

Please notice especially this verse: "She reaches out her hand to the poor, and extends her arms to the needy." (Proverbs 31:20) A few weeks ago, Father Koo used the image of a baby born with clenched fists, but in the end those hands will open up. Open and outstretched hands are often a sign of surrender, of giving up, of sacrifice. Open hands are also a gesture of gift giving. Watch how the priest places his open hands over our gifts to God during Mass, saying: "Make holy, therefore, these gifts, we pray, by sending down your Spirit upon them like the dewfall, so that they may become for us the Body and Blood of our

emanation of God's glory.

Lord Jesus Christ."

The theme of giving continues in today's Gospel. The servant entrusted with five talents, said, "Master, you gave me five talents. See, I have made five more." His master said to him, "Well done, my good and faithful servant. Since you were faithful in small matters, I will give you great responsibilities. Come, share your master's joy."

Why does the master call the two servants "good and faithful?" Because, when entrusted with a vast amount of money (a talent was worth 20 years of wages), they do not run off and spend the money on themselves; rather, they invest what was given them as a way of honoring their relationship with their master

Meanwhile, the third servant is punished for being lazy. While we are waiting for the master to return, perhaps the worst thing we can do is sit around being lazy. What will you do to help advance the coming reign of God until its full glory will be revealed in the end time?

Or, more simply, this week, our question is in two parts:

What gift has God given you? What do you want to do with it?

CHRIST THE KING OF THE UNIVERSE



Christ the King Sunday (next Sunday) is celebrated on the last Sunday of Ordinary Time before the beginning of Advent that starts the new Church Year. As the last Sunday of the Christian Church Year, Christ the King Sunday is the climax and conclusion

of the Church's liturgical journey through the life of Christ and the Gospel message.

Its purpose is to celebrate the coming reign of Christ as King of the Earth and his completion of the renewed creation that marks the fullness of the Kingdom of God. That hope is born from the entire life of Christ and his teachings that have been celebrated in the seasons of the Church Year during the past twelve months.

In celebrating the Reign of Christ the King, this Sunday also provides an appropriate bridge to the new Church Year that begins the following Sunday on the first Sunday of Advent with an emphasis on hope and expectation, the longing for the coming of the Kingdom of God amid the darkness of a sinful world.

ADULT FAITH FORMATION

Eucharist: Sacred Meal, Sacrifice, Real Presence

During October and November, some parishioners are meeting in small groups to study our most holy and perfect sacrament. Please continue to watch this space for reflections and commentary about the Eucharist.

The second theme explored by our study group was The Eucharist as Sacrifice. Bishop Barron begins his discussion by reminding us, "In a world gone wrong, there is no communion without sacrifice." Sacrifice is essential to understanding salvation history as a divine rescue mission that returns humanity to the fellowship Adam and Eve had with God prior to the Fall. In contrast to the disobedience of Adam and Eve, Abram becomes an obedient servant. He models sacrifice, leaves his home at an advanced age and is prepared to sacrifice his only son before God's messenger intervenes. Since Abram is obedient, God will soon make a covenant with him, ratifying it with a ceremony centered on animal sacrifice.

God works with his chosen people through various covenants, looking for obedience but his people always fall short. No matter how many times the covenant was taught renewed, or reaffirmed, it was broken by stubborn Israel, "a stiff-necked people." No matter how many animal and grain sacrifices were offered in the temple, Yahweh was still not properly honored and the people still not interiorly reformed.

In the New Testament, Jesus is the one who plays the role of the sacrificial lambs offered in the temple and becomes the "once and for all sacrifice" (Hebrews 9:26). In accord with the formula, "no communion without sacrifice," Jesus, the covenant in person, is also the sacrificial victim that seals the New Covenant. He is the "Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world" (John 1:29).

The Mass can be understood as a re-presentation of the sacrifice of Jesus, bringing the power of the cross to bear in the present. Due to the eternity of Christ, there is indeed a kind of collapsing of the dimension of time at the Mass, present meeting past and past anticipating the future

The Eucharist is the sacrifice of right worship through which we share in the Divine Life. By transforming us, it will transform the world.






