A memorable scene unfolds at the beginning of The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark during which the Lord receives a lavish expression of love. While Jesus is dining with friends in Bethany, an unnamed woman breaks an alabaster jar filled with perfumed oil (genuine spikenard) and pours the costly oil over Jesus' head. The anointing act conjures up sacred Old Testament connotations to ancient heritage, priestly rituals, the consecration of kings, and the prophetic figure of Messiah. "Christ" is the Greek translation of the Hebrew "Messiah" which literally means "One Smeared with Oil".				
A popular designation for the promised future king of Israel was "Anointed One." This title evolves from God's method of marking people set aside for a specific purpose and granting them authority. The prophet Isaiah, looking forward to the future promised king and savior of Israel, names the one who would remove all burdens from his people as the "Anointed One."				
By anointing Jesus' head, the woman both prepares Jesus for burial and commissions him a messianic king. Her pouring of oil on Jesus' head prefigures Jesus' pouring out of his blood for all.				
The anointing scene also recalls Psalm 23, which begins: "The Lord is my shepherd, there is nothing I lack." In the second part of the psalm, the Lord is presented as a generous banquet host: "You set a table before me in front of my enemies; you anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows."				
After the Passover meal with his disciples, on the way to the Mount of Olives, Jesus said to them, "All of you will have your faith shaken, for it is written: I will strike the shepherd, and the sheep will be dispersed. But after I have been raised up, I shall go before you to Galilee." Indeed, the Good Shepherd is struck, and, as predicted, the faith of Peter and the other disciples is very much shaken. They do not yet understand the hope of the Resurrection, but Jesus tells them he will meet them in Galilee.				
There is no lack of faith on the part of the woman. Her act of anointing Jesus reveals complete understanding and mature faith. Not only does she believe Jesus is the Christ, but she accepts that Jesus can only gain His throne by his pending death. Hence her anointing is declared by Jesus as preparing Him for the grave.				
A similar telling of this Passion Week anointing in John's Gospel identifies the woman as Mary of Bethany, who listened intently at Jesus' feet. Her sister, Martha, has surely told her what Jesus said before calling their brother, Lazarus, from the tomb: "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live" (John 11:25-26) Palms were symbols of life among the nomadic triber who, when crossing the desert, rejoiced at seeing the palm tree as it indicated an oasis with life-giving was near. Palms have long been a sign of victory, sur

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and join in His triumphant entrance into Jerusalem. But soon our joy turns to somberness as, clutching our palm, we hear the narrative of Christ's passion. We realize, once again, that His triumph, His true victory, will come through the cross. We know, as Jesus did, how Holy Week will end. We know that joy will return to sorrow and back to joy. We know that through the horror of His suffering, followed by the glory of His resurrection, good will trump evil and life will trump death.

The palms we take home and put in a special place serve to remind us that Palm Sunday is not lost to the ages but that by Christ's victory we, too can achieve everlasting life. "For us too, the (palms) must be symbols of triumph, indicative of the victory to be won in our battle against the evil in ourselves and against the evil which roams about us. As we receive the blessed palm, let us renew our pledge to conquer with Jesus, but let us not forget that it was on the cross that He conquered"

# FASTING AND ABSTINENCE DURING LENT

Fasting is to be observed by all 18 years of age and older, who have not yet celebrated their 59th birthday. On a fast day one full meal is allowed. Two other meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and juices, are allowed.

Abstinence is observed by all 14 years of age and older. On days of abstinence no meat is allowed. Note that when health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige. When in doubt concerning fast and abstinence, the parish priest should be consulted. FAST

\*All the Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fasting. ABSTINENCE


