

## Take Home Lesson

September 8, 2024

This take home lesson is drawn from commentary by scripture scholar Eric J. Wagner found in our Workbook for Lectors, Gospel Readers and Proclaimers of the Word.

**RICH IN FAITH** 

In today's second reading, Saint James addresses economic inequality and favoritism in the early Church. The dilemma, according to James, does not lie in the existence of such inequality but in the community's response to it. James does not call for doing away with economic inequality by demanding that the rich become poor or that the community work strenuously to increase the wealth of the less fortunate. Therefore, James seems to consider economic inequality an unavoidable reality of life. Evidently, some members of the early Church enjoyed wealth and possessions while others did not. However, James is perfectly clear about how a disciple of Jesus should appropriately respond to such economic inequality.

Disciples of Christ must avoid giving greater deference and care to those with economic means. They must also avoid neglecting or shunning those of less means or lower economic status. Instead, comparable care and attention must be given to all members of the community regardless of economic status. For James, Jesus' disciples might accept the economic inequality as an inevitable reality of life, but they cannot rightly appeal to it as grounds for treating members of the community differently.

The rational and the wisdom of the proper behavior Christians should take springs from the care of God's people. As James points out, when God shows favoritism, the preference lies with the poor. After all, God chose the poor to be "heirs of the kingdom," and it is the poor whom God enriches with faith. Where Isaiah speaks of God restoring interior deficiencies, James focuses on God's (and Christians') care for exterior matters.

James addresses those he is instructing in a loving manner as he asks them a key question:

"Listen, my beloved brothers and sisters. Did not God choose those who are poor in the world to be rich in faith and to heirs of the kingdom that he promised to those who love him?" (James 2:5)

The preferential option for the poor is not a new, contemporary social justice teaching but a teaching from Jesus, exemplified in his ministry. We should examine carefully if our lives actually demonstrate this priority.

Our question this week is:

When has your faith in Jesus enabled you to speak out on an issue of importance?

# PARISH PASTORAL COUNCIL

Each year, in September and October, we devote some effort to identifying and electing parishioners to serve on our pastoral parish council. In September, we typically run some background notes about the role of the pastoral parish council and how it interacts with the pastor, the parish staff, the ministry leaders and the parish finance council. Information about the nomination and election process will be announced in the coming weeks. Then, on October 20 (the third Sunday in October) we will elect three parishioners to serve a three year term on the parish council.

There are nine elected members on our parish council who, together with the various ministry committee chairs, meet every other month for prayer and to develop recommendations for the pastor.

Briefly, the primary role of the parish pastoral council is advisory, making recommendations to the pastor about the spiritual well-being of the parish. As a "visionary" council, it concerns itself with where the parish wants to be in three to five years and not with the administrative aspects of running the parish. The parish pastoral council does not run the parish, or supervise its daily work. Ultimately that responsibility falls on the shoulders of the pastor. It should be prophetic, calling the community and its leaders to grow in faith together and to respond to the needs of the people.

Please prayerfully consider whether you or someone you know should be nominated to serve on our parish pastoral council.

The 9/11 terrorist attacks killed 2,977 people and injured thousands at the World Trade Center, the Pentagon, and in Somerset County, Pennsylvania. Commemorative events are held at all three sites on the anniversary of the attacks.

9/11 Quotes. "Even the smallest act of service, the simplest act of kindness, is a way to honor those we lost, a way to reclaim that spirit of unity that followed 9/11." "If we learn nothing else from this tragedy, we learn that life is short and there is no time for hate.


