

Journey Through the Bible: From the Mountain to the Promised Land (Numbers 1-36)

This commentary is adapted from Little Rock Scripture Study's "Panorama of the Old Testament."

The book of Numbers takes its name from the census or numbering of the people that begins the book. The fourth book of the Torah tells the story if Israel's journey from Mount Sinai, through the wilderness, and finally to the plains of Moab, just outside the Promised Land.


The first ten chapters of Numbers takes place at Mount Sinai, where the people of Israel have been encamped since their encounter with God on the mountain. While Leviticus details the organization of Israel's worship, these pages of Numbers itemize the organization Israel's community. A census is taken of the men of each tribe who are able to serve in the army, as this group of former slaves becomes a well-ordered force ready for military conquest of the Promised Land.

The Israelites are led through the wilderness by the guiding presence of God manifested in a column of cloud by day and a column of fire by night. But despite having God in their midst, soon the Israelites complain about the hardships of desert travel. God's people face two temptations. The first is the lure of stopping and settling in place. The second is the desire of turning back to Egypt. The lessons Israel learns in its wilderness will be heard by later generations, as both warning and encouragement. Getting Israel out of Egypt is much easier than getting Egypt out of the hearts of God's people.

The worst crisis of the journey comes after Moses sends a team of scouts to spy out the land of Canaan. The scouts report that the land is indeed fertile and fruitful. However, they also report that the people in the land are strong and their cities are fortified. The report generates fear among the people, a dread that overcomes the people's trust in God. The Israelites begin to weep and despair of ever reaching their destination. They decide to choose a new leader to lead them back to Egypt, marking rejection of their covenant with God.

God declares that none of this faithless generation will enter the land. As a result, the Israelites are made to wander in the wilderness for forty years. Throughout the Bible, the number forty, whether it be forty days or forty years, is a time of testing and preparation for what God is going to do next. The entire generation that was numbered in the census that began the book of Numbers will perish in the wilderness, while their children, the next generation, will one day enter the land God has promise them.

The desert period is a time of probation for Israel, a time to adjust their attitude of slavery, overcome their fears, and take on a new set of values. God wants them to change their victim mentality and take on the values and life style of a holy nation, God's special possession.



As Lent comes closer, we will have more details for you, but here is some preliminary information.

Ash Wednesday is March 5th and thanks to Tom Dorman, we created our own ashes from donated palms.

In a slight departure from previous practice, we will celebrate the Stations of the Cross with soup initially on Wednesdays and later in Lent on Fridays, as is traditional throughout the church.

The Triduum (Holy Thursday through the Easter Vigil) will be held at FdS this year.

The reconciliation service at COV is scheduled for April 9th.

As normal, Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics.

Additionally, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence. More details will follow in ensuing weeks.

GOT CATHOLIC QUESTIONS? OCIA HAS ANSWERS!

OCIA stands for the Order of Christian Initiation for Adults. In short, it is the process through which catechumens, who are unbaptized adults or older children, are formed in the teachings of the Catholicism and are initiated into the Catholic Church. This process may also include baptized adult Christians or Catholics who are preparing to receive the sacraments of confirmation and Eucharist. Baptized persons moving through OCIA are known as candidates.

Our parish Adult Faith Formation team has begun meeting with two candidates and will be working through a set of Inquiry lessons over the next few months. The Inquiry lessons broadly cover basic questions in areas such as: what is faith, revelation, prayer, the Bible, and the meaning of Mass and Catholic practices.

We are firming up a schedule for the next several months, which will publish in the bulletin within the next couple of weeks. Until then, anyone is welcome to join the next discussion which is scheduled for this Sunday, March 2, after Mass in the Fellowship Hall. The scheduled lesson is Q2: What is Faith? We also welcome all questions, even those that may fall outside the scope of the prepared lesson.


