





Journey Through the Bible: God's Covenant with King David (2 Samuel 1-7)

This commentary is adapted from Little Rock Scripture Study's "Panorama of the Old Testament".

The book of 2 Samuel covers the reign of David, remembered as Israel's ideal king, a man after God's own heart. He understands that God is Israel's true king and that he himself is bound to God's covenant. King David brings new vision to Israel. Within a few years he transforms the Israelites from a divided and dispirited conglomeration of tribes to a united nation.

David's reign is marked by several great accomplishments that affect the ongoing development of God's saving plan. First, David captures the city of Jerusalem from the Jebusites. Second, David decisively defeats the Philistines. And third, David brings the ark of the covenant to Jerusalem, making the city not only the political capital of the nation but also the religious center.

Jerusalem is the ideal city for the center of Israel's life. As an ancient fortress city, its height makes it easy to defend from enemies. It is also located north of Judah so that it belongs neither to the northern or southern tribes and saves to unite the tribes of the North with those of the South.

The primary purpose of all the books of the Deuteronomic history (Joshua, Judges, 1 and 2 Samuel, and 1 and 2 Kings) is to demonstrate the establishment of the reign of David. They show how the covenant of God with Israel will be bound up with the family of David. Victory or defeat in battle is not what is truly important. Rather, what is crucial is loving faithfulness in relationship with God.

From his royal palace, David laments that he is living in a house of cedar, while the ark of God dwells in a tent. David desires to build a "house" for the LORD. The word for "house" in Hebrew can mean either temple or dynasty. David states that he wants to build a house for God, a temple where God may dwell among the Israelites. But God speaks through David's prophet Nathan, saying that God will instead build a house for David, a dynasty that will last through the ages.

With Nathan's oracle (2 Sam 7:11-17), God establishes a covenant with David, promising David that his "house" - his dynasty and his kingdom - is firmly established forever. Although David's heir will build a temple for God's dwelling, the throne of David will always be firmly established.

The covenant made with Abraham establishes the "family of God," the covenant made with Moses establishes the "people of God," and now the covenant with David establishes "the kingdom of God." The Israelites place their future hopes in David. This mortal king, chosen by God and anointed with God's spirit, becomes "the LORD's anointed one" or messiah, and this promise of an eternal reign will provide the foundation for Israel's expectation of the coming of its future messiah.

Divine Mercy Sunday, celebrated on the Sunday following Easter, is a Catholic feast day honoring the divine mercy of Jesus Christ. It is based on the private revelations of St. Faustina Kowalska, a Polish nun, who reported visions and messages about God's mercy. This day is a time for Catholics to reflect on Jesus' love and forgiveness, seeking a plenary indulgence through confession, communion, and prayer for the Pope's intentions

ST NOA SCHOOL UPDATE

Our second collection two weeks ago was for St. Noa school, which is now seven years old and a burgeoning project, consisting of classrooms, offices, a kitchen, dining space, meeting space, dormitories, and staff housing, a well, among others Student enrollment is now 504, which has necessitated a need for more teachers and non-teaching staff and because the school houses the teachers, the immediate need is for more teacher houses (4). The eventual cost for these additions which include a lavatory, kitchen, living room, and social halls will be \$87,000. Please keep this in mind as you consider a donation to the school project.
