



The amount of taxable income used to calculate the cathedraticum is the same figure used for the Assessment. It is not based on the number of parishioners receiving

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Question: Now that we have pews and kneelers, and not having knelt for more than a decade in our old worship area, when should I be kneeling during Mass?

Answer: For Roman Catholics, kneeling is one of the most distinctive physical gestures of prayer during the celebration of Mass. In fact, for many centuries the lay faithful of the Roman Rite would kneel for almost the entire duration of Mass.

Catholics kneel because Jesus kneeled during prayer. Additionally, kneeling is typically seen in the Gospels as a way to express supplication and adoration.

For these reasons the Roman Rite instructs the faithful to kneel during Mass specifically when Jesus is made present on the altar. According to the General Instruction of the Roman Missal, "In the Diocese of the United States of America, (the faithful) should kneel beginning after the singing or recitation of the Sanctus (Holy, Holy, Holy) until after the Amen of the Eucharistic Prayer."

This physical posture is meant to express a spiritual attitude of adoration before the triune God, truly and substantially present in the Holy Eucharist, It is an act of humility, recognizing our own littleness before the creator of the world. That act of kneeling prepares our hearts to receive God within our souls, striking down our pride with a physical reminder of what our soul should be like spiritually.

While not officially part of the Rite, it is a common custom in some churches to maintain a kneeling posture until the consecrated hosts are placed back within the tabernacle.

All this being said, If your physical condition and/or age precludes you from kneeling when it is prescribed, act in a way that is comfortable for you.

The instruction manual is located on the bottom right corner of the bulletin.

ORDINARY TIME



We have returned to the period of the Liturgical Year entitled Ordinary Time. Ordinary Time refers to all of those parts of the Catholic Church's liturgical year that aren't included in the major season of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter.

Ordinary Time thus encompasses two difference periods in the Church's calendar, since the Christmas season immediately follows Advent, and the Easter season immediately follows Lent.

Because the term "ordinary" in English most often means something that's not special or distinctive, many people think that Ordinary Time refers to parts of the calendar of the Catholic Church that are unimportant. Even though the season of Ordinary Time make up most of <u>the liturgical year in the Catholic Church</u>, the fact that Ordinary Time refers to those periods that fall outside of the major liturgical seasons reinforces this impression.

Yet Ordinary Time is far from unimportant or uninteresting. The normal liturgical color for Ordinary Time for those days when there is no special feast is green. Green vestments and altar cloths have traditionally been associated with the time after Pentecost, the period in which the Church founded by the risen Christ and enlivened by the Holy Spirit began to grow and to spread the Gospel to all nations.

The Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time July 3, 2022

The main mission of the Church is to announce the Good News. Today we are reminded through the scripture readings that we are called to announce the Good News of the Kingdom by words, deeds, and life. This is the task for all baptized Christians. St. Paul in the second read ing, reminds us that the mission of each member of the Church is to bear witness to the saving power of the cross of Christ through a life of sacrificial, self-giving service.

In today's Gospel, Luke describes Jesus' commissioning of 72 disciples to preach the Gospel of the good news of God's love and salvation in towns and villages in preparation for his own visit. Jesus gives the paired disciples instructions for their missionary journey. They must be walking witnesses of God's providence, relying on the hospitality of others, living very simple lives, preaching the Good News, and healing the sick and he says that their first words on entering a house were to be: 'Peace to this house'. They were to be ambassadors of peace and goodwill.

Peace is not a negative thing. It is not just the absence of war or enmity. Peace is a positive thing. It implies openness, tolerance, friendship, goodwill, hospitality, and reconciliation. Neither does it mean just a feeling of well-being but above all the peace between God and his people. Peace is especially a gift from God. God's great gift is peace. It is a source of joy for all people.

Working for peace means welcoming people who are close to us, those who annoy or disagree with us, even those who cause anguish within us. It is interesting that when Jesus sends out his 72 disciples, he sends them out in pairs, meaning they cannot be effective ministers to others unless they are at peace and in communion with each other. We are called into community. It is about living in right relationships with all others.

Jesus Begun by calling 12 Apostles to his mission. In today's gospel he calls 72 others. Little by little he will call on the help of more and more people to assist him. Today's gospel is a gospel for all people, every baptized Christian and indeed all people of goodwill are invited by Jesus to work with him against all that is opposed to the kingdom of God which he came to establish on earth. Each one of us is called by God, depending on our particular vocation, to spread the Good News. especially the Good News of love and peace.

In giving instructions to the Seventy-two before he sent them out, Jesus told them to enter a house and say, "Peace to this house." If a peaceful person lives there, your peace will rest upon him. If not, it will return to you. The Lord is telling us to look carefully for the good within all and nurture this good, we are to be positive.

If we emphasize with great care and great kindness that which we have in common, then perhaps others will be encouraged to search for other aspects of life we have in common. When we see or hear people

supporting immoral behaviors, we need to be calm. We need to let our peace return to us. At the same time, we need to take stands for the truth. And we need to pray for all those supporting immoral positions. We cannot allow the reactions of others to our proclaiming the truth of the Kingdom of God, determine whether or not we will continue to be witnesses of the values we believe in.


