older must cover their mouth and nose with a mask when present for any Mass or liturgical celebration.

- 2. Hand sanitizer: All entering the Church are asked to use hand sanitizer placed at the entrance.
- 3. Music Ministry: Choir may resume.
- 4. Lord's Prayer and Sign of Peace: We are to continue the practice of refraining from holding hands during the Lord's Prayer and shaking hands during the Sign of Peace (bow or verbal gesture is appropriate).
- 5. Distribution of the cup: The distribution of the cup remains suppressed for deacons and the lay faithful until further notice.
- 6. Bulletins: We will continue to distribute them electronically until further notice.

The Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

February 20, 2022

Today's Scripture readings challenge us to make hard choices in our relationship with others. we are advised to choose love, unconditional love, instead of selfishness, no jealousy or hatred but always to be sensitive to the needs of others. We are challenged to choose graceful forgiveness instead of harboring revenge and planning retaliation. The first reading shows us how David made the right choice, respecting God's anointed king by forgiving his offenses, while Saul continued to make the wrong choices, perpetuating his own misery in seeking to kill David.

And the most radical of expressing love and forgiveness is in the message of Jesus in today's gospel. "Do to others as you would have them do to you" It is the "Golden Rule" of Christian Life. This rule puts an obligation on each one of us to behave like the children of a loving, forgiving, merciful, and compassionate Heavenly Father. Jesus explains the golden rule and commands us to follow it as God's children. "Love your enemies...Do good to those who hate you; bless those who curse you and pray for those who maltreat you." Jesus orders us to love our enemies and to be merciful and compassionate to everyone as God our Father is loving, merciful, and compassionate, this is the way our Heavenly Father treats each one of us.

As disciples of Christ, we need to practice this "Golden Rule": This Rule asks us to do to others what we would like them do to us. If we love others and expressing that love by loving words and deeds, we will start receiving the same love from others and on higher level from God. Further, if we want others to forgive our offenses, then we have to change our words of criticism, and our thoughtless judgments against them, into appreciation and forgiving words towards others. Not judging but encouraging them and supporting them in their needs.

We need to pray for the strength to forgive. Our challenge is to overcome our natural inclination to hate those who offend us. To meet that challenge, we need to ask God for the strength to forgive each other. We must forgive because only forgiveness truly heals us. If we remember how God has forgiven us, it will help us forgive others. Our love towards those who offend us is also a healing for them, they become better persons because of our example.

To love our enemy then is not to enable him to continue to do morally wrong acts against us or anybody else either. If we want what is good for our enemies, we will want for them what we want for ourselves: to be a person who has love for the Lord and for his fellow human beings. The way of the Lord is radically different.

and for his fellow human beings. The way of the Lord is radically different than the way of human beings. We have been given the grace to choose the way of the Lord. St. Paul reminds us in today's second reading that we are children of both the first Adam and the New Adam. The first Adam was physical. His ways were the ways of the world. The New Adam, Jesus Christ, gave us His Spiritual Life. We belong to the New Adam. We belong to Jesus Christ. May His ways be our ways.

Here we are, Holy Spirit!



As we prepare to participate in the local phase through synod consultations, we are asked to listen to the inspiration of the Holy Spirit and prayerfully discern God's will for us. RETIREMENT ANNOUNCEMENT

The Diocese issued the following announcement last week concerning our faithful and beloved parishioner, Emily Filippi. On behalf of Bishop Knestout, I write to share that Emily Filippi, Director, Office of Christian Formation, is retiring her position effective June 30, 2022. Emily joined the diocese in 1977 as the Director of Religious Education at St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Peterburg. After assisting other parishes, Emily was hired as the Associate Director, Christian Formation in 2997 and was

promoted to Director, Office of Christian Formation in 2008. We are deeply grateful for Emily's dedication, outstanding service, and leadership for over four decades with the Catholic Diocese of Richmond.

Upon moving to the Northern Neck, Emily and her husband David joined our parish in 2012.

THE NARTHEX

Because we now have a Narthex (formally the rear of our seating area) it needs some explanation.

A narthex, simply stated, is a place for congregation members to enter in preparation for worship. Depending on tradition or denomination, other terms may be used, such as "foyer," "vestibule," "gathering space," "lobby." Whatever the term, the need for a place where people can arrive, interact, and transition from the outside world into a spiritual place is common to nearly all buildings that serve a religious community.

The word "narthex," is generally associated with traditional Christian liturgical churches, though the use of the term for a modern gathering and preparation space is relatively new. For early Christians, the narthex was a porch or ante-chamber near the entry of a church where those who aspired to join the church would wait until they became fully initiated members. Today, the term suggests not a place of exclusion, but rather one of welcome and hospitality.

In the publication, Built of Living Stones, the US Conference of Catholic Bishops note the importance of a space for spiritual gathering. "The narthex is a place of welcome-a threshold...between the congregations' space and the outside environment...(it) helps believers to make the transition from everyday life to the celebration of the liturgy, and after the liturgy. It helps them return to daily life to live out the mystery that has been celebrated."

It is also suggested that the narthex be approximately 1/4 of the size of the worship area, and ours is. We will discuss the narthex further in succeeding bulletins.

ALTAR BELLS AT MASS

We are sure you have noticed the use of altar bells the past two weeks after the epiclesis. When the second Vatican council introduced a new form of Mass (priest facing the faithful and the use of the language of the people) the bells became optional, set aside in some parishes and restored in others. We will continue to ring them at the words of consecration during the Eucharistic Prayer as a subtle reminder to "Pay attention, Jesus is coming. He is here on the Altar and will soon be present within us in the Holy Eucharist"

TABERNACLE AND MARY'S CHAPEL UPDATE

The Tabernacle will remain in Mary's Chapel until the dedication, at which time it will reside in the sanctuary behind the altar, resting on our present altar. The statue of Mary which once rested in the right corner of the nave is now in the chapel. A new addition to the chapel are votive candles, long a tradition of Catholic churches. However, ours are electronic in the interest of safety. To use it before or after prayer, just push the button and it will remain lit for 8 hours.
