EPIPHANY

Epiphany is a Christian feast day that celebrates the revelation of God incarnated as Jesus Christ.

In Western Christianity, the feast commemorates principally (but not solely) the visit of the Magi to the Christ Child, and thus Jesus' physical manifestation to the Gentiles. It is sometimes called the Three Kings' Day, and in some traditions celebrated as Little Christmas.

The traditional date for the feast is January 6th. However, since 1970, the celebration is held in some countries on the Sunday after January 1st.

In many Western Christian Churches, the eve of the feast is celebrated as Twelfth Night (Epiphany Eve). The Monday after Epiphany is know as Plough Monday.

WHAT DOES SOLEMNITY MEAN IN THE CATHOLIC CHURCH?

In the liturgical calendar of the Roman Rite, a solemnity is a feast day of the highest rank celebrating a mystery of faith such as the Trinity, an event in the life of Jesus, his mother Mary, his earthly father Joseph, or another important saint.

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HOLY DAY (S) OF OBLIGATION FOR 2023 (6)

On December 13, 1991 the members of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops of the USA made the following general decree concerning holy days of obligation for Latin Rite Catholics: In addition to Sunday, the days to be observed as holy days of obligation in the Latin Rite dioceses of the USA, in conformity with canon 1246, are as follows:

*January 1, the solemnity of Mary, Mother of God

*Thursday of the Sixth Week of Easter, the solemnity of the Ascension *August 15, the solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary *November 1, the solemnity of All Saints

*December 8, the solemnity of the Immaculate Conception *December 25, the solemnity of the Nativity of Our Lord Jesus Christ

Whenever January 1, the solemnity of Mary, Mother of God, or August 15th, the solemnity of the Assumption, or November 1st, the solemnity of All Saints, falls on a Saturday or on a Monday, the precept to attend Mass is abrogated.

UNDERSTANDING THE CHURCH CALENDAR

This is the first installment of the series of understanding the Church calendar.

Except for such widely known celebrations as Easter, Christmas and Pentecost, most lay Catholics lump all Church celebrations under the term feast or feast days.

While the terminology is not necessarily incorrect, feasts are only one of the three categories of such celebrations in the Church year; the other two are solemnities and memorials. But what's the difference? The Church has always provided the faithful people of God with externally expressed devotions, festivals and celebrations through which they may pay homage to the Creator. These holy activities are not merely random events, but follow a seasonal, regulated schedule established by the Church's liturgical calendar. The day-today events of the annual Church year are primarily catalogued as a solemnity, a feast or a memorial.

In the fourth century, Emperor Constantine ended the Roman persecution of all religious factions and claimed Christianity to be the state religion of the Roman Empire. As the Church and Christian faith expanded, the number of religious celebrations subsequently increased. Unfortunately, for centuries there was no centralized control over the observance of the many celebrations. Every diocese had its own calendar, therefore rituals differed, celebrations honoring the mysteries of sacred Scriptures competed with honoring a saint, feast days overlapped, and almost every Sunday liturgy was pre-empted by a special occasion. This all led to confusion and abuses that continued until the reforms of the Council of Trent (1545-1563) and the eventual development of a universal calendar.

A churchwide calendar prompted the need to effectively organize the numerous holidays in a manner applicable to every diocese. A most challenging aspect of this effort was the standardization of the rituals used during the different ceremonies and, further, the sorting out and assigning of common dates or time frames to each event. A well-organized liturgical calendar did not happen overnight, but has evolved over the past 450 years. While the methods of categorizing the various festivals have varied, the Church has been consistent in her effort to arrange the events according to importance. The birth of Jesus is considered more important than the birth of John the Baptist; the birth of the Baptist more important than the dedication of St. John Lateran church; the life of the Blessed Mother outranks that of St. Francis of Assisi; and so on. The hierarchal process used as recently as the 20th century rank, or order, Church celebrations by calling them doubles of the first class, doubles of the second class, greater doubles, lesser doubles, simples and commemorations. In 1962, they were called first class, second class, third class and commemorations. The Second Vatican Council simplified the classifications to solemnities, feasts and memorials.

The Epiphany of the Lord

January 8, 2023

We gather today to celebrate the Epiphany of the Lord! The manifestation or Revealing of the Messiah. The Light of the people. We celebrate the day, three wise men, "The Magi", from far east, came to seek the newborn messiah. They were not members of the Chosen Jewish People, so the Epiphany today shows Jesus came for all people. As we celebrate today's feast of the Epiphany, God is telling us that he wants to be known and loved, worshipped, and known by all peoples, regardless of status color, race, or language.

We read in the First reading: "Rise up in splendor, Jerusalem! Your light has come, the glory of the Lord shines upon you". These words of Isaiah are calling us to rise up and experience the new life which Jesus brings us.

"We have come to do him homage", these are the words of the Magi to Herod as they enquired where Jesus was. "We have come to do him homage." What a beautiful attitude the three kings had. They had love in their hearts. They had love for Jesus in their hearts. We see that again when they find the baby Jesus and prostrate themselves before Jesus and worship him. Then they expressed that love concretely as they offered Jesus gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh: gold because Jesus was king, incense because Jesus was divine and myrrh prefiguring his burial.

These Wise Men (The Magi) who come from the East are searchers for the truth and discovered a star that they felt could guide them to what they were seeking. Eventually it did. Amazingly, they just found a small helpless infant in a manger with his parents, and they had the humility to accept with love that this child was the answer to their search.

What is the star that guides you through life?

Many people will seek to follow the star of power, money, fame, popularity etc. and for a time they may seem to have found that it works, but sooner or later they don't have the deep peace and happiness that following Jesus gives us. Jesus is the guiding star of our lives, he is the light shining in the dark moments of my/our life.

Like the three kings, we also have love of God in our hearts, we love His Sons, Jesus who comes to us. We do not have gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh to offer Jesus, but we do have a gift to give him: the love in our hearts for him. The best gift we can give Jesus is the love in our hearts for him. The love of the three wise men for Jesus reminds us to ask ourselves if we always come before Jesus with love. We can ask ourselves if we do everything throughout our daily activities with love for Jesus. If we do everything with love, it can be a gift to Jesus. If we do not do something with love, then it would be difficult to offer it as a gift to Jesus.

We also express our love for Jesus when we are kind to other people. Our kindness to others and our sacrifices for others are also

gifts we can give Jesus today. Kind words to others, consoling others and being compassionate to others, being fair and honest with others, are all ways of loving others which are also ways of loving Jesus. So, we have many opportunities to love Jesus every day. We can love Jesus by doing everything with an attitude of love for him, and knowing that, when we are kind to others, we are loving Jesus.
