

	<u>LEGACY</u>
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This week's reflection is adapted, in part, from scripture scholar Stephen Lampe's commentary from our Workbook for Lectors, Gospel Readers, and Proclaimers of the Word.

Last week we heard Jesus identify himself as the Good Shepherd. That says much about who he is. This week we hear Jesus identify himself differently: I AM the vine. This statement tells us much about him, but it also tells us about ourselves and the fruitfulness expected from us.

Five chapters of John's Gospel are dedicated to Jesus' final comments to his disciples at the Last Supper (John 13 -17), and they include two of the seven I AM sayings (John 14:6; 15:1). These powerful sayings reveal to us more of who Jesus is and identify him with the Father by affirming his divinity and oneness. Running throughout today's Gospel reading is the verb "to remain" (menein in Greek), which will be a key to understanding discipleship and fruitfulness.

The Gospel presents three related images: Jesus as the vine, the believers as the branches, and the Father as the vine grower. Each party has a role to play. Jesus, the vine, is the source for life and fruitfulness. The Father, the vine grower, cares for the well-being and fruitfulness of the vine through the process of pruning. Finally, the believers, the branches, are to remain with Jesus, the vine.

The instruction to remain consists of much more than passive existence. The believer is to dwell in a process of pruning by the word that promotes growth and removes whatever is unfruitful. In the end, believers bear much fruit as the branches of the vine. This image invites the believer into a relationship with the Father and Son that is expressed in self-going love. Since the fruit of the branches is love, we can see how this Gospel joins the other readings for today in emphasizing our vocation to bear fruitful love.

At the conclusion of today's second reading, we are instructed first to believe in Jesus and then to imitate him: to love one another as Jesus loved us. "Those who keep his commandments remain in him, and he in them, and the way we know that he remains in us is from the Spirit he gave us."

Every branch that does not bear fruit is taken away by the vine grower. Every branch that bears fruit will be pruned so that it bears more fruit. Knowing that pruning is good for plants, and for us, this week we ask:

> When have you been "pruned" by your experiences in a way that led to a greater abundance of love for others?

## WHY IS MAY THE MONTH OF MARY?

The month of May is dedicated to The Blessed Virgin Mary. The first 23 days fall within the liturgical season of Easter, which is represented by the liturgical color white — the color of light, a symbol of joy, purity and innocence (absolute or restored). The remainder of the month (beginning the Monday after Pentecost) is in Ordinary Time which is represented by the liturgical color green. This symbol of hope is the color of the sprouting seed and arouses in the faithful the hope of reaping the eternal harvest of heaven, especially the hope of a glorious resurrection.

The month of May (Overview - Calendar) is the "month which the piety of the faithful has especially dedicated to Our Blessed Lady," and it is the occasion for a "moving tribute of faith and love which Catholics in every part of the world [pay] to the Queen of Heaven. During this month Christians, both in church and in the privacy of the home, offer up to Mary from their hearts an especially fervent and loving homage of prayer and veneration. In this month, too, the benefits of God's mercy come down to us from her throne in greater abundance" (Paul VI: Encyclical on the Month of May, no. 1).

This Christian custom of dedicating the month of May to the Blessed Virgin arose at the end of the 13th century. In this way, the Church was able to Christianize the secular feasts which were wont to take place at that time. In the 16th century, books appeared and fostered this devotion.

For May, give Mary a special spot in your prayer corner. It can be a statue or picture, but place there some representation of our Blessed Mother. Make it appealing and a real tribute to her beauty and virtue.

Then, crown Mary. You can give her an actual or spiritual crown and you can make it a subtle gesture or ornate ceremony of your own device. The meaning is far more important than the action. You can do it in the beginning, at the end of May or anywhere in between. Just do it.

Why? Not because it's a long-standing tradition in the Church, although it is. Not because there are any special graces connected to it, although there is.

No, do it because Mary is Mother – your mother, my mother, everyone's mother - and because she cares for all of us day-in-and-day-out without fail, interceding for us in even the tiniest matters. For that, she deserves an entire month in her honor.


## A SPECIAL NOTE

## **KNEELING**

For Roman Catholics, kneeling is one of the most distinctive physical gestures of prayer during the celebration of Mass. In fact, for many centuries the lay faithful of the Roman Rite would kneel for almost the entire duration of Mass.

Catholics kneel because Jesus kneeled during prayer.

For these reasons the Roman rite instructs the faithful to kneel during Mass specifically when Jesus is made present on the altar. According to the General Instruction of the Roman Missal. "In the Dioceses of the United States of America, (the faithful) should kneel beginning after the singing or recitation of the Sanctus (Holy, Holy, Holy) until after the Amen of the Eucharistic Prayer."

This physical posture is meant to express a spiritual attitude of adoration before the triune God, truly and substantially present in the Holy Eucharist. It is an act of humility, recognizing our own littleness before the Creator of the world. The act of kneeling prepares our hearts to receive God within our souls, striking down our pride with a physical reminder of what our soul should be like spiritually.

While not officially part of the Rite, it is a common custom in some churches to maintain a kneeling posture until the consecrated hosts are placed back within the tabernacle.

Eucharistic Adoration will take place the first Thursday of every month from 9:30am-10:am. You can come in any time during this hour and pray in front of the Blessed Sacrament. Father Koo will give the Benediction at 10:30am. Please consider adding this practice to your prayer life.




