

#### **LEGACY**





#### The Reassurance of Faith

In last Sunday's Gospel Jesus gave the apostles special authority and began their instruction for their mission to the "lost sheep of the tribe of Israel." Jesus goes on to tell the apostles that he is sending them "like sheep in the midst of wolves" and they can expect to be persecuted by those who refuse to listen to them. Then, he tells them at the beginning of today's Gospel how they should respond to the expected persecutions: "Fear no one."

A recurring comment from the adult bible studies that we have conducted here at our parish is how often in scripture we hear the message, "Do not be afraid!" or "Fear not!"

It is the first thing Mary hears from Gabriel during The Annunciation. Joseph hears in his dream to not be afraid to take Mary into his home. In John's Gospel, when the disciples see Jesus walking on the sea, he says to them, "It is I. Do not be afraid."

In today's gospel, Jesus tells his disciples two more times not to fear, including this command: "Do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul." (Matthew 10:28a)

Scripture scholar Stephen Wilbricht comments: "The dire warning that death is a possible outcome of the apostle's mission is cause for fear, yet Jesus helps the disciples to shift their focus from fear of bodily harm and death to the importance of preserving one's soul in the face of the wicked. Because of their identity as followers of God, they are cared for by God. They must act in a manner that illustrates this, trusting in God and remaining in him."

Fear is overcome by trusting in God, remaining in God. Fear is overcome by faith.

The Catechism teaches that faith is an entirely free gift that God makes to man. We can lose this priceless gift, as Saint Paul indicted to Timothy: "Wage the good warfare, holding faith and a good conscience. By rejecting conscience, certain persons have made shipwreck of their faith." (1Tim 1:18-19) To live, grow, and persevere in the faith until the end we must nourish it with the word of God; we must beg the Lord to increase our faith; it must be "working through charity," abounding in hope, and rooted in the faith of the Church. (CCC 162)

Just as the apostles are sent out on mission, we too are called to proclaim the kingdom of God and bring good news to those in need. At times, that mission may be inconvenient and may make us very uncomfortable or even worse. In thinking about those times, our Take Home Question this week is:

When has your faith in Jesus been most seriously tested?

#### ORDINARY TIME

We have now re-entered the period of the Liturgical Year entitled Ordinary Time. Ordinary Time refers to all of those parts of the Catholic Church's liturgical year that aren't included in the major seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter. Ordinary Time thus encompasses two different periods in the Church's calendar, since the Christmas season immediately follows Advent, and the Easter season immediately follows Lent.

Because of the term ordinary in English most often means something that's not special or distinctive, many people think that Ordinary Time refers to parts of the calendar of the Catholic Church that are unimportant. Even though the season of Ordinary Time makes up mot of the liturgical year in the Catholic Church, the fact that Ordinary Time refers to those periods that fall outside of the major liturgical seasons reinforces this impression. Yet Ordinary Time is far from unimportant or uninteresting.

The normal liturgical color for Ordinary Time for those days when there is no special feast-is green. Green vestments of the priest and altar cloths have

traditionally been associated with the time after Pentecost, the period in which the Church funded by the risen Christ and enlivened by the Holy Spirit began to grow and to spread the Gospel to all nations.



#### DAILY CHAPEL NAMING

Last week Father Gerry named the Daily Mass Chapel "Jack Petralia Daily Chapel." He did so to recognize the countless contributions Jack made to the church from the moment he joined the church with wife Louise in 1995 until his death in 2022. His contributions to the parish truly embodied the

three "T's" Time, Talent and Treasure. He gave his time to many projects, secular and non-secular; he gave his talent to planning and repairing things; and he gave his treasure to support the church in its financial endeavors. He was a daily Mass attendee, doing the readings, so it is only fitting and appropriate that the Daily Mass Chapel be named after him.

#### The 12th Sunday in Ordinary Time

The Scripture readings for this Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time challenge us to put all trust in the Lord. We must preach the Gospel of Christ through our words and lives without fear. He knows everything that is going on in our life, He loves us he will take care of all our needs.

The first reading tells us how the prophet Jeremiah trusted in the power of God while he faced opposition for his prophetic ministry. He was intimidated by attacks upon his character, but he was unafraid to speak out in the name of the Lord. This reading, from one of the sections of the Book of the Prophet Jeremiah referred to as the Confession of Jeremiah, relates how Jeremiah's enemies were looking for ways by which they could denounce him to the King, condemn him, even have him killed, because the King had confidence in Jeremiah. The people looked at him as one of the greatest prophets sent to them by God. But now, Jeremiah is tested. He decides to give witness to God although that meant persecution from the politically powerful men gathered around the King. He decides to fear God rather than be afraid of men.

Today's Gospel passage is taken from the end of Jesus' instruction to his disciples as he sends them forth to carry on his mission of preaching and healing. He asks them to live simple lives and to expect opposition and rejection. After having foretold future opposition and persecution, Jesus encourages his disciples to stand firm. Three times they are urged, "Fear no one!" "Do not fear!" "Do not be afraid!" Instead of shrinking from their task, they are to proclaim the Gospel boldly, because they will be protected just as Jeremiah was assured of God's protection. Hence, Jesus commands his disciples not to fear their persecutors. He presents before them the image of the sparrow to reinforce the disciples' trust and hope in God The readings hint at the opposition we future Christians will encounter as we carry on the work of Jesus in the world, and they encourage us to persevere in doing the work of Jesus. They assure us that we will be successful, despite the opposition we encounter.

We need to be afraid of nothing and nobody because our life is in the hands of a loving God. Sometimes we are afraid that we will make a wrong decision. At other times, we are afraid of what others will think when we speak up for Jesus. We are afraid of what the future will bring to us, our children, our loved ones, and our friends in general. We are also afraid of growing old, of bad health. Every fear we have is grounded in the knowledge that we have something or someone to lose. I can lose my job, family, house, money, health and even life itself. We are afraid of being rejected by others, especially our friends. This fear of rejection leads some of us not to live according to our Christian values.

Because of fear we forget one thing which is important: that whatever trouble or crisis we face at that moment, God understands it and is far powerful that what we fear. Our Heavenly Father knows

exactly what is happening. This is the good news: to know that God is always on our side; that our life is in the hands of a loving God! These days, it takes tremendous courage to be a witness of Christ, to show our faith in God. The trials of Jeremiah in the first reading are very present in our time. And yet like Jeremiah we are called to be prophets, to be Apostles of God's truth, of the Gospel of Christ to the World without fear.




