The Compassion of Jesus

June 18, 2023

Scripture scholar Stephen Wilbricht comments that today's Gospel of the sending out of the apostles is motivated by Jesus discovering that the people in the countryside are in desperate need of spiritual leader-ship. Matthew states quite clearly that Jesus "was moved with pity" for the people because they were "like sheep without a shepherd."

Jesus gives the apostles authority over unclean spirits and sends them out to "the lost sheep of the house of Israel" with these instructions:

"As you go, make this proclamation: 'The kingdom of heaven is at hand.' Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse lepers, cast out demons. Without cost you have received; without cost you are to give." (Matthew 10.7-8)

Jesus instructs his apostles to minister without charge so that the poor are not excluded. This also allows the apostles to proclaim the Gospel with integrity, since the message cannot be modified and sold to the comfortable and well off.

In the work of this first sending is limited to "the lost sheep of the house of Israel," it is only the beginning of the work of the kingdom. This work of ministering to "lost sheep" is still going on today as we take up the Christian mission and give in abundance without expecting to be repaid.

Bishop Robert Barron comments that one enters into a "loop of grace" when one is giving away that which one is receiving.

"The constant command of the Bible is this: what you have received as a gift, give as a gift - and you will find the original gift multiplied and enhanced. God's grace, precisely because it is grace, cannot be held on to; rather, it is had only in the measure that it remains grace - that is to say, a gift given away." (Eucharist, p.30)

This cycle of giving is central to what the Catechism teaches about Love For The Poor:

God blesses those who come to the aid of the poor and rebukes those who turn away from them: "Give to him who begs from you, do not refuse him who would borrow from you"; "you received without pay, give without pay." It is by what they have done for the poor that Jesu Christ will recognize his chosen ones. When "the poor have the good news preached to them," it is a sign of Christ's presence. (CCC 2443)

In thinking of the many ways that we have been blessed by God and have received more than those who are less fortunate, whether they are lacking material things or are lacking in spiritual well being, let us ask:

What responsibility do you have to the less fortunate, and how actively are you meeting it?

ORDINARY TIME

We have now re-entered the period of the Liturgical Year entitled Ordinary Time. Ordinary Time refers to all of those parts of the Catholic Church's liturgical year that aren't included in the major seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter. Ordinary Time thus encompasses two different periods in the Church's calendar, since the Christmas season immediately follows Advent, and the Easter season immediately follows Lent.

Because of the term ordinary in English most often means something that's not special or distinctive, many people think that Ordinary Time refers to parts of the calendar of the Catholic Church that are unimportant. Even though the season of Ordinary Time makes up mot of the liturgical year in the Catholic Church, the fact that Ordinary Time refers to those periods that fall outside of the major liturgical seasons reinforces this impression. Yet Ordinary Time is far from unimportant or uninteresting.

The normal liturgical color for Ordinary Time for those days when there is no special feast-is green. Green vestments of the priest and altar cloths have

traditionally been associated with the time after Pentecost, the period in which the Church funded by the risen Christ and enlivened by the Holy Spirit began to grow and to spread the Gospel to all nations.

Johnny has served as Dean of the Kaneshie Deanery, he was a member of the Archdiocesan Council of Priests as well as a Chaplain for Accra West Grand, Knights and Ladies Auxiliary of St. John International.

Fr. Johnny is known as a wonderful and very gifted person with a great personality who engages with people very well. His hobbies include reading and listening to music.

FATHER JOHNNY'S VISIT

Despite caring for three parishes while the Senior Priest is gone, Father Johnny slipped away for a quick visit Thursday a week ago, showing up to co-celebrate Daily Mass with Father Gerry. He toured our facility, met briefly with our office staff, visited the rectory (beautiful, he said) and toured FdS before returning here for a quick lunch. What did we learn? He's a gregarious and humorous person; he can be called Father Koo (pronounced Ko), a Ghanian name given to him at birth; looking forward to coming here; similar in appearance and stature to Father Gerry; speaks English understandably.

To help his transition, when he arrives here, we will prepare a briefing schedule for all ministries and councils to familiarize him with their functions and operations. We will publish it when a firm arrival date is established.

The 11th Sunday in Ordinary Time (A)

June 18, 2023

In the Scripture readings for this Sunday, the first reading present the People of Israel encamped before Mount Sinai. God tells Moses, "Remind the people of my care for them, how I defeated the Egyptians and brought you here to myself. Paul in the second reading reminds the Romans of God's special care for his people when he tells them and us that Jesus died for us, so that we, who were sinners, might be reconciled with God. Jesus, the just man died not just for good people, but even and especially for sinner. The Gospel reading presents the Lord filled with grief when he saw how much the crowds need him and how he needed many people to continue his work. Jesus then begins the Apostolic Church. He calls the Twelve apostles to carry his presence to the world. And we know that the work of evangelizing is for everyone, all the baptized, without exemption we are all preachers and carriers of the Good News.

Today we are called upon to present Jesus to the World. Jesus continues to be active in our lives through the Bible and the Sacraments. In addition the Lord God gives us the Holy Spirit, the One Who teaches us, and reminds us of all that Jesus has said to us. We are invited to become one with Jesus, and to let the Holy Spirit work through us. We are asked to perform the works of Jesus, and through these works to reveal the power and character of God to the world. If we accept this invitation and live it out wholeheartedly, with God's grace people will see the face of Jesus in us, his followers.

We are invited to be healers in the world. People are sick in body, soul, and as well as mind. As Christians sharing Jesus' mission, we can bring healing and wholeness to people with whom we come into contact. Although we cannot raise the dead, we can help people to recover interest and a zest for living. People can be physically alive but dead in many other respects. "Cleansing the lepers" means rehabilitating and bringing back fully into our communities all those who, for one reason or another, are marginalized, rejected, despised, and ostracized on the basis of race, nationality, marital status, religion, or gender. We have to help casting out from our people the demons who possess them, first by getting ourselves liberated and then helping others to get liberated from their evil ways and addictions.

Jesus says in the Gospel, "As you go, make this proclamation: The Kingdom of heaven is at hand. Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse leapers, drive out demons". In so many ways the Church through her ministers and all the baptized continue to carry out this mission of proclaiming the Kingdom of God and healing.

The apostles worked many miracles. In our days miracles may not be as frequent or as evident but the power is there in the Church. Every Christian is called upon to be an influence for good in society. The presence of the kingdom is announced, Christ's mission is continued and extended when we bring the compassion of Jesus into the lives of others. Through our ordinary daily contact with people, especially with the lonely and rejects, we can and ought to be instruments of acceptance,

reconciliation, and healing. We don't have to go on foreign missions in order to do that. For most Christians the home, the parish, the workplace are the mission territories where we have to spread the Gospel message as best we can.

As Jesus sent his disciples to continue his work and mission, so too the Church is sent by Jesus. The Church is his continuing presence on earth Every member of the Church is sent by Jesus to contribute to this mission.
