

Take Home Lesson

Sunday, April 14, 2024

Repent and Be Converted

This week's reflection is adapted from scripture scholar Stephen Lampe's commentary from our Workbook for Lectors, Gospel Readers, and Proclaimers of the Word.

The Gospels of the first weeks of Easter Time focus on the appearances of the resurrected Lord to his disciples. When it comes to such appearances, however, the four Gospels reflect two different traditions. Matthew and Mark point to his appearance to the disciples in Galilee; Luke and John focus on appearances in Jerusalem. Today's Gospel is Luke's version of Jesus' appearance to the disciples in Jerusalem.

When the two disciples who encountered Jesus on their way to Emmaus return to Jerusalem to share the Good News with the other disciples, Jesus appears in their midst. In spite of his greeting of peace, they experience mixed emotions: terror, fright, doubt, and disbelief, but also joy and amazement. Elements such as touching his wounds and eating fish may appear to emphasize the physical, but Luke is carefully differentiating Jesus' new mode of existence from his former presence. This is resurrection, not resuscitation!

Even more important in Luke's account is how Jesus serves as the model interpreter. Just as he "opened their minds to understand the Scriptures," showing them that all that had happened is, in fact, a fulfillment of the law and the prophets, the disciples, who "are witnesses of these things," will be charged to do the same. Their message will be grounded in his message and his manner of interpretation. They too are to open the minds of future believers so that all nations will know that Jesus' suffering and resurrection lead to repentance and forgiveness of sins. This reading, coming toward the end of the Gospel of Luke, describes and justifies the mission the disciples will undertake in Luke's second volume, the Acts of the Apostles.

Indeed, in today's first reading from Acts of the Apostles, Peter delivers this message to his fellow Jews: "God has brought to fulfillment what he had announced beforehand through the mouth of all the prophets, that his Christ would suffer. Repent, therefor, and be converted, that your sins may be wiped away."

Considering Peter's message to his fellow Jews, this week we ask:

In what areas of your life do you need to repent and experience conversion?

WHAT IS EASTER?

March 31, 2024 - May 19, 2024

The word "Easter" comes from Old English, meaning simply the "East." The sun which rises in the East, bringing light, warmth, and hope, is a symbol for the Christian of the rising Christ, who is the true Light of the world.

The Paschal Candle used during the Easter Vigil is a central symbol of this divine light, which is Christ. It is kept near the ambo throughout Easter Time and lit for all liturgical celebrations.

The Easter Vigil is the "Mother of All Vigils" and Easter Sunday is the greatest of all Sundays. The season of Easter is the most important of all liturgical times, which Catholics celebrate as the Lord's resurrection from the dead, culminating in his Ascension to the Father and sending of the Holy Spirit upon the Church. The octave of Easter comprises the eight days which stretch from the first to the second Sunday. It is a way of prolonging the joy of the initial day. There are 50 days of Easter from the first Sunday to Pentecost. It is characterized, above all, by the joy of glorified life and the victory over death expressed most fully in the great resounding cry of the Christian: Alleluia! All faith flows from faith in the resurrection: "If Christ has not been raised, then empty is our preaching; empty, too, is your faith." (1 Cor 15:14)

"What you sow is not brought to life unless it dies. And what you sow is not the body that is to be, but a bare kernel of wheat, perhaps, or of some other kind;...So also is the resurrection of the dead. It is sown corruptible; it is raised incorruptible. It is sown dishonorable; it is raised glorious. It is sown weak; it is raised powerful. It is sown a natural body; it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a natural body, there is also a spiritual one. So, too, it is written, "The first man, Adam, became a living being," the last Adam a life-giving spirit. But the spiritual was not first; rather the natural and then the spiritual. The first man was from the earth, earthly; the second man, from heaven. As was the earthly one, so also are the earthly, and as is the heavenly one, so also are the heavenly. Just as we have borne the image of the earthly one, we shall also bear the image of the heavenly one." (1 Cor 15:36-37, 42-49)


