TAKE HOME LESSON 1/22/2023

The Conversion of Saint Paul the Apostle

In the second reading today, we heard Saint Paul urging the church of Corinth to be united in the same mind and the same purpose. Paul had great concern for the early churches, and he travelled thousands of miles promoting unity and patching up divisions among the early church leaders.

It just so happens that this coming Wednesday, January 25th, we celebrate the Conversion of Saint Paul the Apostle. We all know the story. We hear first of Saul, the vigorous persecutor of the early church, present with the crowd when Stephen was stoned to death. While on a journey to Damascus, a great light knocks Saul to the ground. He hears a voice: "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" Saul asks, "Who are you, sir?" After Jesus identifies himself, Saul asks what he should do. Jesus answers, "Get up and go to Damascus, and there you will be told everything appointed for you to do."

Isn't it just like Jesus to tell us "everything" we need to do?

A Catholic spiritual writer (Antonin-Gilbert Sertillanges) once defined conversion as "a willingness to see the truth of things and conform one's conduct to it"

In the voice and the light that Saul encounters on the road to Damascus, he sees the truth of things and willingly conforms himself to Jesus Christ.

Saint Catherine of Siena says: "That dear preacher Paul was a wolf, but he became a lamb, a gracious vessel of love - and the fire with which Christ filled his vessel he carried through the whole world"

The conversion of Saint Paul inspires us to overcome all discouragement about ourselves, for the love of Jesus penetrates the hardest of hearts, giving us freedom from deadly things, and the ability to speak a new language - namely, to call upon the name of the Lord and to tell the Good News. In Wednesday's prayer after communion, we ask God to "stir up in us that fire of charity with which the blessed Apostle Paul burned ardently as he bore his concern for all the Churches."

Could we dare to be like Saint Paul, filled up with the fire of charity?

Jesus told Paul everything he needed to do. What is Jesus telling you

Perhaps there is someone to whom you could preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ this week with actions rather than words?

(UNDERSTANDING THE CHURCH CALENDAR-FINAL)

FEASTS

Celebrations identified on the Church calendar as a feast typically honor a special saint, such as one of the apostles. Other saints assigned a specific feast day include Sts. Simon and Jude, St. Stephen, the Holy Angels. Important events in Christian history are likewise identified as feasts: the Baptism of the Lord, the Conversion of St. Paul, the Transfiguration, the Visitation, the Presentation of the Lord, the Holy Family, the Birth of Mary, the Dedication of the Basilica of St. John Lateran in Rome, the Holy Innocents, the Triumph of the Holy Cross, and the Chair of Peter. A feast that falls on a weekday is not preceded with a vigil Mass, the Creed is not obligatory and most feasts are fixed dates on the calendar.

MEMORIALS

The third category of celebrations and those most representative of what we call "feast days" are properly known as memorials. Memorials are identified as either obligatory, those that must be celebrated universally on an assigned day, or optional, meaning it is up to the celebrant as to whether that particular saint is celebrated. All memorials are fixed on the annual calendar. Memorials most often honor and focus us on the pious life of a saint. If Scripture mentions the particular saint, then the Mass readings on that day are taken from the applicable Scripture, such as, on the obligatory memorial of St. Martha the readings are from John (chapter 11) or Luke (chapter 10). If the saint is not mentioned in Scripture, then the readings are the ordinary, or normal, readings assigned for that day.

 $Optional\ memorials\ of ten\ identify\ a\ saint\ special\ or\ familiar\ to\ a\ particular\ location\ or\ reliments$ gious order, but are often those not necessarily well known throughout the worldwide Church For example, Sept. 19 is the optional memorial to St. Januarius, the patron saint of Naples, Italy. While the people of Naples and the surrounding area may well remember and acknowledge Januarius, a parish in another part of the world may not. The local parish priest normally decides about recognizing optional memorials.

As every country honors her founding fathers, her national heroes, independence day, and other national events, so does the Church celebrate the great sacred mysteries — the life of Jesus, the Blessed Mother, the saints and the martyrs who died for the faith. The Church classifies each celebration according to its importance and ranks them on the annual liturgical calendar as a solemnity, a feast or a memorial. D.D. Emmons writes from Mount Joy, Pa.

52 MASSE

If we look carefully at the Church liturgical calendar, there are some days that have no celebration assigned; no solemnity, no feast, no memorial. Such days are known as a "ferial" days, from a Latin word meaning free. In ancient Rome the term referred to a holiday, especially for slaves.

On the liturgical calendar, a ferial day is always on a weekday, Monday through Friday, and occurs during Ordinary Time. On that day the priest has the option of celebrating the previous Sunday Mass, a votive Mass or a Mass acknowledging any saint he desires. The celebrant may select the readings or use those appointed in the Lectionary for that day.

52MASSES

In December 2021, author Daniel Markham visited us to complete his research for a chapter in his book "52 Masses", depicting a journey to experience Catholicism in America. He chose us and FdS to include in his book primarily to focus on our joint efforts to construct a school in

Uganda. Daniel's book is in print, published by Peregrind Press in Depere, Wisconsin, and we have a copy. In five pages, he describes his visit, conversations with parishioners, and discusses our efforts to build a New Worship Area. Father Gerry, Eileen O'Brien, Kathy Kauffman, and Don Delagrange are quoted numerous times, so we encourage parishioners who have extra money on hand to purchase a copy. It's a honor to be highlighted in the book, and be the only church along with FdS in Virginia to be so.

Third Sunday in Ordinary Time 'A' January 22, 2023

In today's Gospel reading, we hear of yet another account of how Jesus began his public ministry. Last Sunday, the Gospel of John presented Jesus' ministry beginning when John the Baptist points to him and says that he is 'The Lamb of God'. Today we hear Matthew telling us that Jesus Begins His Ministry in Galilee.

Matthew also quotes the Old Testament to make us understand that this Jesus is the one whose coming was foretold by all the prophets and in particular by Isaiah. The prophecy he quotes is about where Jesus was to begin his ministry, namely on the banks of the Sea of Galilee. This is exactly what the first reading of today says.

This area which Matthew in this Gospel and Isaiah in the first reading are talking about, was the first part of Israel to be invaded by the Assyrians and there was a belief among the people, that because of this it would be from this area that the Messiah would appear. This invasion and take-over by the Assyrians was the darkest moment in the history of the people of Israel, and so, they predicted that it will be from here, from this desolate and from this place where people had suffered a lot, that the bright light of freedom would come. In fact, Isaiah says of this place: "The people who walked in darkness have see a great light; upon those who dwelt in the land of gloom a light has shone". And so, Matthew shows that Jesus is the one who was sent to fulfill this Divine plan of liberating people from their suffering.

Another thing to note from this Gospel is that Matthew wants us to know that Jesus comes to bring to perfection the mission and message of John the Baptist. So like John, Jesus right from the beginning of his ministry, calls the people to repentance. 'Repent, for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand.' And when Jesus says that the Kingdom of heaven is at hand, He is saying that The Kingdom of God has already begun. Because after the coming of Jesus the Kingdom of God is not something that is far off in the future; no, it is within us. The message which Jesus brought us is that the Kingdom God has already begun and ought to be embraced by everyone here and now, not tomorrow but today.

Jesus begun his Mission of building the Kingdom of God we have been told from the Gospel of today by Teaching people about God; by curing the sick and taking care of the needy in the community and by proclaiming the Good News: good news of justice, of love, of forgiveness. But to make this Kingdom a reality, and the Good News to really become good news, Jesus needs all of us to cooperate with him. This is what he did right from the beginning by calling the Apostles in order to take part in the building of this Kingdom.

Justice cannot come by itself, we need to work for it by always seeking to do what is right and just and teach others to do the same. A society where love is experienced starts by you and me, by us all loving one another. We can preach and talk about caring for one another, or respecting one another, respecting human life, but if we do not act, or take some actions nothing will happen they will remain beautiful words. So, our active participation in Jesus' mission of bringing about the Kingdom is necessary. And as Jesus called The Apostles one by one to take part in his ministry, Jesus is doing the same today by calling us to be apostles in the Society in which we live.

We, the Living body of Christ, The Church, are called to continue the Mission of Jesus. We are called to bring freedom to those held captive by the hardships of their daily lives. Justice to those who have no voice, to those victimized and exploited by others. Love and caring to those who are hungry, sick and to all those marginalized by today's society. Our Mission as

Christian is to bring hope to those who seem to lose any meaning in life. It is our duty as Christians, to accept and show respect to our shared humanity and especially the dignity of life which only comes from God, and to try to protect that dignity. So, Brothers and sisters let us live our Christian lives fulfilling the Mission to which, Jesus called us through baptism, and continues to call us today.
