

Take Home Lesson

Command to Remember

Father Paul Scalia of Arlington writes that the parable of the wicked tenants from today's Gospel presents Israel's tragic failure to remember. The parable's landowner represents God, and the vineyard he built is Jerusalem, or Israel in general. The tenants - Israel's leaders - fail to remember that he was the One who made their vineyard. They had, as Isaiah warned, forgotten the God of their salvation.

We face the same danger as the wicked tenants. When forgetfulness creeps in - when we forget that it is he who made us and redeemed us - we begin to view ourselves as independent from him. We fall into a false sense of self-sufficiency. We grow to resent his commands as inconveniences, intrusions, and violations of our autonomy. His messengers become annoying to us, and we dismiss them.

The Church constantly guards us against forgetfulness. As a good Mother she forever reminds us of the Lord, his works, and his law. Through her priests and bishops she puts our Lord's teachings before us always. She point stop what he has already accomplished, reminding us that it was he who established us in his vineyard. At the same time she looks to the future and makes us "remember" that moment when he will come again and gather his harvest.

Mother Church fulfills this apostolate to the memory most especially in the liturgy. In the cycle of the liturgical year she walks us though the life of Christ. Year after year she causes us to remember his Incarnation, birth, life, Passion, Death, and Resurrection. We revisit his words and deeds over and over again. During the Mass, she does not just recall or recollect the Lord's sacrifice on the cross. Rather, she makes his sacrifice truly present so we can conform our lives to it. And she does this in obedience to his own command: Do this in memory of me.

God commands his people, among other things, to remember the sabbath day, to keep it holy. (Exodus 20:8) Recalling those times that the Lord's commands may have been inconvenient or intrusive, the question for this week is:

> What positive things have you done recently to remember God's gifts and to express gratitude for receiving them?

PREPARING AND VOTING AS VIRGINIA CATHOLICS In a joint letter this past week, the Bishops of Arlington and Richmond emphasized the importance of the upcoming elections for Virginians and reminded us that it's the sacred duty of each voter to form his/her conscience and participate in these critical decisions.

They reiterated that three foundational principles are essential to forming conscience and evaluating candidates:

- Many issues are important;
- Not all issues have equal moral weight;
 - Protecting life is paramount.

They further went on to say that addressing the tragedy of abortion is the "preeminent priority because it attacks life itself, because it takes place within the sanctuary of the family, and because of the number of lives destroyed." PARISH COUNCIL NOMINATIONS & ELECTIONS

A parish pastoral council is advisory, making recommendations to the pastor about the spiritual well-being of the parish. As a "visionary" council, it concerns itself with where the parish wants to be in three to five years and not with the administrative aspects of running the parish. The role of the parish council is described in detail in the Diocesan guidelines contained in the booklet "Called to Serve".

There are nine elected members on our parish council who, together with the various ministry committee chairs, meet every other month for prayer and to develop recommendations for the pastor. Each year, in October, we elect three parishioners to serve a three year term on the council.

Kevin Hayes, Kathy Swinehart and Mary Sychterz will be completing their three year terms at the end of this year. All three are eligible to stand for re-election and have been nominated again.

The final list of nominees is posted in the Narthex. If you are on it and do not wish to serve, please cross your name off this weekend.

We will collect ballots at Mass on Sunday, October 15th, and will accept ballots at the church office beginning Tuesday, October 10th through Wednesday, October 18th. You are welcome to email your vote to the church office.

ADULT FAITH FORMATION

Eucharist: Sacred Meal, Sacrifice, Real Presence

During October and November, some parishioners will be meeting in small groups to study our most holy and perfect sacrament. Even if you are not able to participate in this study, please continue to watch this space for questions with answers, reflections and commentary about the Eucharist.

Ouestion:

What is the meaning of the word "eucharist"? (Refer to CCC 1328, 1359-1361)

One authoritative answer:

"Eucharist" comes from the Greek word meaning "thanksgiving." It expresses, through sacrifice, our thanksgiving for the work of creation and the gifts of God the Father to us, his people. By recalling and re-presenting the perfectly redemptive action of Christ's death and Resurrection in the Eucharistic celebration, we can participate with Christ in offering this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to God. (Source: Eucharist Small Group Study Leader Guide)

On the page 34 of his book This Is My Body: A Call to Eucharistic Revival, Bishop Robert Barron relates that Thomas Aquinas said that the sacrament has three names, each corresponding to one of the dimensions of time. As we look to the past, we call the sacrament sacrificium (sacrifice), for it embodies the self-immolation of Christ on the cross. As we look to the present, we call it communio (communion) since it realizes the coming together of the Body of Christ here and now. As we look to the future, we call it Eucharista (Eucharist), since it anticipates the great thanksgiving that will take place in heaven when we are in the company of the holy ones, at the eschatological banquet.

The Catechism teaches that the sacrament is named Eucharist because it is an action of thanksgiving to God. The Greek words eucharistein and eulogies recall the Jewish blessings that proclaim - especially during a meal - God's works: creation, redemption, and sanctification. (CCC - 1328)






