Charitable Remainder Trusts allow you to make a gift to your church while retaining income from the gifted asset during your lifetime (and that of your spouse). If the trust is funded with appreciated property, capital gains taxes may be avoided. There will also be a significant current income tax deduction at the time the trust is created.

LAYING DOWN YOUR BURDENS

July 7, 2023

In today's Gospel, Jesus invites those who are oppressed by the yoke of sin, suffering, economic distress and hard physical labor to take upon themselves his yoke.

Jesus said, "Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart; and you will find rest for yourselves. For my voke is easy, and my burden is light." (Matthew 11:28-29)

Scripture scholar Barbara Reid comments that Jesus is using a wisdom teaching (similar to Sirach 51:23-30) that would be familiar to his audience. God's "yoke" is study of and obedience of Torah. Jesus' yoke is not a lax interpretation of Torah, but actually has more stringent demands that will paradoxically lead to liberation from all that oppresses.

Bishop Robert Barron observes that Jesus wants us to imagine ourselves as pack animals. It seems rather demeaning, but this is what submission to Christ's lordship looks like: we serve his purposes and go where he wants us to go.

Is Christ commanding your life in every detail? Of you recreational life? Of your professional life? Of your sexuality? Of your friendships? Are you totally given over to him, to his lordship?

Remember, "My yoke is easy, and my burden is light." When we surrender to the path of love which he has laid out for us, our lives become lighter, easier, more joyful, for we are moving with the divine purpose.

"Learn from me, for I am meek and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls."

Our Lord is pleased to sum up in these words, humility of heart and meekness, the whole Christian life and the whole of perfection. There is a very profound reason for this: humility is the root of all Christian virtues, and meekness is its flower.

We will find "rest" knowing that all the created order is in right relationship, and the believing community delights in its goodness, as God did on the seventh day. (Genesis 2:1-3)

In thinking about what it means to say that Jesus' yoke is easy and his burden is light, here is the Take Home Question for this week:

What burden do you need Jesus to help you carry?



For the last several months, the Pastoral Parish Council has been reading and discussing the book entitled Eucharist, in which Bishop Robert Barron analyzes the source and summit of the Christian life according to the categories of sacred meal, sacrifice and Real Presence.

Bishop Barron's text from Eucharist has been adapted into a slightly condensed book written specifically for the Eucharistic Revival entitled This Is My Body: A Call to Eucharistic Revival.

We have received our initial stockpile of books and invite interested parishioners to add this book to their summer reading collection. Please pick up a copy after Mass from John Weidner or stop by the church office during the week.

As you read through this short (110 pages) book, please consider highlighting or marking up those parts that especially move you or might inspire you to share what you read with another parishioner.

Later this fall, parishioners will be invited to participate in a number of revival activities, including small group discussions, a guest speaker presentation, a movie night and other opportunities for fellowship centered on The Eucharist. We expect these activities will be more productive if attendees have already read through this short book.

FR. JOHN BODDIE MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND

Annually we solicit donations for this scholarship fund, designed to help parishioners with higher education and the parish itself with on-going adult education.

The donations purchase an add in our bulletin for one year. This Sunday after Mass we will hand out donation request letters to parishioners. By mail we will solicit donations from local businesses and former donors unaffiliated with the parish.

The scholarship committee met recently to approve changes to the applications designed to simplify them and the process. In review, scholarships are available from the fund for high school seniors entering college, higher and post-graduate education, continuing education, and special adult education. UNDERSTANDING THE CHURCH CALENDAR D.D. EMMONS

Except for such widely known celebrations as Easter, Christmas and Pentecost, most lay Catholics lump all Church celebrations under the term feast or feast days.

While the terminology is not necessarily incorrect, feasts are only one of the three categories of such celebrations in the Church year: the other two are solemnities and memorials. But what's the difference? The Church has always provided the faithful people of God with externally expressed devotions, festivals and celebrations through which they may pay homage to the Creator. These holy activities are not merely random events, but follow a season al, regulated schedule established by the Church's liturgi cal calendar. The day-to-day events of the annual Church year are primarily catalogued as a solemnity, a feast or a memorial.

In the fourth century, Emperor Constantine ended the Ro man persecution of all religious factions and claimed Christianity to be the state religion of the Roman Empire. As the Church and Christian faith expanded, the number of religious celebrations subsequently increased. Unfortunately, for centuries there was no centralized control over the observance of the many celebrations. Every diocese had its own calendar, therefore rituals differed, celebrations honoring the mysteries of sacred Scriptures competed with honoring a saint, feast days overlapped, and almost every Sunday liturgy was pre-empted by a special occasion. This all led to confusion and abuses that continued until the reforms of the Council of Trent (1545-1563) and the eventual development of a universal calendar.

A churchwide calendar prompted the need to effectively organize the numerous holidays in a manner applicable to every diocese. A most challenging aspect of this effort was the standardization of the rituals used during the different ceremonies and, further, the sorting out and assigning of common dates or time frames to each event. A wellorganized liturgical calendar did not happen overnight, but has evolved over the past 450 years. While the methods of categorizing the various festivals have varied, the Church has been consistent in her effort to arrange the events according to importance. The birth of Jesus is considered more important than the birth of John the Baptist; the birth of the Baptist more important than the dedication of St. John Lateran church; the life of the Blessed Mother out ranks that of St. Francis of Assisi; and so on. The hierarchal process used as recently as the 20th century rank, or order, Church celebrations by calling them doubles of the first class, doubles of the second class, greater doubles, lesser doubles, simples and commemorations. In 1962, they were called first class, second class, third class and commemorations. The Second Vatican Council simplified the classifications to solemnities, feasts and memorials.
