### LEGACY

Permanent endowments are gifts that keep on giving. If the endowment agreement states that the principal shall never be invaded and that income is paid out to support a designated cause through your church, then your gift is "forever."



Trusts allow you to make a gift to your church in the future. You may set up the trust now and keep the income for yourself or other beneficiaries as long as you choose, or for life. The church will receive the property after that. There are special tax benefits for these kinds of trusts.

Charitable Remainder Trusts allow you to make a gift to your church while retaining income from the gifted asset during your lifetime (and that of your spouse). If the trust is funded with appreciated property, capital gains taxes may be avoided. There will also be a significant current income tax deduction at the time the trust is created.

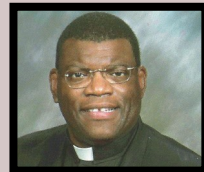

Take Home Lesson

**GIFT OF PEACE**

Sunday, June 23, 2024

This take home lesson combines commentary from scripture scholar Stephen Lampe, found in our Workbook for Lectors, Gospel Readers and Proclaimers of the Word, as well as commentary from Bishop Robert Barron, found in his book This Is My Body.

In the ancient world of which Israel was a part, people feared the chaos of water and the power of storm. Like other nations, ancient Israel's writers believed that only God was powerful enough to control such chaos. Power over nature was reserved to God.

In today's first reading, God addresses Job out of a storm, recalling the Genesis creation story and the imposition of order upon the watery chaos of the abyss.

"God said, 'Let the waters under the sky be gathered together into one place, and the dry land appear.' And it was so." (Genesis 1:9)

Saint John's Gospel begins by considering the power of God's creative word: "In the beginning was the Word... He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came to be" (John 1:1-3).

That very word by which God creates the cosmos became incarnate in Jesus of Nazareth: "And the Word became flesh and lived among us" (John 1:14). This means that Jesus is not simply a holy man whose words describe God; he is himself the divine word which affects what it says.

In today's Gospel reading, the terrible storm takes place at night, on the water, and with violent winds. These chaotic forces of nature, feared by the ancient, represent the forces of evil. At the height of the storm, Jesus stood up in the boat, rebuked the wind and said to the sea: "Peace! Be still!" Then the wind ceased, and there was dead calm. (Mark 4:39)

And then Jesus asks his disciples, "Why are you terrified? Do you not yet have faith?" (Mark 4:40) They are awestruck and terrified because they have seen God at work. Despite Jesus' earlier explanations of his parables in private, the disciples realize that faith is clearly more than the possession of knowledge.

In our time, we have an advantage over the men in the boat with Jesus as we know that he will conquer death on the cross. And we know that he will do whatever we ask of him. We know that he will do this because he said he would, and his word has power over everything. Knowing that the Lord is our best hope for calming the stormy seas of our lives, this week we ask:

**What fear would you like the Lord to help you overcome?**

**GIFTS OF THE VISITATION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY  
RECAPPING OUR PARISH RETREAT**

Last Friday, May 31, our parish celebrated our namesake feast day, the Feast of The Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary, with a parish retreat that included a morning of prayer and reflection followed by Mass at noon.

One of our parishioners in attendance commented that while we do indeed live up to the name of our parish by warmly welcoming visitors, the reflections she experienced during the retreat caused her to recognize how Mary's journey to Elizabeth has a much deeper meaning and can challenge us to adopt a mission much like Mary's.

Eileen O'Brien opened the morning by offering thoughts on what both Mary and Elizabeth must have been feeling as their unusual pregnancies progressed. It is in Mary's nature to give, and she gives companionship and assistance to Elizabeth for three months. Eileen also offered that the Visitation art that we see each week attached to our bulletin email tries to capture the joy Elizabeth feels when her unborn son moves for the first time: "For at the moment the sound of your greeting reached my ears, the infant in my womb leaped for joy." (Luke 1:44)

Pat DeGroot offered some background on the landscape of the Holy Land and shared 2000 year old Roman glass that she had acquired during her many visits to Israel. Pat speculated that as Mary walked the 80 miles to Elizabeth's home, perhaps she reflected upon the Song of Hannah, the mother of Samuel, the prophet who anointed King David. Hannah, like Elizabeth, was thought to be barren, yet her prayers for a child were answered. Hannah's song begins: "My heart exults in the Lord, My horn is exalted in my God." (1 Samuel 2:1) So, when Elizabeth greets Mary, Mary's song "spills out": "My being proclaims the greatness of the Lord, My spirit finds joy in God my savior..." (Luke 1:46-47)

After first listening to Pat and Eileen read two different translations of the Visitation narrative from the Gospel according to Saint Luke (Luke 1:39-56), Bill Plunkert led the retreaters through a contemplative prayer exercise. Reflecting deeply, retreaters attempted to still their thoughts and observe or even enter into the scene in Zechariah's house. After reflection, some shared new perspectives, things about the Visitation narrative they had not before considered.

After experiencing the gifts of Holy Mass and then the gift of lunch courtesy of Johnna Harris, John Weidner and Debbie Harriman shared stories of religious art they had been gifted and Tom and Cindy Jessee shared highlights from their recent journey to Fatima.

*May God continue to bless us with an abundance of gifts and may the Holy Spirit inspire us to use them to accomplish His Will!*

I appreciate your help as I am sure the children and their parents are so grateful also.

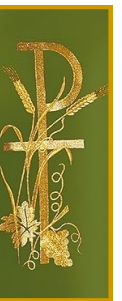

**ORDINARY TIME**

We have now re-entered the period of the Liturgical year entitled Ordinary Time. Ordinary Time refers to all of those parts of the Catholic Church's liturgical year that aren't included in the major seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter. Ordinary Time thus encompasses two different periods in the Church's calendar, since the Christmas season immediately follows Advent, and the Easter season immediately follows Lent.

Because of the term ordinary in English most often means something that's not special or distinctive, many people think that Ordinary Time refers to parts of the calendar of the Catholic Church that are unimportant. Even though the season of Ordinary Time makes up most of the liturgical year in the Catholic Church, the fact that Ordinary Time refers to those periods that fall outside of the major liturgical seasons reinforces this impression. Yet Ordinary Time is far from unimportant or uninteresting.

The normal liturgical color for Ordinary Time for those days when there is no special Feast is green. Green vestments and altar cloths have traditionally been associated with the item after Pentecost, the period in which the Church founded by the risen Christ and enlivened by the Holy Spirit began to grow and to spread the Gospel to all nations.
