

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This week's reflection is adapted, in part, from scripture scholar Stephen Lampe's commentary from our Workbook for Lectors, Gospel Readers, and Proclaimers of the Word.

Throughout the Old Testament, God was identified as the shepherd of Israel. In contrast to Israel's unfaithful and corrupt leaders (bad shepherds), God cares for his flock in these verses from Ezekiel:

"For thus says the Lord God: Look! I myself will search for my sheep. I will deliver them from every place where they were scattered on the day of the dark clouds. I will gather them from the lands. In good pastures I will pasture them. The lost I will search out, the strays I will bring back, the injured I will bind up, and the sick I will heal." (Ezek 34:11-16)

This is the sort of care Israel expects of an ideal shepherd-messiah from the line of King David. But Jesus goes beyond this traditional messianic shepherd. Jesus, the Good Shepherd, will lay down his life for the sheep. This idea of self-giving has no parallel in Israel's messianic texts. This self-gift is contrasted with the actions of the hired worker, who abandons the sheep. Repeating again, "I AM the good shepherd," Jesus employees one of seven "I AM" sayings unique to John. They are reminiscent of God's self-identification to Moses - I AM (Exodus 3:13-14) - and clearly connect Jesus' identity to that of God. This connection is deepened through Jesus' use of the word "know." He knows his sheep and they know him, just as the Father knows him and he knows the Father.

Jesus' relationship with the Father, through which he reveals the Father's love, amazingly and creatively enlarges the sheepfold. Whereas Israel is the original sheepfold, Jesus' self-gift includes Israel and extends to the world beyond, with the result that he will bring others into the fold to create one flock that has one shepherd.

The Catechism explains that the word "Church" comes from the Latin ecclesia which means "an assembly of those summoned." In the Church, God is "calling together" his people from all the ends of the earth. "The Church" is the People that God gathers in the whole world. (CCC 751, 752) Shortly after, the Catechism presents the Church as a sheepfold in this way:

"The Church is, accordingly, a sheepfold, the sole and necessary gateway to which is Christ. It is also the flock of which God himself foretold that he would be the shepherd, and whose sheep, even though governed by human shepherds, are unfailingly nourished and led by Christ himself, the Good Shepherd and Prince of Shepherds, who gave his life for his sheep." (CCC 754)

In thinking about how we ought to follow the examples of the divine shepherd in Ezekiel and of Jesus as the Good Shepherd, let us ask ourselves:

How are you a shepherd to those in your care? What will you do this week to show you love those around you?

WHAT IS EASTER?

March 31, 2024 - May 19, 2024

The word "Easter" comes from Old English, meaning simply the "East." The sun which rises in the East, bringing light, warmth, and hope, is a symbol for the Christian of the rising Christ, who is the true Light of the world.

The Paschal Candle used during the Easter Vigil is a central symbol of this divine light, which is Christ. It is kept near the ambo throughout Easter Time and lit for all liturgical celebrations.

The Easter Vigil is the "Mother of All Vigils" and Easter Sunday is the greatest of all Sundays. The season of Easter is the most important of all liturgical times, which Catholics celebrate as the Lord's resurrection from the dead, culminating in his Ascension to the Father and sending of the Holy Spirit upon the Church. The octave of Easter comprises the eight days which stretch from the first to the second Sunday. It is a way of prolonging the joy of the initial day. There are 50 days of Easter from the first Sunday to Pentecost. It is characterized, above all, by the joy of glorified life and the victory over death expressed most fully in the great resounding cry of the Christian: Alleluia! All faith flows from faith in the resurrection: "If Christ has not been raised, then empty is our preaching; empty, too, is your faith." (1 Cor 15:14)

"What you sow is not brought to life unless it dies. And what you sow is not the body that is to be, but a bare kernel of wheat, perhaps, or of some other kind;...So also is the resurrection of the dead. It is sown corruptible; it is raised incorruptible. It is sown dishonorable; it is raised glorious. It is sown weak; it is raised powerful. It is sown a natural body; it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a natural body, there is also a spiritual one. So, too, it is written, "The first man, Adam, became a living being," the last Adam a life-giving spirit. But the spiritual was not first; rather the natural and then the spiritual. The first man was from the earth, earthly; the second man, from heaven. As was the earthly one, so also are the earthly, and as is the heavenly one, so also are the heavenly. Just as we have borne the image of the earthly one, we shall also bear the image of the heavenly one." (1 Cor 15:36-37, 42-49)


