Journey Through the Bible: Clamoring for a King over Israel (1 Samuel 1-12)

This commentary is adapted from Little Rock Scripture Study's "Panorama of the Old Testament" and The Collegeville Bible Commentary.

The books of 1 and 2 Samuel are about the institution of Israel's monarchy and its effects on the community of God's people. The clamor for a king arises during the period of the judges when the last of the judges - Samson, Eli, and Samuel - suffer defeat at the hands of the Philistines. A great urgency ensues when the ark of the covenant is captured in battle and the important city of Shiloh is destroyed by the Philistines. The books take their name from Samuel, who was a priest, prophet, and the final judge of Israel. He is instrumental in Israel's transition from the period of the judges to monarchy. Although Samuel is the last of the judges, even more significantly he is the first of a long line of prophets who will be both advisers and critics of Israel's kings.

In chapter 2 of the first book, Samuel's mother, Hannah, sings a canticle that finds a counterpart in the New Testament in Mary's Magnificat from Saint Luke's narrative of the Visitation (Luke 1:46-55). Both hymns express joy at the birth of a special child; both praise God's power, holiness, and salvation. In both the proud rich are cast down and the humble poor are raised up. Hannah's poem reminds of God's justice; Mary's song reminds of God's mercy.

Two conflicting viewpoints concerning the monarchy are presented in 1 Samuel. One views the monarchy as ordained by God for the survival of the people. The other views the monarchy as a mistake because a human king is an affront to the LORD, who is their true king. After their defeat by the Philistines, many among God's people want Israel to have a king like the other great nations. A king will unify the tribes, establish a powerful army, and lead them to military success. But Samuel argues that Israel is not like the other nations. Israel already has a king, and that king is the LORD. Samuel argues that Israel will have to pay a high price for its monarchy, but the people refuse to listen to Samuel's warnings and continue to insist on a king. So God commands Samuel to give way and provide a king for Israel.

God chooses Saul, and Samuel anoints Saul with oil as a sign of God's spirit upon Israel's first king. Samuel's role as prophet and kingmaker is to provide regulation for the king, so that his royal authority does not rival the sovereignty of God. The new monarchy must remain compatible with Israel's covenant. The struggle between kingship and prophecy, political aims and covenant obligations, characterizes the ensuing history of God's people until the end of the monarchy and their exile.

GOT CATHOLIC QUESTIONS? OCIA HAS ANSWERS!

OCIA stands for the Order of Christian Initiation for Adults. In short, it is the process through which catechumens, who are unbaptized adults or older children, are formed in the teachings of the Catholicism and are initiated into the Catholic Church. This process may also include baptized adult Christians or Catholics who are preparing to receive the sacraments of confirmation and Eucharist. Baptized persons moving through OCIA are known as candidates.

Our parish Adult Faith Formation team has begun meeting with two candidates and will be working through a set of Inquiry lessons over the next few months according to the following schedule:

- March 30 Q5: The Bible; Q6: Divine Revelation
- April 6 Q7: Your Prayer Life, Q8: Catholic Prayers and Practices
- April 13 Q9: The Mass; C5: The Sacrament of the Eucharist
- April 27 Q10: The Church Year; Q11: Places in a Catholic Church
- May 4 Q12: Who Shepherds the Church?; Q13: The Church as Community
- May 18 Q14: Mary; Q15: The Saints
- June 8 Q16: Eschatology: the "Last Things"



We meet after Mass in the Fellowship Hall. Anyone is welcome to join. While the discussions use structured materials, we try to set a casual mood and welcome all questions, even those that may fall outside the scope of the prepared lesson.

LENT, TRIDUUM, AND EASTER



In a slight departure from previous practice, we will celebrate the Stations of the Cross with soup initially on Wednesdays and beginning in April, twice, on the 4th & 11th.

The Triduum (Holy Thursday through the Easter Vigil) will be held at FdS this year.

The reconciliation service at COV is scheduled for April 9th @ 6pm.

FASTING AND ABSTINENCE DURING LENT

Fasting is to be observed by all 18 years of age and older, who have not yet celebrated their 59th birthday. On a fast day one full meal is allowed. Two other meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and juices, are allowed.

Abstinence is observed by all 14 years of age and older. On days of abstinence no meat is allowed. Note that when health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige. When in doubt concerning fast and abstinence, the parish priest should be consulted.

All the Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fasting.

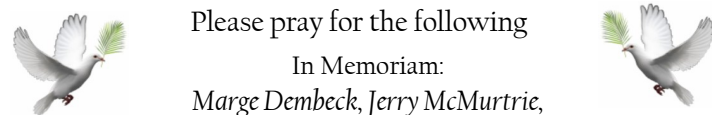
Father supplemented his first presentation with slides, so it was easy to follow and was very well received by parishioners who attended.

**FILL BOTTLES FOR MARY'S CHOICE**

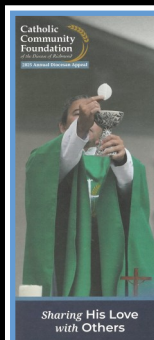

**ANNUAL APPEAL**


