

Magnificat magazine commentary for today's Mass draws all three scripture readings together in this way:

The Lord proclaims: "My word shall not return to me void, but shall do my will, achieving the end for which I sent it." (Is 55:11) The Word is the Son of God. "Creation awaits with eager expectation" to "be set free from slavery to corruption and share in the glorious freedom of the children of God." (Rom 8:19,21) That is why Jesus speaks to us in a way that reminds us of the moment of creation: as if we were soil. "The Lord God formed man out of the clay of the ground and blew into his nostrils the breath of life." (Gn 2:7) We have the potential, the freedom to be good, rich, productive soil. We beg that the Word will return to us again and again so that we can do his will, achieving the end for which God sends his Word to us.


Bishop Robert Barron offers commentary on what this parable says about God's extravagant love for us. Imagine a crowd of farmers listening to this parable: a man goes to sow and he throws seed on the path, on rocky soil, on thorny soil and finally on good soil. The original hearers of the tale would have exchanged glances and rolled their eyes at the ridiculousness of this farmer.

That is precisely the reaction Jesus wanted. For God is like this crazy farmer, sowing the seed of his word and his love - not only on receptive soil, not only on those who will respond, but also on the path, the rocks, and the thorns, lavishly pouring out his love on those who are least likely to respond. God's love is irrational, extravagant, embarrassing, unreasonable, completely over the top.

"But the seed sown on rich soil is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields a hundred or sixty or thirtyfold." (Matt 13:23)

In thinking about what it means for faith seeds to be nourished by good soil, yielding a harvest of faith in others that is many times larger, here are the Take Home Questions for this week:

What kind of soil are you? How do you open yourself to be like the good soil that receives God's word and produces more?



For the last several months, the Pastoral Parish Council has been reading and discussing the book entitled Eucharist, in which Bishop Robert Barron analyzes the source and summit of the Christian life according to the categories of sacred meal, sacrifice and Real Presence.

Bishop Barron's text from Eucharist has been adapted into a slightly condensed book written specifically for the Eucharistic Revival entitled This Is My Body: A Call to Eucharistic Revival.

We have received our initial stockpile of books and invite interested parishioners to add this book to their summer reading collection. Please pick up a copy after Mass from John Weidner or stop by the church office during the week.

As you read through this short (110 pages) book, please consider highlighting or marking up those parts that especially move you or might inspire you to share what you read with another parishioner.

Later this fall, parishioners will be invited to participate in a number of revival activities, including small group discussions, a guest speaker presentation, a movie night and other opportunities for fellowship centered on The Eucharist. We expect these activities will be more productive if attendees have already read through this short book.

# WATER DAMAGE UPDATE


As you are aware, several weeks ago we suffered ma damage to the admin and daily chapel wing from a clogged drainage pipe and overflowing toilet.

Servpro accomplished the water mitigation and has settled with our insurance carrier. A week and a hal ago, Mill End carpeting laid new carpet in the Daily Chapel, the Pastor's Office and Admin Office. This week the installation of the new baseboards was completed this past Tuesday. Unfortunately, we detected new damage to three desks which had become waterlogged and need to be fixed.

We need not to seek an estimate of repair for the desks and proceed accordingly. We are insured through the Diocese and have met their \$1,000 deductible requirement.

The Diocese risk management office has been extremely helpful in this situation with advice and t processing of claims.

#### UNDERSTANDING THE CHURCH CALENDAR Part 2

### **SOLEMNITIES**

A solemnity holds the highest rank among Church celebrations and there are 24 days so marked on the annual liturgical calendar. It is a day that recalls and glorifies an important event in the life of Jesus and the most significant mysteries of the Catholic Christian faith: Christmas, Epiphany, Easter (the Easter Octaves including Divine Mercy Sunday), Pentecost, Holy Trinity, Ascension, Corpus Christi Sacred Heart, Christ the King. So, too, honored as a solemnity are the days associated with the Blessed Mother: the Immaculate Conception, the Assumption, the Annunciation and Mary, Mother of God. Some saints are acknowledged with a solemnity: St. Joseph, the Nativity of St. John the Baptist, Sts. Peter and Paul and All Saints Day.

In addition to every Sunday, the Catholic Church prescribes holy days of obligation, which include certain solemnities. In the United States there are six holy days of obligation: Mary, Mother of God, the Ascension, the Assumption, All Saints, the Immaculate Conception and Christmas. While all holy days of obligation are solemnities, not all solemnities are holy days of obligation. For example, the celebration of the Immaculate Heart of Mary is a solemnity but not a holy day of obligation. The same is true of the solemnity of St. Joseph and the solemnity of Sts. Peter and Paul.

Some solemnities are always celebrated on the same calendar date and are known as "fixed" on the liturgical calendar — for example, Dec. 25 is always the date of Christmas, Nov. 1 is the date of All Saints and the Immaculate Conception is always on Dec. 8. Other solemnities are "moveable" — that is, their dates change or move based on the date of Easter. Pentecost is 50 days after Easter, Holy Trinity is the first Sunday after Pentecost, Corpus Christi is the second Sunday after Pentecost, the Sacred Heart of Jesus is the first Friday after Corpus Christi and so on.


So, just what distinguishes a solemnity? The celebration begins with evening prayers on the day before and some, if a holy day of obligation, have a vigil Mass. If the solemnity falls on a weekday, the daily Mass looks much like a Sunday liturgy, including three readings, the Gloria and the Creed. All the prayers of the Mass reflect on the event or person being celebrated. These added liturgical elements help to embellish the special attention given the event or person.

### FEASTS

Celebrations identified on the Church calendar as a feast typically honor a special saint, such as one of the apostles. Other saints assigned a specific feast day include Saints Simon and Jude, St. Stephen, the Holy Angels. Important events in Christian history are likewise identified as feasts: the Baptism of the Lord, the Conversion of St. Paul, the Transfiguration, the Visitation, the Presentation of the Lord, the Holy Family, the Birth of Mary, the Dedication of the Basilica of St. John Lateran in Rome, the Holy Innocents, the Triumph of the Holy Cross, and the Chair of Peter. A feast that falls on a weekday is not preceded with a vigil Mass, the Creed is not obligatory and most feasts are fixed dates on the calendar.
