We hear in today's Gospel that Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil.

Matthew tells us that Jesus incorporated fasting into his forty day plan. Fasting has traditionally been understood to be a way of moving more deeply into prayer and preparing oneself for significant life transitions, which Jesus is doing as he prepares for his public ministry.

While abstaining from food has surely weakened Jesus' physical body, his spirit is strengthened by the deep move into prayer, and he is ready for the Devil with his offers of food and earthly power.

After the third temptation, Jesus dismisses Satan with a verse from Deuteronomy that the Devil cannot tolerate: "The Lord, your God, shall you worship and him alone shall you serve."

The Devil, full of pride and self admiration, serves no one but himself. He hates it when we serve God, when we love one another, when we serve our neighbors, even those neighbors who annoy us.

Effective prayers for resisting temptation can be as simple as saying, "I will serve God."

The Devil will not serve God, he will not thank God, and he certainly will not praise God.

As we incorporate Prayer and Fasting into our plans for Lent, perhaps we can undertake some additional fasting, to move us more deeply into prayer, since fasting does for the soul what food does for the body. When we deny ourselves some of our favorite foods over the weeks of Lent, we sharpen our ability to choose the better course when presented with temptation to sin.

Father Luigi Epicoco suggests that there is no prayer more powerful than the prayer of praise. It's exactly the opposite of evil. For if evil always puts complaints in our mouths, the Spirit on the other hand always stirs up gratitude in us. It's a gift of the spirit, not a character trait.

We should pray to the point of feeling praise gushing forth out of our heart. At that moment evil is completely crushed. There's no more powerful exorcism than gratitude that flows from the heart of a man or a woman. If someone were to ask us why we pray, we might answer like this: We pray that we may learn to foster gratitude and praise within ourselves.

Praise and gratitude are our special spiritual weapons against evil and revenge. (pause)

If we ponder the example that Jesus sets for us in resisting the Devil, perhaps we could think of ways during these weeks of Lent to strengthen ourselves and help others to resist temptation.

What helpful advice could you offer someone faced with a temptation?

In today's Gospel, Jesus claims, "One does not live by bread alone" (Matthew 4:4). Jesus forewent food in the wilderness for forty days to prove it was possible. Because he is so abundant, God's spirit can sustain any need.

Our fasting shows us that this is possible in a personal, experiential way. Fasting is an act of faith that "No, I don't have to satisfy every urge." Relying on God, we aren't subservient to our urges.

Jesus tasked our parish with the mission to reach hungry souls with Jesus' sustaining bread of life. Through your generosity, you can help our Annual Diocesan Appeal feed those who hunger—physically and spiritually. Jesus' angels ministered to him at the end of his fast and we, too, need your help to minister to the weak. Some



souls have been fasting from His love for far too long. This Lent let's work together to end that fast. They need to know His name. May the name of Jesus be glorified through our Appeal!

We should keep in mind that, just as our Father gave us water, the gift of life that makes life possible for us, so too, the waters of baptism make our life in Christ possible.



LENT IS UPON US

As you are aware, we have announced that it's our practice to observe five soup and station nights on the five Wednesday after Ash



Wednesday beginning at 5:30. We still need many volunteers to prepare soup and/or bread for the participants.

On Good Friday, we will observe the stations in the cemetery and have an afternoon retreat. To assist you in your devotions, located on the admin table in the Narthex are two publications for your use, the Lenten "Black Books" and the "Word Among Us." Please take one or both for your use during Lent.

The Lenten schedule is also there as a reminder of the events. As a final note, the triduum (Holv Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Vigil Masses) will be at FdS.

REGULATIONS

Fasting is to be observed by all 18 years of age and older, who have not yet celebrated their 59th birthday. On a fast day one full meal is allowed. Two other meals, sufficient to

maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal

Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and juices, are allowed.

Abstinence is observed by all 14 years of age and older. On days of abstinence no meat is allowed. Note that when health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law done not oblige. When in doubt concerning fast and abstinence, the parish priest should be consulted.

All the Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence.

SEASON OF LENT

Some facts and practices:

*Last from Ash Wednesday through Holy Thursday.

- *No flowers on the Altar and Musical instruments should be used only to "give necessary support to the singing " The exception is the 4th Sunday of Lent and on solemnities and feasts.
- *No Gloria is sung.
- *Marriages and Baptisms may take place
- *Holy water remains available to the faithful.
- *On Holy Thursday and Good Friday, The Eucharist is only distributed during the Liturgy, but may be brought to the sick at any convenient hour.
- Funeral Masses are not permitted on Holy Thursday and during the Paschal Triduum.



The First Sunday of Lent

February 26, 2023

Lent is primarily the time of intense spiritual discernment, leading us to conquering our human inclinations and temptations. It is also the time for repenting of our sins and renewing our lives for the celebration of Easter with our Risen Lord who conquered sin and death by his suffering, death, and Resurrection. Today's scripture readings teach us that we are always tempted by the devil, by the world, and by our own selfish interests. So, we need to cooperate actively with God's grace to conquer our temptations and practice prayer, self-control, and charity.

The first reading, taken from the book of Genesis describes the "Original Temptation" – "You will be like gods, knowing what is good and what is evil." Adam and Eve were given the possibility of making a choice to live for God, dependent upon and obedient to His will, or to say no to God. The temptation to evil led Adam and Eve to an act of faithlessness and sin. Adam and Eve preferred their own inclinations to the will of God. They allowed themselves to be tempted and willingly collaborated with the devil tempting them.

In the second reading, St. Paul describes how the disobedience of Adam, who fell to Satan's Original Temptation, brought him and us sin, death, and a broken relationship with God. Paul explains that Jesus Christ regained for us a right relationship with God by his perfect obedience to God his Father.

Today's Gospel teaches us how the "desert experience" of fasting, praying, and soul-strengthening enabled Jesus to confront his temptations successfully and then to preach the Good News of salvation. The tempter urges Jesus to turn stones into loaves of bread. But Jesus rejects that temptation to mistrust His Father by satisfying his own immediate, temporal needs, thus reducing His Divine mission to self-satisfaction! The tempter then suggests that Jesus prove that he is really the Son of God by jumping off the parapet of the Temple. Jesus rejects this as a temptation to act as doubting his Father's power, and demand He prove His Trustworthiness. Finally, Jesus rejects the temptation to idolatry, even if worshipping Satan would enrich and empower Jesus with all kingdoms of the world.

Temptation in one form or another is an unavoidable part of life. If we honestly examine our daily experience, we can find many aspects of temptations, impulses or tendencies contrary to the right way of doing things according to our faith. Sometimes we even try to justify away these temptations, to make them socially acceptable, and sometimes we just stay silent, allowing the devil to take us wherever he wishes.

And many of us try to dictate for ourselves what is right and wrong, to draw for ourselves the boundaries of "acceptable" behavior, unburdened by any notions about the will of God, or the values of the Gospel. We find reasons for our behaviors, justifying everything we do.

Jesus serves as a model for us in conquering temptations by strengthening himself through praver, penance, and the effective use of the Word of God. Hence, during this Lent, let us confront our evil tendencies with prayer, with penance, and with meditative reading of the Bible.

Jesus didn't have an easy or quiet life. But through all those testing times he was victorious. He was passionate about his mission, and this brought conflicts and tensions, but he never gave in to temptations or being destructed from doing His Father's will. It is from him that we his followers need to learn to live a true life worth of being called Christians.
