JOURNEY THROUGH THE BIBLE: RESURRECTION AND THE PASCHAL LAMB

Let's have one more look at the Gospel of John on this Easter Sunday before we return to the First Book of Samuel.

After the Prologue, the first twelve chapters (1:19-12:50) of the Gospel of John are titled The Book of Signs. There are seven signs, sometimes referred to as miracles or wondrous deeds: water is turned into wine at Cana; a royal official's son is cured simply by the word of Jesus; a paralytic is cured near the Sheep Gate at the Bethesda pool; a few loaves are multiplied to feed thousands; Jesus walks on water; a man born blind is given his sight; and, finally, Jesus raises Lazarus.

Before Jesus raises Lazarus, he says to Martha, "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even though he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" Martha replies, "Yes, Lord. I have come to believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one who is coming into the world." (John 11:25-27)

This last sign of raising Lazarus leads directly to the decision of the Sanhedrin to kill Jesus. Lazarus is a token of the real life that Jesus dead and raised will give to all who believe in him. The evangelist's typical irony is found in the fact that Jesus' gift of life leads to his own death.

At the meeting where the Sanhedrin decide to kill Jesus, Caiaphas, who was high priest, prophesied that Jesus was going to die for the nation, "and not only for the nation, but also to gather into one the dispersed children of God." (John 11:52)

The dispersed children of God are perhaps the "other sheep" that John mentions earlier in The Good Shepherd narrative of Chapter 10: "I have other sheep who do not belong to this fold. These also I must lead, and they will hear my voice, and there will be one flock, one shepherd." (John 10:16)

At the beginning of the Gospel of John, John the Baptist saw Jesus coming toward him and said, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world." (John 1:29) This recalls the spotless paschal lamb, whose blood saved Israel at Passover before the Exodus from Egypt. (Exodus 18) Unlike all prior paschal lambs, Christ, the new paschal lamb, rises.

Saint Paul uses the image of the rising associated with yeast to describe what sharing in the resurrection looks like. "Clear out the old yeast, so that you may become a fresh batch of dough, inasmuch as you are unleavened. For our paschal lamb, Christ, has been sacrificed." (1 Cor 5:7)

For those who have died with Christ through baptism, the call to celebrate Passover in Christ entails avoiding a different kind of yeast, the old yeast of malice, evil, and vice. Instead, we share in Christ's resurrection, partaking in the bread of sincerity and truth.


