Palm Sunday

April 2, 2023

Obedience and Humility

At Mass on Holy Thursday, the celebrant washes the feet of twelve people, representing the twelve apostles whose feet Jesus washed at the Last Supper.

The washing of the disciple's feet is presented in the Gospel according to John. It occurs at the place of the narration of the institution of the Eucharist in the synoptics. (John 13:1-20)

In the time of Jesus, the act of washing another's feet was one that could not be required of the lowliest Jewish slave. It is an allusion to the humiliating death of crucifixion. It symbolizes cleansing from sin by sacrificial death.

After the washing is complete, Jesus asks his disciples, "Do you realize what I have done for you? You call me 'teacher' and 'master,' and rightly so, for indeed I am. I have given you a model to follow, so that as I have done for you, you should also do." (John 13:13-15)

Jesus performs a humbling act for his beloved disciples. The master becomes a slave. He empties himself out for those he loves, for all of humanity. He gives us a model to follow.

In today's second reading, Saint Paul encourages the Philippians to imitate Christ's humility:

"Jesus emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, coming in human likeness. And being found human in appearance, he humbled himself, became obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross." (Philippians 2:7-8)

Humility. Obedience. Sacrifice.

We are called to die to ourselves in love for others:

How do you live that in your own life?

PALM SUNDAY

"Joyful acclamations at Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem, followed by his humiliation. Festive cries followed by brutal torture. This twofold mystery accompanies our entrance into Holy Week each year, as reflected in the two characteristic moments of today's celebration: the initial procession with palm branches and the solemn reading of the Passion." – Pope Francis

Palm Sunday is celebrated on the Sunday before Easter each year and marks the start of Holy Week. But what is the actual significance of this Holy Day, and how does it play a part in the greater story of Christ's life, death, and resurrection?

The Palm Sunday Account

Jesus was on His way to Jerusalem with His disciples to celebrate Passover. When they reached the Mount of Olives, He sent two of the disciples to retrieve a donkey colt for Him to ride. He instructed them to untie it, and if anyone asked them why they were doing so, to tell them that the Master has need of it. They did as He instructed, and brought the colt to Him, laying their cloaks over it for Him to sit on it.

As He rode into the city, people spread their cloaks and palm branches in the road, proclaiming, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" The spectacle attracted the attention of those in the city, and many wondered who He was.

The entry into Jerusalem is documented in all four gospels, with slight variations in each account.

Christ's Entry to Jerusalem Was Prophesized in the Old

The triumphal entry was predicted in Zechariah, as Matthew and John note in their gospel accounts.

Christ Comes in Peace

The donkey symbolizes His peaceful coming; He is coming to seek and to save the lost. He is coming as the sacrificial lamb, to atone for our sins. In Luke's account, we see Him weeping over Jerusalem, demonstrating His sorrow for its coming destruction, as well as for those who reject Him and the salvation that He brings.

This is a great contrast to His second coming, when He will come on a horse, bringing judgement: Christ Is Honored

In all accounts, Christ is shown great honor. The onlookers lay their garments down in front of Him, and wave palm branches a demonstration of victory, usually reserved for royalty. The onlookers shout "Hosanna," an expression of praise and adoration, which is also related to the Aramaic word for Savior and echo Psalm 118, which was part of the Hallel, a song traditionally sung at the temple during Jewish festivals.

This victorious entry reminds us that although Christ endured great sorrow and suffering, ultimately, He is victorious over sin and death.

How We Celebrate Today

Today, the celebration of Palm Sunday opens Holy Week. The priest blesses palms and distributes them to the congregation, and they are used in a procession through the church, recalling Christ's entry into Jerusalem. The palms are either kept and used as a reminder of Christ's victory throughout the year, or are burned and used as the ashes for the next year's Ash Wednesday service.



PALM SUNDAY

April 2, 2023

The Church celebrates today Palm Sunday or/and Passion Sunday Because today's liturgy combines contrasting moments of glory , Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, and suffering which ends in his crucifixion – the royal welcome given to Jesus by his followers and the drama of his unjust trial culminating in his crucifixion.

As we listen to the Passion of Christ according to Matthew, we are invited to examine our own lives in the light of some of the characters in the story like Peter who denied Jesus, Judas who betrayed Jesus, Pilate who acted against his conscience and condemned Jesus to death on the cross, Herod who ridiculed Jesus and the leaders of the people who preserved their positions by getting rid of Jesus. The reading reminds us that Jesus died for our sins.

It is on Palm Sunday that we enter Holy Week, and welcome Jesus into our lives, asking him to allow us a share in his suffering, death, and Resurrection. Holy Week challenges us to remember and relive the events which brought about our redemption and salvation, to appreciate gratefully the price Jesus paid for our salvation, and to return God's love for us (expressed through the suffering and death of Jesus), by loving others. The meditation on these Paschal mysteries should enable us to do our own dying to sin and rising with Jesus, which will result in our healing, reconciliation, and redemption. Proper participation in the Holy Week liturgy will also deepen our relationship with God, increase our Faith, and strengthen our lives as disciples of Jesus. And, let us remember that Holy Week can become "holy" for us only if we actively and consciously take part in the mission of Jesus of looking out for those who daily experienced their "passion": the hungry, the poor, the sick, the homeless, the lonely and the outcast, the discriminated.

The focus of today's scripture readings and indeed all the readings of Holy Week is on Jesus, who is faithful to the Father, faithful to his mission of saving us. Jesu is faithful not only when he was being praised and honored as a king but also during the terrible times of suffering and crucifixion. The first reading today is from the prophet Isaiah. He foretells the mysterious One who is to come whom we know now as Jesus, by saying 'I gave my back to those who beat me, my cheeks to those who plucked at my beard, my face I did not shield from blows and spitting. The Lord God is my help; therefore, I am not disgraced. I have set my face like steel knowing that I shall not be put to shame'. This was exactly what Jesus did. He trusted that his father would strengthen him to be faithful to the end especially when suffering. The Good News is that God our Father will strengthen us also.

The liturgy of Holy Week is telling us of the incredible love of a God who will never give up on us even when, having praised him in good times we forget his love in hard times. It is very important to note that nowhere in any of the gospel readings of this week does Jesus condemn anyone. Neither does he condemn you and me. The ultimate proof of this is that whilst hanging, in terrible agony on the cross, Jesus prays: 'Father, forgive them, they do not know what they are doing'.

On the cross Jesus broke the cycle of violence. Instead of taking revenge on those killing him and instead of returning hatred for hatred he returned forgiveness and love. Jesus did not act out of a power stance or

with any superior force but met bitterness with gentleness, hatred with love, rejection by accepting the others in their anger. This is what we have to imitate. It is not easy. It is hard to follow this way of Jesus faithfully, for it is much easier for us to avoid confrontation and sacrifice, to avoid those who annoy or hate us. But Jesus asks us above all to follow his example by living daily with the same attitudes that he lived by. This is the way that leads to real discipleship.


