Take Home Lesson

Love one another

Sunday, May 5, 2024

Last week we heard Jesus tell us that the Father is the vine grower, Jesus is the vine and we are the branches. In those verses Jesus said, "Remain in me, and I in you. Just as the branch can't bear fruit on its own unless it remains on the vine, so neither can you unless you remain in me" (John 15:4). Now he continues in today's Gospel, "As the Father loves me, so I also love you. Remain in my love" (John 15:9).

What does it mean to "remain" in Jesus' love? The Greek word meno means dwelling in a particular place, remaining there, abiding there. It suggests a kind of peace and stability that we associate with being at home, or at the home of a hospitable friend. To remain in Jesus' love suggests being surrounded by Jesus' love, comforted by Jesus' love, empowered by Jesus' love.

Love begins with the Father and flows through the Son to the disciples, but it requires obedience: "If you keep my commandments, you will remain in my love, even as I have kept my Father's commandments and remain in his love" (John 15:10). Jesus provides us with a model of obedience. He has come to do the will of the one who sent him. He does the Father's will so that the world might know that he loves the Father (John 14:31). Jesus promises to love the disciples if they obey his commandments. Then, Jesus narrows "commandments" to one commandment: loving one another as Jesus has loved us.

The love that Jesus commands is more a "doing" than a "feeling". It doesn't require that we approve of the actions of the person whom we love, or even that we enjoy their company. It does require that we demonstrate our love in some practical fashion: to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, visit the sick and the person in prison (Matthew 25:31-46). We have little or nothing to gain by helping these hungry, thirsty, strange, naked, imprisoned people. The love Jesus commands is about giving, not getting.

The Father loves the Son, and the Son loves us and invites us to abide in his love. As we keep his commandments, we abide in his love, and we experience a complete kind of joy. This joy fills our hearts, driving out poisonous feelings that would otherwise make it difficult to love our neighbor. Knowing that this neighbor is a child of our Father and is therefore our brother or sister also helps us to love. Thus God's love, Jesus' love, our love, our abiding in Christ, and our keeping of the commandments change us in ways that enable us to love those imperfect souls with whom we rub elbows every day.

Someone you don't know very well needs the love of Jesus. How can you show them his love?

WHY IS MAY THE MONTH OF MARY?

The month of May is dedicated to The Blessed Virgin Mary. The first 23 days fall within the liturgical season of Easter, which is represented by the liturgical color white — the color of light, a symbol of joy, purity and innocence (absolute or restored). The remainder of the month (beginning the Monday after Pentecost) is in Ordinary Time which is represented by the liturgical color green. This symbol of hope is the color of the sprouting seed and arouses in the faithful the hope of reaping the eternal harvest of heaven, especially the hope of a glorious resurrection.

The month of May (Overview - Calendar) is the "month which the piety of the faithful has especially dedicated to Our Blessed Lady," and it is the occasion for a "moving tribute of faith and love which Catholics in every part of the world [pay] to the Queen of Heaven. During this month Christians, both in church and in the privacy of the home, offer up to Mary from their hearts an especially fervent and loving homage of prayer and veneration. In this month, too, the benefits of God's mercy come down to us from her throne in greater abundance" (Paul VI: Encyclical on the Month of May, no. 1).

This Christian custom of dedicating the month of May to the Blessed Virgin arose at the end of the 13th century. In this way, the Church was able to Christianize the secular feasts which were wont to take place at that time. In the 16th century, books appeared and fostered this devotion.

For May, give Mary a special spot in your prayer corner. It can be a statue or picture, but place there some representation of our Blessed Mother. Make it appealing and a real tribute to her beauty and virtue.

Then, crown Mary. You can give her an actual or spiritual crown and you can make it a subtle gesture or ornate ceremony of your own device. The meaning is far more important than the action. You can do it in the beginning, at the end of May or anywhere in between. Just do it.

Why? Not because it's a long-standing tradition in the Church, although it is. Not because there are any special graces connected to it, although there is.

No, do it because Mary is Mother – your mother, my mother, everyone's mother – and because she cares for all of us day-in-and-day-out without fail, interceding for us in even the tiniest matters. For that, she deserves an entire month in her honor.

KNEELING

For Roman Catholics, kneeling is one of the most distinctive physical gestures of prayer during the celebration of Mass. In fact, for many centuries the lay faithful of the Roman Rite would kneel for almost the entire duration of Mass.

Catholics kneel because Jesus kneeled during prayer.

For these reasons the Roman rite instructs the faithful to kneel during Mass specifically when Jesus is made present on the altar. According to the General Instruction of the Roman Missal. "In the Dioceses of the United States of America, (the faithful) should kneel beginning after the singing or recitation of the Sanctus (Holy, Holy, Holy) until after the Amen of the Eucharistic Prayer."

This physical posture is meant to express a spiritual attitude of adoration before the triune God, truly and substantially present in the Holy Eucharist. It is an act of humility, recognizing our own littleness before the Creator of the world. The act of kneeling prepares our hearts to receive God within our souls, striking down our pride with a physical reminder of what our soul should be like spiritually.

While not officially part of the Rite, it is a common custom in some churches to maintain a kneeling posture until the consecrated hosts are placed back within the tabernacle.




FEAST OF THE VISITATION AND CORPUS CHRISTI WEEKEND

The Feast of the Visitation falls this year on Friday, May 31st and Corpus Christi Sunday follows two days later on June 2nd. We are planning to begin our weekend of celebration with a daytime retreat on Friday which will include morning prayer and reflection, Mass at noon, followed by lunch and time

for reflection and sharing after lunch. Please contact the office or John Weidner if you are planning to attend the retreat or would like additional information.

Our weekend of celebration will continue on Sunday, June 2, The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi). We are planning a short Eucharistic procession at the end of Mass and then all are encouraged to remain for a Spring picnic hosted by our Parish Life ministry.



NEXT SUNDAY IS THE ASCESION OF THE LORD

The Ascension is the event, where Jesus arose into heaven, at the end of his time on earth. Jesus' time on earth began with his birth. It was interrupted for three days by His death on the Cross. During that time, He descended into the realm of the dead and preached the Gospel to the good people who died before Him. This allowed those good and holy souls--the righteous dead, as we call them--who accepted Christ as their Savior to proceed to heaven. On the third day after his death and burial, Jesus Christ was raised from the dead, an event we call the Resurrection. He spent the next 40 days preaching and preparing His disciples to perform the work of preaching and baptizing all people.

(Acts of the Apostles 1:1-11) It is said that by His death and Resurrection, Jesus opened the gates of heaven for all humanity. This is true, and His Ascension demonstrates this to us. It is His proof that those of us who believe in Him in faith and follow Him will also be raised on the last day, and enter into heaven.

From heaven, Jesus hears our prayers and intercedes for us with His Father.

We celebrate this on Ascension Sunday, which is celebrated forty days after Easter. Traditionally it is celebrated on a Thursday as a Holy Day of Obligation. The Church presently observes it on a Sunday to allow more of the faithful to attend Mass. It remains a Holy Day of Obligation, and the faithful are reminded that all Sundays are obligatory by default.

The Ascension should not be confused with Pentecost, which is celebrated 50 days after Easter. Pentecost commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit on the disciples of Christ, after His Ascension.

MAY'S BUSY SPIRITUAL AND SOCIAL SCHEDULE

May promises to be an extremely busy spiritual and social time for the parish. On Mother's Day, we will celebrate the Feast of the Ascension and Social Sunday. The next Sunday is Pentecost and the First Communion Celebration for five lovely recipients. On May 26th is the Most Holy Trinity and Pancake Breakfast time.

Finally, to close out the month, will be Corpus Christi weekend commencing with the Feast of the Visitation on May 31st. (See accompanying article).

Our Liturgy Committee and other ministries have planned the spiritual events, and our Parish Life Ministry will continue to need parishioners to deliver their culinary specialties to our Social Events to share with others.


