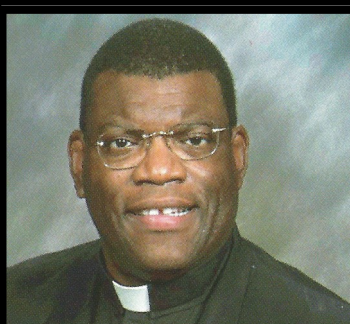
OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD

STILLNESS BEFORE GOD, STILLNESS BEFORE MASS

"Be still and know that I am God!" (Psalm 46:11)

As we become accustomed to a new worship area, we need to be mindful of the purpose of the Narthex and the sanctity of the sanctuary and nave.

In our previous worship space, our practice was to joyfully socialize before Mass at our seats. It was understandable and acceptable given the environment, and it was difficult at times to prepare ourselves for the celebration of the Mass. Our new worship area now offers us the opportunity, to practice five or ten minutes of stillness in preparation for a more meaningful encounter with God present in the Eucharist. Additionally, it allows us to pray the Rosary without the distraction of conversation and noise. The narthex is the appropriate place to greet friends, pass along the latest news, items of interest, and engage in cheerful fellowship that is the hallmark of our church community.

Once the Rosary ends and the doors to the worship area are opened, we ask you to quietly find your way to your pew and maintain a reverent silence as we compose ourselves into a prayerful congregation. If you have to greet a friend who you are again delighted to see, please do so with a smile a wave of the hand, or a nod to the head. If words have to be spoken, please make the conversation short and possibly whispered.

If and when it's necessary to speak to someone already in a pew for an official purpose, like to check on an announcement with the community leader, please be brief and quiet. We understand that habits are hard to break or alter in our convivial church, but please consider socializing before or after Mass in the Narthex and respect the need for quiet preparation in the Nave.

"He got up, rebuked the wind and said to the sea 'Quiet! Be still!!' The wind ceased and there was a great calm" (Mark 4:29)

When we enter our new worship area, let Jesus calm the storm within and around us. Let us be quiet. Let us be still.

The main message of today's readings is gratitude, especially to God. In the first reading we have Naaman, the Syrian military commander, he was an outcast not only because of his leprosy; he was also a non-Israelite. But he returned to thank the Prophet Elisha for the cure of his leprosy, and as a sign of his gratitude, transferred his allegiance to the God of Israel. St. Paul, in the second reading, advises Timothy to be grateful to God even in his physical sufferings and amid the dangers associated with spreading the Word of God because God will always be faithful to His people. Today's Gospel story tells us of a single non-Jewish leper, a "Samaritan", who returned to thank Jesus for healing him, while the nine Jewish lepers went their way. "Where are the other nine?" Jesus asked the crowd.

Today's readings also remind us that Faith and healing go hand in hand. It was Faith that prompted Naaman to plunge himself into the waters of the Jordan River, and it was Faith in Jesus which prompted the lepers to present themselves first to Jesus and then to the priests. The readings also demonstrate the universal love of God for all peoples, including the Samaritans, and the pagans, Israel's enemies, whom Naaman represented.

But the Gospel today highlights something more than physical healing. At the time of Jesus lepers had to keep their distance from people. They usually had a bell which they rang warning others of their presence. They were cut off socially from their families, their village, from attending synagogue worship. Simply they were regarded as outcasts, outsiders. One could imagine that they would have had little self-esteem.

Thus, what Jesus did was far greater than merely a physical cure. They were healed of being social outcasts. They could now go back to their families, their friends, and their synagogues. But for the Samaritan who was cured it was even deeper as it now meant a new relationship with Jesus, with God. In turning back to Jesus, he praises God and Jesus says, 'your faith has saved you'.

There is another thing that may be overlooked in this Gospel. It happens that one of the lepers is a Samaritan, a foreigner and therefore someone who would have been looked down on by the Jewish people. However, Jesus shows no partiality. On the contrary he seems to prefer marginalized and insignificant people. Luke, who in his gospel shows such sensitivity for the poor, does the same with the Samaritan. These other lepers, most likely Jews, accept a Samaritan among them. Their common pain and tragedy brought them together. Like all our human experience, evil or disasters bring us together. People of all creeds, nationalities, and languages come together in great displays of solidarity when in pain, when something bad happens.

Leprosy in the time of Jesus always made people to be outcasts. In our time, leprosy has a thousand names and a thousand faces: illness, old age, poverty, immigration, unemployment, drugs abuse, violence, giving up, loneliness. All these can isolate us from others and in the end, we become outcasts. We need healing spiritually and physically. We can cut ourselves off from God, from others and even ourselves if we distance ourselves from God and the others who may want to help us find a meaning, peace, and joy in life.

And always when God heals us, we need to learn to be thankful to God and to others. Let us show our gratitude to our forgiving God by forgiving others, and to a loving God by radiating His love, mercy, and compassion to others, including our families and friends. Our praise and thanksgiving adds nothing to God's greatness but profit us in our trust and growth in love of Him.
